Ashish Dhawan felicitated with Rotary Club of Bombay PV Gandhi Award for Excellence in Public Life

- One of the things that really shaped me in my early years was reading two books. One was Gandhiji's autobiography, about his life of service and how he transformed himself as a human being. The other was Benjamin Franklin's autobiography, which taught me about discipline. More importantly, it highlighted how Franklin ran a printing press in Philadelphia but left that behind at the age of 43. His real life began then: he became the father of the US Constitution, invented the lightning rod, founded the University of Pennsylvania, and established the American Philosophical Society, among many other accomplishments. He was essentially free to pursue a variety of interests and wasn't tied down by his business.
- While I was in business school, I had a lot of spare time, to be honest. Reading cases was tough in the first month or two, but soon I was mostly partying. In my free time, I thought about what I really wanted to be when I grew up. The first promise I made to myself was that I wanted to become an entrepreneur by the age of 30.
- My dad had been a company man all his life. I respect him for having had a great career and for raising me well, but I really wanted to be an entrepreneur.
- I think I was fortunate to be in the right place at the right time. I was in India post-reforms, after the slowdown in the 1990s. I made a lot of mistakes but also got lucky. From the beginning, I had this clear vision: I wanted to be an entrepreneur at 30, and by my mid-40s, I wanted to have a second career.
- Frankly, life could have turned out differently. Maybe I wouldn't have been able to transition to a second career, but I was fortunate. Financially, I did well in my 30s, far beyond my needs and expectations. And since my needs didn't grow much, I started thinking about a life of service, which I felt



would be meaningful in my mid-40s and beyond.

- Benjamin Franklin has always been my idol. I don't think anyone can match what he accomplished, but I thought if I could achieve even a fraction of it, I would have led a meaningful life. So, while doing my day job, I started giving away money in small ways. It gave me an excuse to go into the community on weekends and see what was happening.
- That's when I began to understand what



was wrong with school education in India: the bottom half of students were being left behind. Even after I finished my corporate career in 2012, the ASER data consistently showed that by the end of fifth grade, more than half of Indian children couldn't read or write at a third-grade level. This was abysmal, and results had flatlined for a decade.

- This left a deep impression on me. Education, especially during the early years, became a mission I wanted to work on. I later learned — something we should all know as parents — that Grade 3 is a seminal year. At this stage, children transition from *learning to read* to *reading to learn*. Missing this milestone has long-term consequences because the curriculum keeps moving forward, and children who fall behind stay behind.
- Ashoka University was a single, ambitious project. We were naive. We bought land on the outskirts of Delhi — nine kilometres from the border, in Haryana. We thought it was close enough to the city and liked Haryana's private university laws, but we had no idea of the scale required to build a good university. We stumbled into it, taking one step at a time.
- Ultimately, the goal was for alumni to take over and contribute, ensuring the institution renews itself over time. That's the governance model of most top universities worldwide: truly philanthropic, focused on research and teaching, and self-perpetuating. There is no owner. If you look at the top 200 universities in the world, this is the model they follow.

- We started working on Ashoka University the way any entrepreneur would: building it brick by brick, hiring the initial faculty, and getting the physical infrastructure in place. One thing I learned from Pramath, who had built ISB before, was that whatever we do, we must start with quality from day one.
- This is not a small project. Ashoka has become one of the largest collective philanthropy projects in India. When we started, people doubted that others would contribute. Today, we have over 200 founders who have each contributed more than ₹2 crore. Incredibly, 11 — soon to be 12 — founders have contributed over ₹100 crore each. Altogether, we've raised over ₹3,500 crore for the project, all philanthropic.
- Our ambition is to raise ₹10,000 crore to build a top-class institution, but we're only 35% of the way there.
- One of the key lessons I've learnt in philanthropy at scale is to work systemically. The Indian system spends ₹8 lakh crore on education. Making that spend more effective and efficient is the ultimate goal. It's not easy — it's very hard to move a system — but we had evidence from low-resource pilots that were scalable. High-resource pilots are never scalable. With these results in hand, we began advocating for FLN.
- The World Bank's learning poverty metric shows that over 55% of children fail to meet basic learning benchmarks. Our goal is to reduce this figure to 25% within a decade. That's the larger ambition.
- I feel blessed to have been born in India, to witness the country's development, and to have had the opportunity to receive a good education and do well financially. India presents unique challenges — large-scale, complex problems that require innovative solutions. But we also have some fantastic people to partner with, from extremely talented individuals in the development sector to smart, dedicated professionals within government.
- I remain optimistic. While we've made significant progress in areas like roads, electricity, and sanitation, education and health are inherently more complex because they involve human behaviour. Building a school is straightforward; ensuring that the classroom transaction changes is not. A teacher must act differently for meaningful learning to occur. You can construct state-of-the-art facilities, but without a change in pedagogy, nothing will improve.
- These are hard problems, but the needle is starting to move.

She also introduced The Milk Bag Project, a remarkable initiative aimed at recycling and reusing milk bags effectively. The students were highly attentive and displayed keen interest in learning about

sustainable waste management practices.

This informative session not only raised awareness but also inspired students to adopt environmentally friendly habits, highlighting the importance of individual contributions towards a cleaner and greener future.

Dear Friend,

India, a land of vibrant diversity, grapples with a significant challenge: adult illiteracy. There are 18.2 crore non literate adults in India. The highest of anywhere in the world!

The Rotary Club of Bombay is conducting a pioneering initiative that hopes to eradicate adult illiteracy and promote adult education across India. We aim to make adults functionally literate using the Each One Teach Many model.

The cost of making an adult functionally literate is INR 275 per person only. This includes the Primer Kit (NCERT approved) consisting of various books and flash cards, stationary, final exam facilitation costs, graduation certificates and administration costs.

The Adult Literacy Program is intended to promote and strengthen education of non-literate adults with an aim to help learners achieve functional literacy over a period of 3 months. Among other things, Learners acquire a vocabulary of around 700 key words, enough for day to-day needs such as reading destination signs on buses, filling in deposit and withdrawal slips in Banks, and newspaper headlines, besides being able to learn simple arithmetic adequate to maintain household and other accounts.

Completion of our Adult Literacy Program results in confidence, employment, upliftment for family and society as a whole, improved political representation, smaller families, poverty reduction and so much more!

In January 2024, Rotary Club of Bombay hosted our very first Golf Fundraiser for this cause and

we raised over INR 1 Crore thanks to our amazing patrons for helping us change the world.

Boosted by the stupendous success of the previous Golf Fundraiser, we are back with the second edition of our golfing tournament which is bigger, grander and spread over two editions in two different cities over two days – Anand Rathi Wealth Golf Classic 2025 in Pune on 11th January, 2025 and Phillip Capital Golf Challenge 2025 in Mumbai on 12th January, 2025.

EXPLORING MATUNGA: A BLEND OF ARCHITECTURE AND CULINARY HERITAGE



- To know Matunga, a vibrant neighbourhood in Mumbai, is to immerse yourself in its architectural heritage and culinary delights. This was the driving thought for 27 Rotarians and friends who eagerly rose on the morning of Sunday, 15th December, for a tour of the area. What followed was a journey through time, offering glimpses of Mumbai's cosmopolitan history where the old world meets the new.

THE ARCHITECTURE

- Matunga's built landscape reflects Mumbai's colonial past and its dynamic South Indian migrant community. The area is rich with heritage buildings, many dating back to the pre-Independence era. Highlights included the imposing Don Bosco School, a stunning example of Gothic Revival architecture, alongside mid-20th-century homes showcasing Art Deco elements such as geometric lines, ornate grills, and pillars—hallmarks of Mumbai's architectural identity.
- The tour also featured places of worship, including the 300-year-old Shree Vitthal Rukmini Temple, the Sri Sankara Mattham, and the Don Bosco Madonna shrine. Equally captivating were the crumbling Aurora Talkies and residential buildings adorned with Art Deco motifs of sunbursts, tropical florals, and maritime icons.

THE FOOD

- Matunga's culinary treasures were the highlight of the experience. The group enjoyed stops at Koolar & Co., where the strict yet warm owner personally served bun maska and tea. The grand finale was a feast at Rama Ashray, famed for its authentic dosas, idlis, vadas, and filter coffee, with the owner kindly reserving a sought-after air-conditioned room for the group.
- Our food expert, Riddhi Joshi, architectural guide Suhasini, and the Art Deco Trust enriched the experience with stories, insights, and historical context. The tour not only deepened appreciation for Matunga's heritage but also raised a donation for the Art Deco Trust, recognising their invaluable efforts to preserve Mumbai's architectural legacy.
- This enriching morning was a perfect blend of history, food, and culture, leaving everyone inspired and grateful.

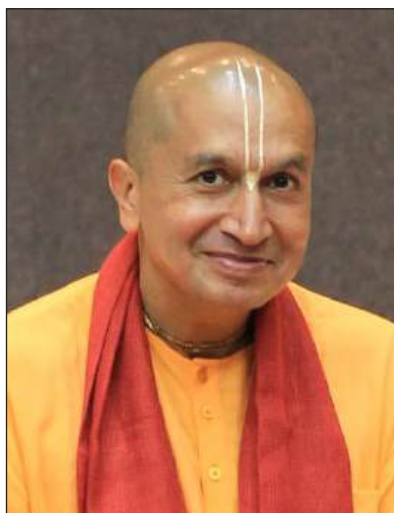

Gauranga Das, also known as Gauranga Prabhu, is an Indian Hindu monk, spiritual leader, and author. He serves as a Governing Body Commissioner for the International Society for Krishna Consciousness (ISKCON) and as Director of the award-winning ISKCON Govardhan Ecovillage, a United Nations World Tourism Organization-accredited community. He is UNEP's Faith for Earth Counsellor and Administrative Director of the Bhaktivedanta Research Centre (BRC). As an advocate for sustainable development, Gauranga Das advises the Ekatma Dham Project, initiated by the Chief Minister of Madhya Pradesh. He is a founding board member of Rishihood University and serves on the High-Profile Advisory Committee of the Central Sanskrit University. A visiting faculty at IIM Nagpur, he teaches Life Management Skills. A prolific author, his works include The Art of Resilience and Legacy of Community Building in the Bhakti Tradition. Gauranga Das continues to inspire through his initiatives, blending spiritual wisdom with modern solutions.
