These glasses serve as the THIRD EYE for the visually challenged. The glasses promote their safety while travelling, help in converting book scripts to audio that facilitates to get equipped with knowledge and information, identify people, and much more. These glasses are chargeable through mobile cords.

The total project is valued at ₹48,00,000, that is made possible through the generous contribution of **Bharat Petroleum Corporation Limited.** 30 beneficiaries received the Smart vision glasses as a part of this MOU between RCME and BPCL in Chennai. The other part of the project are scheduled at Calicut, Coimbatore and Trichy. FINALE-WINGS TO FLY

Rotary Club of Madras East, in collaboration with the Greater Chennai Corporation, has been conducting this program for students across 211 Corporation schools for the last 9 years and this year is the 10th edition of Project "Wings to Fly". The 10th edition of Wings to Fly this year, is about Entrepreneurial skills for teens. "Teenpreneurship" program aims to introduce entrepreneurship to teenagers along with helping them identify their strengths and acquiring basic skills.

The Chairperson for this year is Ann Sudha Raghuraman and CO Chairperson – Ann Haritha Nalluru. Our Knowledge Partner is Miyagi learning Solutions for this year.

A 3 day workshop was conducted in September first week to impart knowledge on the subject matter through a combination of theoretical inputs by qualified experts, audio visuals, group discussions and experience sharing sessions by successful entrepreneurs. After the 3 day workshop, 64 semifinalists were chosen and taken on a field trip to visit two industries, MBI Kits International Perungudi which is into manufacturing test kits which test the amount of lodine in lodised salt. The students also visited Multi vista Global, Kelambakkam - a large printing company.

Based on the field trip, vivas were conducted to select the top 32 students. These 16 teams were mentored to present their business idea on stage to a panel of judges.

December 4th, 2024 the grand final – **Teenpreneurship** challenge held at Vani Mahal, T Nagar where the 16 teams presented their business idea to a panel of judges. And the final 8 Winners were chosen who will be taken on a fully funded educational tour to Singapore in May 2025.

The Rotary Club of Madras East in collaboration with CavinKare Pvt. Ltd., launched on 9 December 2024, Project Vidya Shakti, a CSR project that shall provide education in underserved villages of rural Tamil Nadu.

The implementation partner of this initiative is the Open Mentor Trust, whose objective is to promote and advance the cause of education in the country by continuous skilling. They have been conducting similar projects in Andhra Pradesh, Varanasi District and Arunachal Pradesh. Open Mentor conducts its initiatives under the guidance of IIT Madras and IITM Pravartak Technologies Foundation.

This **CSR project that has been** generously funded by CavinKare Pvt. Ltd. with a contribution of Rs. 20 Lakhs. Under the guidance and oversight of the Rotary Club of Madras East, the project has set up Rural Interaction Centres in 20 villages of Cuddalore and Vellore Districts.

Project Vidya Shakti shall focus on bringing the best teachers to rural students in Classes 5 to 8 using technology.

The Project was launched and inaugurated by **Professor V Kamakoti, Director, IIT Madras**, at the IIT Madras Research Park on 10th December 2024. Professor Kamakoti stated that if India strives to become an academic power house, then developing rural India is the way forward. He also felt that his work would not be complete unless a Rural Interaction Centre is established near every one of the 155,000 Post Offices in India. Project Vidya Shakti is about to go live in early December.



You Quiz, Shewins Education for every girl: An RCME fundraiser The fundraiser which brought together quizzing aficionados and trivia masters together for a fun evening dedicated the proceeds of the event to support the cause of girl child education. The funds raised through ticket sales and event sponsorship supported the development of schools and programs for girls to pursue their education.

The Rotary Club of Madras East, in collaboration with the Institute of Thoracic Medicine (ITM), Chetpet, and the Greater Chennai Traffic Police, has launched **Project Swaasam—a 90-day initiative** dedicated to safeguarding the lung health of Chennai's traffic police force.

Recognizing the need for preventive healthcare, the Institute of Thoracic Medicine has taken the altruistic step of offering free TB screening and Pulmonary Function Tests (PFTs) to all 3,000 traffic police personnel. The project was formally inaugurated on January 29, 2025, at the Institute of Thoracic Medicine, by Shri R. Sudhakar IPS, Additional Commissioner of Police, Greater Chennai Traffic Police.

President Rtn Muthu of Rotary club of Madras East was the ideator of this humongous project. The program includes daily screenings and awareness sessions, with educational materials provided in the regional language for better comprehension.

A dedicated healthcare team from ITM, supported by Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Madras East who visit the sessions to create awareness, ensures seamless execution. To date, nearly 280 traffic police personnel have undergone screening, marking a significant step toward improved lung health for our city's frontline enforcers.

RECOGNISING MEDICAL EXCELLENCE DR. KVT AWARDS

The Rotary Club of Madras East (RCME), chartered 40 years ago, stands as a premier Rotary institution known for its impactful and sustainable service projects. The club also has instituted a number of prestigious awards to recognize excellence in multiple disciplines. Amongst them, is the Dr. K V Thiruvengadam award which celebrates individuals who have made extraordinary contributions to the field of medicine. This award, instituted in 2006 and sponsored by Kauvery Hospitals, pays tribute to the legacy of Dr. K V Thiruvengadam (Dr. KVT)- a renowned medical professional and educator whose dedication to knowledge advancing medical and compassionate patient care remains unparalleled.

This year, the Dr. K V Thiruvengadam Award is **presented to Aravind Eye Care System**, founded in 1976 by Dr. Govindappa Venkataswamy as an 11-bed eye care clinic. Guided by the mission to "eliminate needless blindness," Aravind has set global benchmarks in providing high-quality, affordable eye care to all.

Aravind Eye Care System has handled over 84.5 million outpatient visits, performed more than 9.4 million eye surgeries, expanded to 14 eye hospitals, 7 outpatient examination centres, and 114 primary eye care facilities. The centre conducts over 7.2 lakh eye surgeries annually.

The award ceremony held on 4th February, 2025 was presided by Thiru Mangat Ram Sharma, IAS, Additional Chief Secretary to Government, Public Works Department, Government of Tamil Nadu. Rtn. N.S. Saravanan, District Governor (2024-25), Rotary International District 3234, was the Guest of Honour.

Through this prestigious recognition, Rotary Club of Madras East continues to celebrate and support those who dedicate their lives to transforming healthcare and uplifting communities.

WEDNESDAYS WITH ROTARY ALL ABOUT AI

At our latest Rotary Club of Madras East meeting, we had the pleasure of listening to an insightful session on AI in Business: Simple Solutions for Big Impact. The speaker, Mr. Premkumar Kora captivated the audience from the very beginning with a relatable example of a small Chennai retailer who used AI-driven sales predictions to optimize inventory, reducing waste and increasing profits. It was a simple yet powerful reminder that AI is not just for tech giants—it's a gamechanger for businesses of all sizes.

Breaking down AI in the simplest terms, the speaker explained, "AI is simply technology that helps machines think, learn, and make decisions like humans, but faster." The most engaging part of the session was the exploration of practical AI applications. We learned how chatbots are revolutionizing customer service, predictive analytics is helping businesses make smarter decisions, and Al-driven personalized marketing is enhancing customer experiences.

One of the key concerns addressed was the misconception that AI is expensive or too complex. We were surprised to learn that many AI tools are either free or highly affordable, and most don't require any technical expertise to implement.

The discussion on ethics and data privacy also stood out, reminding us that responsible AI usage is just as important as its adoption.

The session concluded with a thoughtprovoking call to action: Try one Al tool this month and see the impact for yourself. The final words left a lasting impression—"The question is not whether Al will impact your business; it's whether you'll embrace it before your competition does."

I usually end a heavy lunch with a hot cuppa embracing the yet unconfirmed law of science caffeine promotes that digestion. The strains of someone elaborating the alaap on Khambodi was muted through those padded doors except occasionally when the doors got opened to allow someone escape for the needed nourishment.

I sat through the performance for the next hour mostly was lingering
