Orhan Awatramani a.k.a. Orry, in conversation with Rtn. Priya Tanna on what they don't teach you at any school

- Orry represents a very cool new age of success. It's a success that's not familiar to any of us. Think about it — most of us have grown up on a very different definition of success. You work hard, you become a lawyer, a doctor, an engineer, a banker. You know, you work the hours, you don't talk about yourself. You get serious when you're at work, you have a fun side when you're off work.

- And then comes this kid who throws all of that out the window and establishes his own personal brand of success, a success that's built on self-ridicule, a success that's built on being self-deprecating, being very, very confident, being cocky, having this cute bratishness to him, treating himself like the star of his own show, treating himself like the star of his own life.

Orry

- People say they feel younger when I touch them. And it just became a thing. Get up and do it right now! I swear, I charge for the touch. And sometimes I make people sign a contract saying they won't accuse me under #MeToo. Because who knows, tomorrow some lady will put a #MeToo case on me. But a lot of people

say that they do feel younger, they feel happier, they feel very rejuvenated.

- I was once on TV, on a national show, and one of the members of the crowd said, "I heard you heal people." And I was like, "I'm not saying it, you're saying it." And he said, "I've been trying to get my wife pregnant for eight years. Eight years she's not gotten pregnant." So I said, "I can give you the touch but I can't guarantee her getting pregnant." I gave him the touch, Priya. And in three months, she conceived. Now I'm not saying it's me. Could it have been a coincidence? Sure. But did it happen? Yes.

- I was aiming for a job in marketing. I thought I would work at a brand like Misguided — fast fashion, fun, marketing, cool projects. And eventually, I feel I became the product myself, and I'd learned marketing from all the different places I had worked and interned. I had a few friends who were actors, and I realised when you are an actor, you are the product. You're selling yourself — you're doing Frootti ads, you're doing laser ads, you're looking amazing because you are the product. I was like, "I don't want to act, but I would love to be the product," and I was like, if I can keep marketing myself and marketing myself well — and you have to look desirable and aspirational at all times —

and that's really where it happened. I worked in the marketing department, in the sales department, and that's when I realised if you can make yourself a product, you can market it and sell that. What better thing to do. That was it.

- I'm not going to lie about the things I had and the opportunities that came my way. But being a celebrity friend is not the only way. If that were the case, every celebrity's friend would be famous. How many celebrity friends do you all know that are famous? Not a lot, right?
- Priya, you can make anything into a career. I went from being the background friend — if you look back in the day, I was still in the background, there he was. That's when they say, "Orry is everywhere." I was in the background of the picture, I just moved to the foreground. The more entertaining and interesting you are, the more the spotlight falls on you, and luckily my friends had big spotlights, and so their light was cast on me. If you ask me how I bridged from South Bombay to Bollywood, well, the Sea Link existed. I was going up and down every single day. I was going up and down every single day, but you have to be — see, my friendships, none were strategic. People are smart, Bollywood people aren't dumb. They're not going to maintain a fake friendship for nothing. If you're using them, they're going to know. But like I said, my friends had big spotlights that could fall on me, but you have to be strategic in your time and in your place. Remember, I'm not in Bollywood, because I don't act in movies. You have to be at the right place at the right time, and when it comes to parties, I think I'm someone people just enjoy having at the parties because I'm a fun personality. But then what changed is, I take a lot of pictures, and I take a lot.



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- So, then what happened is the Orry photo dump happened. So, when you say, what is my entry into Bollywood, it was the Orry photo dump because what happened was it was like, "Oh, he only goes to the very famous and relevant people and takes a picture with them." So, if Orry didn't ask you for a picture, it's a failure on your part. Then I noticed, like after my friends (of course, they're my friends and all in my photos), celebrities I wasn't very close to would come and say, "Oh, our outfits are matching. We should take a photo." And I was like, "I'm in red, you're in neon blue, we're not matching." But I get it. I appreciate the hustle, and I'll give you the photo. And just like that, said actors are in the Orry dump, and those photos go everywhere.
- Those photos go viral. The reel I make goes viral. And so, I realised an actor's movie comes out once a year, twice a year. It takes months to act and produce the movie, but Orry's photo dump comes out every day. It became the new Page 3. And if you weren't in it, I could tell when I would talk to a celebrity and walk away, their face would drop. And I'd be like, that is my new superpower. If I look around someone famous for very long and then don't take a picture, their face would drop, like, "He didn't ask me? Am I a has-been? Is my career over?"
- I charge a lot, like a lot. And the photo dump charges a lot. Do you want to be in that series? It's not cheap. Do you want me to come and cover your party? It's not — if I do it on my own, that's fine. I wouldn't charge a friend. If I love you, I wouldn't even — no need. But if you call me, and you want me to take pictures of you and your guests, and touch all of them, it's not cheap. So, it's not cheap. Every time I touch someone, a piece of my soul leaves my body and goes into that.
- I did work my whole life for more work. You don't work to get more — does anyone work to get more work?
- I think you work to earn money, you work to buy yourself a nice bag, you work to pay your rent. I don't work for more work. I work for a paycheck. So, I don't want more work. My plate is full. Work smarter, not harder. I have tricked an entire generation into thinking if I touch them, that's work. So, work smarter, not harder.
- I say I don't like work. That doesn't mean I don't work. I do. I work very hard. I was raised with a phrase from my mother: "Every day, hard work beats talent when talent doesn't work hard." And I never understood why she had written it and pinned it on the pinboard, and every morning I'd wake up and see my desk, and it would say "Hard work beats talent when talent doesn't work hard." I was like, "Is my own mother telling me I have no talent? Is that what's going on?" But the day does have a lot of hard work. But every day is different. Like I said, I'm living — I'm a liver. I'm living my life, and I'm not altering that for a job. But the one thing that is there every day is discipline. I will make sure I wake up. I make sure that when I wake up, I make my bed. Meaning, that even if someone may think

Alumni visit to Pirojshanagar mangroves

On Saturday, October 19th, a group of 26 alumni from Ambedkar and GK Schools embarked on an enlightening visit to the Sustainability Shala in the Godrej Vikhroli complex. Organised by PP Ramesh, the trip provided a unique opportunity to engage with Mumbai's second-largest urban wildlife habitat. Following the Sanjay Gandhi National Park, the Pirojshanagar Mangroves are vital green lungs for the city, supporting diverse ecosystems.

Upon arrival at the jetty opposite the Godrej complex, participants received an informative talk highlighting the critical role mangroves play in carbon sequestration and their importance in combating climate change. They learned how these unique ecosystems serve as buffers against coastal erosion while enhancing biodiversity. This was followed by a guided nature trail

through the lush mangroves, offering a firsthand experience of their beauty and ecological significance.

After the trail, the group enjoyed a sumptuous breakfast at "Hubble" in the Godrej headquarters. They then participated in an engaging session on green buildings, exploring sustainable architecture and its role in promoting an environmentally responsible future.

The day concluded with an inspiring talk on social responsibility, emphasising the importance of giving back to the community. Participants left not only with cherished memories but also with a deeper understanding of the delicate balance that sustains our ecosystems and the need for stewardship in our environment.

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Young changemaker honoured for potable water initiative



Our Club is proud to recognise and honour Arsham Hirani, a Year 12 student from Cathedral & John Connon School, for his dedicated efforts towards clean water access in Mumbai. Arsham approached our club to collaborate on a potable water project he initiated, working closely with the Water Resources Committee Chairperson, Rtn. Siddharth Bhimrajka, to bring his vision to life.

Arsham's project involved collecting and testing water samples from various city locations in his school's laboratory to assess water quality. He also led an awareness programme, educating

schoolchildren on the importance of safe drinking water, and successfully raised funds for purchasing and installing water purifiers. His efforts are expected to benefit over 4,000 students across Mumbai, providing them with access to safe and clean drinking water.

Arsham's proactive approach, combined with his commitment to social responsibility, sets a remarkable example for youth involvement in community welfare. His initiative underscores the impact that one individual's determination can have on improving public health.

Mental health awareness event at Atlas SkillTech University

TOWARDS MAKING INDIA TOTALLY LITERATE!

The greatest joy of being truly empowered - 30,000 adults achieve functional literacy in Palghar with Rotary Club of Bombay

When Tarabai's grandchildren became adolescents, conversation with them ceased dramatically. After all the grandmother was illiterate and the grandchildren somehow thought it was meaningless to indulge in banter with Tarabai.

Now suddenly, all that has changed. A functionally literate Tarabai can not only write her name, affix her signature but also fill in pay in slips and withdrawal slips at her bank. She can travel to the adjoining villages by bus to meet her relatives without mixing up the bus numbers. Importantly she is now able to maintain simple arithmetical household accounts with her recently acquired accomplishments.

Tarabai's self-esteem has gone up several notches and even at the age of 65 she feels empowered and happy that the conversations with her grandchildren has improved dramatically and that she is no longer dependant on others for doing simple things which we as literates take for granted.

Not only this, her entire family, son, daughter-in-law and their children now look at her with respect and pride.

This is the transformational change RC of Bombay is bringing to Palghar District of D3141.

There are approximately 5-6 lakh adult illiterates in Palghar and we have taken a pledge to eradicate this and make it a 100% literate district in the next 2-3 years.

At a historical graduation ceremony held at Vikramgad on October 22nd, 2024, nearly 3,000 women assembled to receive the graduation certificates of themselves and their 27,000 other compatriots at the hands of several dignitaries led by PRIP Shekhar Mehta.

All of them were greeted with piping hot vada pavs and poha with tea on arrival and seated under a massive shamiana.

It was an amazing sight to behold as the beneficiaries, Preraks and akshar saathis recalled their experiences with beaming smiles and exhilaration writ large on their faces. The exultation, josh, dignity and fervour was palpable and throbbing through the entire audience. Dressed in their finest and colourful sarees, these women pledged to make this movement a revolution amongst all the villagers to eradicate this scourge of illiteracy. Rarely have I felt so elated, motivated, satisfied and inspired of having achieved something so significant.

Thanks to our cooperating organisation, Diganta Swaraj Foundation led by Shradha and Rahul Tiwrekar, programme conductor Jayu (a double Master's graduate achieved as a tribal woman - indeed a rare feat), 375 Preraks, 15,000 akshar saathis, 30,000 beneficiaries and countless other volunteers this programme was conducted flawlessly.

Our grateful thanks to PRIP Shekhar Mehta, DG Chetan Desai, PDG Shashi Sharma, Past Presidents Bhagwan Patil, Rakesh Mishra, Shashank Thakare, Presidents Shradha Tawde, Arun Patil, Vilas Shahapure and many other Rotarians for being there and encouraging us.

The Rotary Club of Bombay team consisted of myself (ARRFC & PDG) - Sandip Agarwalla, President Satyan Israni, PP Vineet Bhatnagar, Chairman Runit Shah. Also present were Rotarians Miral Shah and Paritosh Rungta.

With the help of Rotary India Literacy

Mission whose superbly designed module we are now following for this entire project - Rotary Club of Bombay is committed to expanding this project across India with others. The only real stumbling block to getting close to 100% literacy are this section - the adult illiterates - as the government is doing a tremendous job in educating our children.

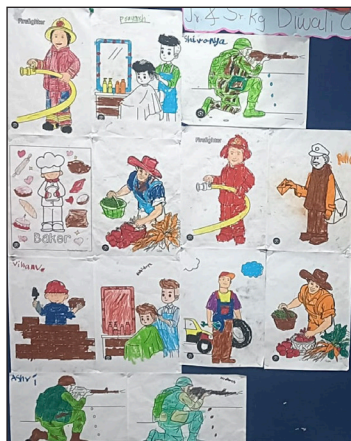

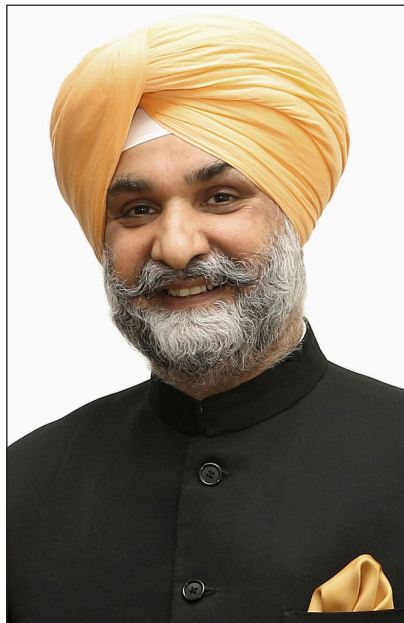

Ambassador Taranjit Singh Sandhu is a distinguished retired Indian diplomat with over three decades of experience in the Indian Foreign Service. Having joined in 1988, he served in key roles, including High Commissioner of India to Sri Lanka and, notably, as the 28th Ambassador of India to the United States. During his extensive career, he was instrumental in establishing the Indian Embassy in Ukraine and held prominent posts in Washington, D.C., Frankfurt, and the United Nations. Known as one of India's foremost experts on US relations, he also managed vital congressional liaisons and press relations. After remitting his office as Ambassador to the US in January 2024, Ambassador Sandhu pursued public service as a candidate for Member of Parliament from Amritsar, though he did not win. He now divides his time between Delhi and Amritsar, continuing to work in the public interest. Ambassador Sandhu's life reflects a commitment to diplomacy, public service, and India's international standing.
