










FOOTWEAR DISTRIBUTION PROJECT AT OLCOTT MEMORIAL SCHOOL

PROJECT AT KRMM SCHOOL

The youth service avenue of RC Chennai Towers conducted a very important and relevant project at KRMM School on February 9, 2024. The subject discussed was 'effective ways to overcome exam time anxiety'.

Rtn Sapna, the youth service director, shares her personal experience of exam fear and anxiety. "As a child I always waited to complete my academics as soon as possible, just to get over the exams and its related experience. Not realising that this would be a constant battle that I would have to face even during my career. In the banking sector, one has to periodically prepare and appear for exams in order to move to the next level. The very word 'EXAM' and to pass it as a criteria to get a designated role at my work place brought back traumatic childhood memories of final term exams and the fear of failure".

The anxiety related to exams and being judged is build at very early stage of life. This was the reason for us wanting to conduct this session, especially since exams are around the corner.

We were lucky to be able to make a difference by conducting the session on "exam anxiety and stress management" and offer some insights on increasing memory power. Ann Archana for this purpose, helped bring in Mrs Suvashree, who is a certified counsellor/trainer and parenting coach. She made the session so easy and comfortable for the kids. We enjoyed our session teaching the kids through a fun learning and interactive module. The principal of KRMM School, despite her busy schedule, ensured the 10 std students were given an opportunity to attend this session.

We hope we have made a small difference in each of those young minds. Encouraging them to be confident and develop themselves to be great leaders with no fear or barriers in their path of success.









RYLA YOUTH SERVICE PROJECT AT FARM GURU

Nestled in the tranquil embrace of nature, Farm Guru, situated in Sholavaram, became the epicenter of transformative leadership on February 24, 2024. Organized by the dynamic collaboration of the Rotary Club of Chennai Towers and the Rotaract Club of Kumararani Meena Muthiah College of Arts and Science, under the able guidance and mentorship of Rtn Sapna Dev Sriram our youth service director a Rotarian with a vision, the day unfolded as an enriching journey of self-discovery and agricultural enlightenment.

The event, aptly named RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Award), aimed to unfurl the latent potential of young minds, setting them on a path of empowerment and growth. With 49 enthusiastic students from Kumararani Meena Muthiah College of Arts and Science, accompanied by three dedicated faculty members, the day commenced at 10 am, promising a day filled with learning and adventure.

The stage was set with distinguished guests: Mr. Unni Nair, a seasoned veteran with 14 years in the Indian Air Force, and Mr. Sesha Sai, a philanthropist and nature enthusiast. Unni Nair sir, a multifaceted personality, captivated the audience with his tales of valor and adventure, inspiring them to aim for the skies, both literally and metaphorically.

Unni Nair sir, a renowned motivational speaker, kicked off the event with an inspiring introduction. He shared anecdotes from his journey, highlighting his prowess as both a singer and dancer. Through his engaging words, he effortlessly drew the attention of every student, initiating the session with dancing steps and musical performances by the students themselves, showcasing a diverse mix of languages including Hindi, English, and Tamil. Nair's impactful words resonated deeply, urging everyone to give their utmost effort. When a curious student asked about his age, he humorously replied that while his actual age may be 60, his physical age felt like 25, and his mental age was a youthful 16. With this playful exchange, the session concluded, leaving the audience inspired and uplifted.

Following this invigorating session, Rtn Sesha Sai took the reins, delving into the realm of agriculture and rural entrepreneurship. With a wealth of experience in corporate and teaching domains, Sai sir elucidated the importance of sustainable farming practices and the need to bridge the urban-rural divide. He urged the audience to think critically and act decisively to tackle the challenges being faced by the agricultural sector. With a deep reverence for the hard work of farmers, he emphasized the critical importance of agriculture. Through his insightful discourse, he instilled in the audience the values of strength, resilience, and positivity as pathways to success. He highlighted four key issues faced by farmers and proposed practical remedies. First, he addressed the water scarcity problem by advocating for drip irrigation techniques. Next, he tackled the issue of weed management by advocating for a six-foot gap between plants. Thirdly, he proposed the use of bleaching neem oil on plants to combat both fertilizer depletion and pest infestations. Lastly, Sai sir highlighted the significance of organic farming, providing a clear and comprehensive understanding of its principles. Through his enlightening presentation, Rtn Sesha Sai sir left the audience empowered with newfound knowledge and a renewed appreciation for the art and science of agriculture.

The final segment of the day was led by Mrs. Archana Krishnakumar, who delved into the concept of selflove and its significance in personal growth. Through a thought-provoking exercise of writing love letters to oneself, she encouraged participants to embrace their strengths and imperfections, fostering a culture of selfcompassion and acceptance.

The event was concluded by a feed back session and summarization of key take aways lead by Rtn Sapna. Last but not the least our principal mam made her presence and felicitated all our speakers and members of our parent club RCCT. We thank Rnt Ajoy and Rtn Krishnakumar, for their presence at the farm.

As the sun began its descent, the real work began – hands-on experience at Farm Guru. Under the guidance of seasoned farmers, students immersed themselves in various agricultural activities, from soil preparation to seed sowing, experiencing the toil and triumph of rural life firsthand. The day culminated with a sense of accomplishment and newfound appreciation for the tireless efforts of farmers in feeding the nation.

In retrospect, "A Day at Farm Guru" transcended the boundaries of a mere event, evolving into a journey of discovery, learning, and camaraderie. Through the collective efforts of organizers, guests, and participants, it not only imparted valuable lessons in leadership and agriculture but also fostered a sense of community and stewardship towards the environment. 








BOOK DONATION AT AVVAI HOME

FAB FEB FELLOWSHIP



JOINT SPEAKER MEETING AT GRT HOTEL

A joint meeting was held at the GRT hotel, Chennai on February 29, 2024, on a very interesting and thought provoking subject of "balance between national security and the humanitarian concerns for refugees protection". The speaker for the evening was Ms. Areti Sianni, Chief of Mission, UNHCR India and the Maldives. The evening began with the collaring of the presidents of the three clubs Rtn Binoy of RC Chennai Towers, Rtn Kavitha of RC T Nagar and Rtn Sri Sai of RC Chennai UTSAV. This was followed by a soulful invocation, this was followed by an introductory speech by Secy Rtn Jayshree and a very insightful speech by the speaker Ms Areti Sianni.

Ms Areti Sianni has worked for thirty years on refugee protection at country, regional and headquarters levels in Europe, the Middle East and North Africa, and Asia-Pacific regions including in emergency operations. Prior to taking her assignment in India, she served as Assistant Representative (Protection) with UNHCR, Yemen and as Assistant Chief of Mission (Protection) with UNHCR Libya. Ms Areti has also served as Senior Protection Adviser with UNHCR's Regional Bureau for the Middle East and North Africa and in a policy advisory capacity on responses to mixed population flows in various countries.

From 2012-2014, she was seconded to the Bali Process Regional Support Office where she advised on protection-sensitive responses to mixed movements of refugees and migrants including by sea. Before joining UNHCR in 2008, Ms Areti worked as an independent consultant as well as with foundations and International NGOs including the European Council on Refugees and Exiles, Amnesty International - International Secretariat and the Barrow Cadbury Trust. She speaks Greek, English, French and Spanish.

Ms Areti was accompanied by her dynamic team comprising of Mr. Sunod Jacob - Asst govt Liaison Officer - UNHCR New Delhi, Mr Satchirhananda Valan Michael - Head of Field Office, UNHCR Chennai's, Mr Asir Thanasingh - UNHCR Chennai, Ms Shwetha Selvan - UNHCR Chennai, Mr Siva Sai Jeevanantham - UNHCR Chennai and Ms Srividhya Mahesh - UNHCR Chennai.

Ms Areti talked about the plight of refugees all over the world and how different countries have formed policies to protect and support them. She spoke about the pathetic state in which they are transported, sometimes abandoned midway and in the bargain many lives are lost. She also mentioned that in most cases, only about 1% of people are allowed back into their own country!

Basically these are people who are escaping from violence, human rights violations or conflict ridden countries, seeking asylum in various parts of the world. UNHRC was set up in 1950 with the mandate of addressing resettlement issues of displaced people. They are one of the main humanitarian organisations in Sudan, Afghanistan, Congo, Ukraine and 135 other countries. They help in refugee's rights, equality before the law, non-discrimination and protection from arbitrary detention.

She said India has welcomes and tries to help refugees who have fled from neighboring countries like Bangladesh, Afghanistan and Sri Lanka. Tamil Nadu is home to around 54 thousand Sri Lankan refugees who are housed in camps. They are provided with basic humanitarian assistance and also provided with education. Mr. Michael said that initially, special schools were provided for the children of refugees but gradually these schools were merged with other regular Government schools in the areas. He spoke about the stigma attached to the word 'refugee' and how difficult it is for them to enter mainstream jobs. He urged for a change of perspective and mindset, in order to make a positive impact.

Ms Areti, acknowledged and thanked the Rotary organisation for their support and gave due recognition for their contribution in helping refugees in India. At the end of her speech, she addressed a Q&A session, where she answered interesting questions and busted some common myths and misconceptions about refugees. The nation anthem was sung, concluding the formal meeting. This was followed by fellowship and a sumptuous dinner. The air was filled with friendly banter and it was a great platform for informal discussions and forging of new friendships. It was a pleasant experience to be able to share a common platform with other fellow clubs, hope to see more of such interesting initiatives in the future.




