# REMARKABLE JOURNEY DURING HIS CLASSIFICATION TALK GIVEN AT THE ROTARY CLUB OF COCHIN

Rtn. John Chiramel, a dedicated board member in charge of Youth Services, recently shared his extraordinary life story with the Rotary Club of Cochin during his classification talk. His journey is one of relentless learning, diverse experiences, and an unwavering commitment to giving back—a testament to the philosophy that life is a journey to be savored, not merely a destination to be reached.

#### A Journey to His Roots

Rtn. John's journey traces back to his ancestral home in Puthenpeedika, a small town in the Thrissur district. Though his roots lie in this quaint town, his life began far from there. His father, a meteorologist, moved the family frequently, much like the clouds he studied, leading Rtn. John to attend seven different schools in 11 years. Despite this nomadic upbringing, Rtn. John found his grounding at Loyola High School in Pune, a city he now considers his second home, with Kochi, Kerala, being his first.

After completing his MA in Economics from Pune University in 1976, Rtn. John quickly realized that opportunities in the field were limited. This realization pushed him to pursue an MBA from XLRI, Jamshedpur, setting the stage for his long and successful corporate journey.



#### Rising in the Corporate World

Rtn. John's corporate career spanned 36 years, during which he rose from a sales executive to the CEO and board member of leading companies such as Asian Paints, Garware Paints, Arvind Mills, IL&FS, and MAS Holdings in Sri Lanka. Despite his rapid ascent, Rtn. John experienced a sense of corporate boredom—a sentiment many professionals encounter but rarely act upon. Driven by his passion for economics, he made the bold decision to pursue his first love once again.

#### The Shift to Academia and Ethics

Eager to deepen his expertise, Rtn. John enrolled at Columbia University,

earning a postgraduate degree in Economic Policy. However, his plans to work in development economics were cut short by downsizing at the World Bank, prompting his return to the corporate world with MAS Holdings. As he approached retirement, he felt a strong calling to teach, but his burgeoning interest in ethics inspired him to pursue further education. This led him to earn another postgraduate degree in Ethics from Madras University and ultimately a PhD in Behavioral Ethics at the age of 66. His research focused on why good people sometimes make unethical decisions—a study that profoundly influenced his teaching and worldview

Today, Rtn. John teaches at prestigious institutions including IIM Kozhikode, XLRI Jamshedpur, and XLRI Delhi. Even in his 70s, his commitment to teaching reflects his belief that learning and sharing knowledge are lifelong pursuits.

# The Five Boxes: Goals That Guide His Life

Throughout his journey, Rtn. John has been guided by five personal goals, which he fondly refers to as his "five boxes."

1. **Teaching**: His first goal was

- to teach, which he has proudly achieved. He finds immense joy in interacting with bright young minds and considers teaching his true calling.
- 2. **Writing**: The second box is writing. Currently, Rtn. John is working on a musical play about King David, filled with thought-provoking theological questions. He is also penning a fictional novel based on a real family in Kerala, rich with intrigue and drama.
- 3. **Singing**: At 55, Rtn. John embraced singing, completing his eighth grade in Western Operatic Singing and now exploring pop and rock singing. He looks forward to showcasing his talents at a Rotary karaoke night soon.
- 4. **Playing the Piano**: Learning to play the piano has been his most challenging goal, but he remains determined to master it. Now at Grade 1 of the Trinity College piano course, Rtn. John finds joy and relaxation in playing and singing at home.
- 5. **Doing Good Works**: His final box is dedicated to service, and he has found the perfect platform in Rotary. As a member of the Rotary Club of Cochin, he actively contributes to community service, focusing on the Rotary

Tech Skills Initiative (RTSI). This initiative aims to educate students in artificial intelligence, with the first batch set to start in January 2025

Rtn. John's journey is deeply supported by his family—his loyal wife Anita, three children who have returned to India after studying and working abroad, and two grandchildren who bring him endless joy. ### **VALLAMKALI: THE MAJESTIC SNAKE BOAT RACE OF ONAM**

Pallamkali, or the Snake Boat Race, is one of Kerala's most thrilling and visually spectacular traditions, held during the grand festival of Onam. This traditional boat race, featuring long, sleek snake boats cutting through Kerala's serene backwaters, not only exemplifies the state's rich cultural heritage but also embodies the spirit of unity, teamwork, and communal harmony. As Onam celebrates the mythical return of King Mahabali, Vallamkali stands as a tribute to these values, making



it an integral part of the festivities.

The origins of *Vallamkali* date back centuries, rooted in the martial history of Kerala. It is believed that snake boats, known as **Chundan Vallams**, were originally crafted as war canoes for battles between local kings in the region's extensive waterways. Over time, these martial vessels transformed from tools of conflict to symbols of community pride and friendly competition. Today, *Vallamkali* is no longer about

#### Significance of Vallamkali during Onam

Onam, the grand harvest festival of Kerala, commemorates the annual visit of the mythical King Mahabali, whose reign is remembered as a golden age of prosperity,

peace, and unity. Vallamkali, held during this period, is a vibrant display of these very values. The snake boats, often measuring over 100 feet in length and manned by up to 100 oarsmen, are decorated with vibrant colors and adorned with ornamental silk umbrellas.

The rhythmic rowing, accompanied by the traditional Vanchipattu (boat songs), reflects the harmony and joy associated with King Mahabali's rule. The spirit of teamwork and collective effort displayed in the races mirrors the ideals of

Onam—unity, prosperity, and the celebration of life.



Among the many Vallamkali events held during the Onam season, the Nehru Trophy Boat Race is the most famous Established in 1952 in honor of India's first Prime Minister, Jawaharlal Nehru, this race is held on Punnamada Lake in Alappuzha. Nehru was so captivated by the excitement and fervor of the race during his visit that he donated a silver trophy, which has since become a coveted prize for the winning team.


