RCCT DIALYSIS PROJECT

20th July 2023

A one of a K.I.N.D. project,

Playing hide and seek, running, spinning on the merry-go-round, or just laughing aloud is not possible for some little ones having kidney problems. Many of these children are in need of dialysis but unfortunately they don't get the opportunity because of lack of facilities. Private hospitals are way too expensive for such prolonged treatments. In short, the children are effectively deprived of their childhood because they do not have the kind of medical facilities needed to recover and get as close to normalcy as they can. That's why our Project at the Government Institute of Child Health, Egmore, provides us with so much satisfaction. Through the consistent, dedicated and tireless efforts of RCCT from 2019-2023, we were able to provide dialysis to little lives with sophisticated equipment that offer treatment with less pain and more comfort.

As chairperson of the Dialysis Project and with the support of my team, I was keen to follow up on the success of our first Dialysis Centre at Retteri where we were treating patients free of cost. Facing and overcoming many challenges posed due to Covid, like, the change of Government and backing-out of a vendor, the opportunity to complete this project, came like a heaven sent. The required infrastructure was in place at the Pediatric Dialysis Center at the Institute of Child Health, a Government hospital. They were looking for the right equipment so they could help young patients and ease the trauma of their families. And so the K.I.N.D. (Kidneys In Need Of Dialysis) project came to being.

Dr.Balaraman, the Chief Nephrologist of Children's Hospital Egmore was of great support in ensuring the process was executed smoothly. 7 dialysis machines including a haemodiafiltration unit, a portable RO, ultrasound and a body composition machine were handed over. The children who undergo dialysis for long hours would use phones to keep themselves entertained. To save them from this harmful radiation we also installed a television. Apart from this we also donated a wheel chair, an examination table, trolley and a cot.

With this project by RCCT, our vision of being able to get children suffering from kidney diseases back on their feet and able to lead a normal life has been made a possibility.

A K.I.N.D. story,

"A little boy aged just 18 months old from Namakkal was accidentally poisoned when he swallowed some pills. The family tried many hospitals close by, to no avail. They then reached out to the Institute of Child Health, Egmore. When they heard that this hospital had equipment that could clean out the poison through haemodiafiltration, they rushed the child here in an ambulance travelling for over 10 hours. The child was intubated and the poison was flushed out after two, five hour sessions. Performing hemofiltration on children less than 10kg is usually challenging. Thanks to this machine donated by RCCT it has actually saving lives every day. Not many private hospitals own this machine and hardly any Government hospitals have it." As narrated by Dr.Balaraman citing one of the many cases helped by haemodiafiltration. RCCT has created a benchmark of sorts through this project which will impact many little lives.

FACTORY VISIT 19th August 2023

Modern automotive ancillary manufacturing facilities consider Quality Control to be a foundational part of their entire production process. The reason is that the facilities can increasingly maximize the volume of products within a small time window. Our factory visit to Devendra autocom pvt ltd. was well aligned to the above statement. The visit was slated for 11am on 19th of August and most of us were on time. After a short introduction to our group leaders and some refreshing snacks and tea we were divided into groups led by some of Devandras staff.

Basically they are into manufacturing of auto ancillaries for heavy vehicles and the defence sector. Devendra autocom is an offshoot of its parent the famed Autolec industries which is now owned by the TVS group, founded in 1965 by Mr. Vasudevan, our member Rtn Rashmi's father. The clean and green environment that surrounded the premises and the spotless shop floors were really impressive. We visited all the facilities and had an overview of their online production monitoring including. Thanks to the discipline, passion for work and perfection inculcated by the founder and followed by Mr.Vinodh who is in charge of operations.

We visited the main work floor, feed pump assembly room and fuel filter assembly room. They also have a totally women only run unit! Canteen with subsidized food at Rs.10 per head is run by the management. Would love to go try out some day! My take away from the entire experience can be summed up as:

Devendra autocom follows the 3 principles of :

- 1. Quality in Product;
- 2. Quality in Production; and
- 3. Quality in Ownership.


The visit concluded with a vote of thanks by Ann Shoba.







Gita needs no introduction to our club. Her dedication, commitment and hard work as editor of Towers Times for many years not only got us the Gold Award for the Best Bulletin in the District in the year 2000-01 but many more awards. Under her guidance, each bulletin that was released was comprehensive and well laid out. Even though Rtn Sanjay and Gita left RCCT on 30 June 2023, when we requested her to share her experiences as Editor,(former Ann) Dr. Gita immediately obliged.

In the second year of the club, Sanjay was Joint Secretary and one of the responsibilities of the Joint Secretary was to handle the bulletin. I was wondering how to go about doing the layout of the bulletin. Padmaja helped me out. She came home and taught Sanjay and me how to use Page Maker. Sanjay handled first bulletin and after that, I took over. We had the masthead designed for the entire year; stored the sheets with the printer. I used to depute people to write articles, collect them, edit them and fit them all into the existing format. I couldn't play around much with the layout since everything had to be done on a pre-printed masthead! The bulletin could only be in single colour, so we used as much colour as possible while designing the masthead. This year ended with us getting the third place for the bulletin among clubs with less than 40 members. The next year, I took over formally as the editor and put my own procedure in place. Since the bulletin had to come out once in two weeks, I had the general RI articles in place well ahead of time. The district and club events were collected. The bulletin had to be four pages, not more, not less! The president's message, one RI column, one district column, all club events, announcements, achievements, know your Rotarian, and an annets column. The articles would be ready on Tuesday (I would write them if they weren't ;) do the editing and layout on Wednesday, choose only the best possible photos (take the originals) and go personally to the printer's office to hand over a floppy disk by Wednesday afternoon. The existing printer was not doing a great job, so Sanjay and I found a printer close to home. The calls to the printer would start at 8 on Thursday. If it was not ready by 10, I would go and sit in his office and make sure it got printed before lunch. Then, go back in the evening, get them trimmed and folded, and take the bundles with me in time for the meeting. The physical copies were distributed to all those who attended the meeting and posted to the rest of the members and District officials. A year flew by and we ended up with the best bulletin award (I even remember what I wore to collect the award, it was such a big thing;) After this year, there was a lot of upgradation in the available software and Paddy was there to take care of the layout, so I didn't have to deal with that anymore! Off and on I took on the responsibility for the bulletin and handled it for another 7 or 8 years. We gradually moved on to a hybrid bulletin where the members would get e-bulletins and the District officials would get physical copies; eventually, we completely shifted to e-bulletins where we had (have) the freedom to play around with the layout, the number of pages, and best of all, it was in technicolour and we could put in as many photographs as we wanted; My high point as bulletin editor was in Rajie's year, when the then DG Rtn Olivannan said in his speech that Towers Times was the only bulletin he had seen that year which consistently had ABSOLUTELY NO ERRORS and had covered the Club, the District and the RI news! I'll sign off on that note with fond memories of 25 years in RCCT! All the best to the current and future editors of the Towers Times!
