For most of us, when it comes to real estate, we think of residential, malls, offices, and hotels, but there is a big new emerging real estate sector warehousing and industrial - which is now larger than the office sector. In terms of volume, it became significant during Covid; American companies that were outsourcing to China

started to look beyond it. India has become one of the credible options, and we are getting the benefit of that.

Data centres have also gained attention: the Indian Government has said that Indian data must be stored in India, not overseas. As a result, there is a huge demand for data centres and co-working spaces. Major companies like Microsoft, Google, and Accenture are embracing co-working due to the engagement activities these platforms offer.

Other emerging sectors include co-living, student housing, and senior housing. For various reasons, senior housing hasn't picked up in India, despite its popularity globally. There may be social stigma attached to it in India. However, NRI kids who lack a support system often request their parents to go into senior housing.

By 2030, the real estate sector's contribution to the overall GDP will be a trillion dollars, as the economy is expected to be about US\$5 trillion. Real estate is still more expensive than all combined assets, including diamond, gold, mutual funds, stocks, cash, FD, bonds. It's versatile in India and becoming more transparent, well-governed, consolidated, and investment-worthy. The total construction activity as of today is 22 and a half lakh crore, with 86% residential and 14-15% commercial.

2022 was the best year for sales in the last decade, and the first half of 2023 has beaten the first half of 2022, especially in residential. On the commercial side, there's considerable square footage available in cities like Bombay and Bangalore, with varying vacancy rates. However, there are concerns about markets like Hyderabad due to excessive supply.

Globally, the office market is split. In America, a billion square feet of office space is empty, while in countries like India, Hong Kong, Singapore, and Australia, people are returning to work. Even in India, only 35% of American tech company employees are returning to work.

The retail sector is adapting, with malls continuing



to do well by shifting focus to entertainment rather than just apparel and fashion. Rent continues to increase in premium malls, and new trends like REITs are emerging, such as Blackstone's oversubscribed listing in India. Even online companies like Nykaa and Mama Earth are seeking a hybrid approach by expanding into physical shops.

I'm going to dig a little deeper into what is doing superbly well at this stage in residential real estate.

It's still the best time to buy real estate in two decades.

Over the last 20 years, while residential prices and interest rates have gone up, salaries have risen faster, making affordability the best it has been in years.

The number of months of salary required to buy a residential property had gone up to 58; it is down to 30 now.

A lot of people ask me what the total sales value in the residential market is. 3.3 lakh crore new homes get sold every year, with 50% of that in Bombay, showcasing how vibrant the city is at this moment in time. Unfortunately, the affordable housing segment has decreased from 40% in 2018 to 18% now, while luxury and ultra-luxury have increased.

In Bombay, apartments valued more than Rs 50 crores are hotly contested. There's a shift towards larger, better infrastructure, and more open space in newer buildings. During Covid, many residents realised the importance of space and amenities, leading to a demand for properties in gated communities with internal facilities like gyms or swimming pools.

Interestingly, the typical value of a two-bedroom apartment has remained the same since 2014 at Rs 72 lakhs. The price per square foot had gone up



from Rs 5100 on an average to Rs 6000 per square foot. But apartment sizes have decreased from 1400 to 790. This shows that the unsold residential inventory has started to come under control.

The number of developers in India has consolidated dramatically. In 2012, there were 22,000 developers; by March 31st, 2023, only 800 were left. New players like Birla, Hero, and TVS have entered the industry, making it more open and transparent. In the last three years, four developers including Lodha, Godrej, Prestige, and DLF have crossed Rs 10,000 crores.

Unlike in the past, developers are not as driven by greed. They are more focused on cash flow and sales momentum. For example, DLF sold a thousand apartments at Rs 8 crore each, so Rs 8000 crores in one day, not stopping the sale to increase prices, reflecting a shift in mentality.

Lastly, there are a lot more younger buyers coming in, predominantly in the age bracket of 26 to 40. This change in demographics signifies a promising shift in the residential real estate market.

The green bar on this slide represents salary earners who are currently buying across the city at prices below one crore; these are the most preferred buyers other than corporate. Internationally, people in their mid-20s buy one bedroom, then upgrade as life progresses. By the time the children leave, the home size decreases gradually.

In India, the opposite occurs as families grow in size, due to the prevalence of joint families.

#### **ROTARIANS ASK:**

## Do you have any analysis on second homes?

Ihadthought the second home trend was a blip during Covid, but I was wrong. It's doing exceptionally well today, especially plotted developments. People are crazy about buying plots of Godrej, Mahindra. Second is second homes; people are interested in locations like Alibaug and Goa, with several companies even moving their head offices there.

# What are your thoughts on redevelopment in south Bombay?

I am for it because this segment is attracting good quality developers. SRA – Slum Rehabilitation – did not attract good quality guys; it attracted all the wrong guys. The society redevelopment is attracting Rahejas. I am on the board of Mahindra Lifespaces; they have done society redevelopment; Rustamjee has done. None of these guys were in slums and they are saying society is a lot cleaner. You need to have a lot of patience to deal with the society, but it is not fraught with the kind of challenges that slums have.

To my mind, a big positive for south Bombay is that there are bigger brands who are willing to do society redevelopment and it's worth doing it. There's one other thing that people should think is to try and see if you can redevelop it on your own, self-redevelopment, because that is also a big part of being able to do it on your own and there is enough funding available for it.

# What is your prediction on property prices, with figures as high as Rs 1,50,000 a square foot?

It is true, especially in buildings where the developers have no urgency to get cash and will hold their prices. But not every building will command this price.

# How is the real estate market responding to the IT sector slowdown?


Global Capability Centres are impacting the real estate demand. American corporations, like JP Morgan, Morgan Stanley, and Citibank, used to outsource IT to India through intermediaries. Now, they are doing it directly, setting up their own global capability centres. The quality of the buildings that they are taking is fantastic. When they were outsourcing it to someone, those guys were fitting in people like sardines at 50 sq ft per person.

These guys, because it is their global capability centre – and in the US, the norm is 150 sq ft per person – they have to follow the same norm. Otherwise they'll get crucified there. As a result, the requirement of space has trebled. From 50 sq ft. for the same job it has gone to 150 sq ft. Plus the building quality is better. Plus, they want buildings closer to the central business district rather than away, which is what third party guys used to do. It was like a factory shed. These guys with global capability centres are really investing and saying it has to be the same quality. What you get in the US, you will get in India.

# ETHICS IN ROTARY

By Paul Harris in This Rotarian Age

Paul Harris devoted nearly an entire chapter of his second book to Arthur Sheldon, who helped to shape much of the early Rotary philosophy. Sheldon moved to Chicago after graduating from the University of Michigan, found himself but appalled by the business ethics that dominated Chicago, or rather lack of business ethics.

Sheldon argued that, not only can ethical business people survive a community filled with unethical businesses, but they prosper. Given a choice, people will always choose someone that they can trust. This principle, later formalised in the four-way test, quickly became a core element in Rotary philosophy. As Paul Harris wrote:

About Cotton Green Clinic, Sewri: The Rotary Club of Bombay is running a charitable clinic along with Bombay Cotton Merchants & Muccadams Association Ltd & Dr. Batra's Foundation at Cotton Green. The clinic is open every Tuesday and Friday. Medical services include homeopathy, dental, paediatric, GP care and blood tests.

About IWA Clinic, Fort: IWA (International women's Association) provides general, dental, gynaecology, x-ray, homeopathy, skin, and eye services, and predominant patients are for general and dental. The clinic is open Monday-Friday, 10 am-6 pm.

At a very subsidised rates: medicines, X-Ray, dental ,



paediatric, skin, GP senior medical consultant.

RCB finances it annually at around Rs. 15 lakh. The clinic is run independently by IWA. Regular club visits are planned and all are welcome to visit at anytime of the day.

The homeopathic department is run by Dr. Batra's Foundation; consultation and medicines are given free of cost. The dental department runs in association with the Indian Institute of Continuing Education & Research (Rtn. Swati Mayekar).

Blood testing is done by N.M. Medical at a concessional rate. 70% cost of testing is borne by NM Medical (Rtn. Rahil Shah). GP and Paediatric medicines are given free of cost. Eye check-up is free of cost.

In February 2023, the clinic

started a tobacco de-addiction service every Friday. The clinic is open twice a day i.e. Tuesday and Friday. We plan to increase to thrice a week.

Increase Cotton Green working from 2 to 3 times/week.

Create awareness and work with other committees within RCB and also across all Rotary Clubs that fall within the targeted geographical radius.


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# Farewell to our dear PP Arvind Jolly


Arvind Jolly's life was based on the Rotary motto "Service Above Self". Arvind joined Rotary Club of Bombay in 1983.






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
