SMART VISION GLASSES PROJECT

Objective: Improving quality of life for the visually challenged

Rotary Club of Chennai Towers has been spearheading medical projects such as setting up fully fitted out dialysis centers in localities that don't have access to such services and also conducting health camps and supporting medical centers, among other projects. When there was an opportunity to address the issues of those with uncorrectable blindness in India, we explored the solution offered. In this case it was a smart vision device - a tried and tested product that could be fitted to glasses, and would provide assistance in the following ways:

- * Offers voice assistance to help them recognize objects in its view such as vehicles, obstacles, traffic signals, zebra crossings, furniture, etc.
- * Reads out books, newspapers etc. to them with many language options
- * Helps recognize obstacles within 4m
- * Describes people and recalls once stored
- * Offers Emergency Call on standby.

RCCT, led by President Rtn.Binoy Pillai, supported by Sec Rtn Jayashree, believed the product would help those who had permanently lost their vision, live more independently and with dignity. A committee was formed to assess the efficacy of the product and to identify the beneficiaries while looking for sponsors who could help the project through. Each device is priced at Rs. 30000 + taxes and includes smart vision glass, protective glass pouch, user manual, warranty card, Bluetooth neckband with charging cable, and a headband.

The members of RCCT rose to the occasion and took this project to corporate houses, who were impressed with the features and were keen to partner with us through their CSR wings. Through our donors we collected an amount of over ₹ 1.25 crore, under the able leadership of Fundraising Chair Rtn Anand Krishnan, supported by Treasurer Rtn.Sanjey Ahuja. The project was guided by Project Chair Rtn. Umapathy who, representing the club, coordinated between the vendors, prospective donors and beneficiaries to ensure the project moved smoothly.

A special evening to celebrate the donors was organized at the Taj Connemara with a mellifluous performance by the flautist Manoj. The donors were honored and they distributed glasses to the beneficiaries at the event. We are proud to say that these devices are already making a significant difference in the lives of many visually challenged individuals. We are committed to promoting independence and dignity for all, as we continue to identify and donate the smart vision glasses to deserving beneficiaries.

They helped in organizing the collection and segregation of articles from members. Due to the cyclone Michaung, we had to postpone our event from December 12, 2023 to a new date and venue. Few women were so inspired to see our club members cheerfully doing the sales at the stall and expressed interest in joining our club, exchanging phone numbers with our secretary Rtn Jayashree!

For me the happiest moment was when I met my colleagues, students and their parents after three years, at the fun fest. Infact, the sub staff of school told me they had enjoyed shopping here for their family, for the upcoming Pongal festival instead of going out and spending more money and time outside.

To conclude thrift shopping is not only environmentally friendly but is an essence of sustainability supporting the environment through REUSE and REPURPOSE. Each item purchased is one less item that makes its way into a land fill.


