An evening that brought together every RCMEian and their family closer to the community. Truly music that played from the hearts.






MISSION TO EN-VISION: PROJECT ARCORE

HEALING TINY HEARTS

In a determined effort to make a profound impact on the lives of underprivileged families with babies born with heart anomalies, The Rotary Club of Madras East, in collaboration with LTIMindtree and Apollo Children's Hospital, launched the fourth edition of Project Healing Tiny Hearts.

Over the past three years, Project Healing Tiny Hearts has identified and treated 1500 babies born with heart anomalies through rural camps organized by RCME and Apollo Children's Hospital. These babies, once facing uncertain futures, now lead normal, healthy lives thanks to this initiative.

The inauguration of the fourth phase of this noble project at Apollo Children's Hospital was celebrated on July 2nd, 2024. The event was highlighted by the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Rotary Club of Madras East and LTIMindtree to perform 750 paediatric heart surgeries across the country. The project with a contribution of Rs.3 crores by our CSR partner, LTIMindtree has now enabled more tiny hearts to beat across India at Apollo Children's hospital locations in Chennai, Bhopal and Guwahati.

The MOU signing was graced by distinguished guests including Mr. Paneesh Rao, Chief Sustainability Officer of LTIMindtree Foundation, Ms. Preetha Reddy, Vice Chairperson of Apollo Children's Hospital and Rtn. Muthu P, President of the Rotary Club of Madras East.

Rtn. N.S. Saravanan, District Governor RID 3234, members from RCME, LTIMindtree and Apollo Children's Hospital Ms. Preetha Reddy, Vice chairperson of Apollo Children's Hospital said "pure intent to serve is the root cause for the project." While Paneesh Rao, Chief sustainability officer, LTIMindtree Foundation assured the number of surgeries will rapidly grow from 750 to greater heights, through the dedication shown by the doctors of Apollo. Rtn Muthu P, President of Rotary club of Madras East also added this is one of the best projects of the Rotary year.

This partnership aims to continue providing critical medical interventions for children born with heart anomalies, ensuring they receive the necessary treatment to lead healthy lives.





JAPAN "DARSHAN" - TRAVELOGUE

Japan is a beautiful country, serene, clean and full of amazing photo opportunities. When we decided we were going to go on a vacation to Japan, the first thing I packed up was my camera. That was all I needed. Capturing the beauty of this country in just a few pictures was going to be difficult. But I was going to do my best.

We landed in the land of the rising sun, as it rose over Osaka. The plan was to spend the day in Kyoto visiting the various castles and temples there. The Osaka airport was a huge, shiny building right by the sea and it was quite the sight after a long red-eye from Kuala Lumpur. Once we got past immigration, we went to collect our bags. Surprisingly, all our bags came in no time at all and we were off to Kyoto.

Kyoto: The Nijo castle is an extremely serene and beautiful place with lush greenery, canals and a breathtaking view of Kyoto. It's also a place that shows the duality of Japan. The Nijo castle is a beautiful place showcasing Japan's storied culture, where one would find kimono-clad women having a peaceful walk. But, just a few kilometres away at the railway station, the scene is completely different. Everywhere you look, there are Japanese businessmen in black suits running to their trains.



The shift in scene is quite contrasting, you see everyone looking into their phones while going home after a long day's work. There was just one major attraction that was open 24/7 in Kyoto. And this was the Fushimi Inari shrine. Fushimi Inari is a shinto shrine known for the hundreds of bright red gates - tori gates.

On our second day before we left for Nagoya, we visited the Kiyomizu Dera temple, which is supposed to have one of the best views of the Kyoto skyline. The sights there are nothing short of breathtaking and a trip to Kyoto isn't complete without it.



To Nagoya by Shinkansen: The journey to Nagoya took just about half an hour despite the 130 km distance thanks to the blistering fast Shinkansen. The only reason we were in Nagoya was because I had convinced my parents to take me to the Toyota Kaikan Museum, which is about an hour away from Nagoya. The Kaikan museum was less of a museum and more of a massive showroom where Toyota showcases their latest and greatest. After that detour, we were back to a normal, tourist itinerary with a stop at the SC Maglev and Rail museum opposite Legoland Japan.

TOKYO Tokyo was AMAZING. The streets of Akihabara at night are spectacular and the Yodobashi Akiba store is just mind-blowing. Yodobashi's Akihabara store is the biggest electronics store in the world with over 7 floors filled with various types of gadgets and tech. It's massive and you could really spend an entire day there looking at all the unique things there.

On our last day, I got a new camera and I was really excited to take photos with it. That night when I was at the top of the Tokyo Skytree, I took out my camera and I set it up to take a photo of the Tokyo Skyline. Little did I know, my camera's auto high ISO setting resulted in horrible looking dots and green fringing in my photos. I was devastated. Luckily though, in this day and age of AI, I was able to get rid of these artefacts and get a good photo of the eye-catching Tokyo tower. I was happy again!

My trip to Japan was probably the best one I've ever had and I'd love to visit this magnificent country again.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT: CONVERSATIONS WITH MS. GAUTAMI TADIMALLA

The roads from Ambattur and Akkarai met at Kottupuram on a balmy Thursday afternoon. The scrumptious spread on the table provided the ideal backdrop to a healthy exchange of experiences on working towards community development empowerment. The lunch was and hosted by Senior members of Rotary club of Madras East - Rtn (PP) Mr. S.S. Rajasekar. Rtn (PP). Mr. P.E. Ramkrishnan and Rtn Anuradha Prashant engaged in conversations with Ms. Gautami Tadimalla, founder - Life Again Foundation (LAF) on making a difference by bringing in positive change.

Rtn. Anu Prashant (AP): Often, I wonder, how does an individual's zeal to contribute to society integrate with a voluntary



organisation's vision? Do organisations such as Rotary and Life Again taste success in fulfilling individual aspirations of service?

Ms. Gautami Tadimalla (GT): It takes a community to empower another. Organisations sometimes confuse the purpose of existence by giving a basket of fruits, and thereby stymieing the possibility of growing a fruit orchard. But if sustained growth and development must be holistic and stand the test of time, what one needs is empowerment and not mere freebies.

Rtn. Rajasekar and Rtn. P.E. Ram: True. Our experiences of working on projects like Annai Satya Nagar, Winners Bakery, vocational centres, Sarvodaya and Tiny Hearts are a testimony to that. The common thread tying these projects is the underlying fact of creating a self-awareness amongst the beneficiaries and bringing them together as a community working towards a holistic change.

Rtn. P.E. Ram: Looking ahead, what do you think can be the areas where community engagement can bring a difference?

GT: My observations are based on experiences through travel and interactions with citizens across rural Tamil Nadu. The 3 pillars of development, especially amongst women, that need voluntary organisational support are education, health and employment. Beyond policymakers and governmental machinery, organisations should direct individual and corporate funding in creating awareness and sparking the road to change. LAF is in the process of creating a repository of data and using the power of technology to enable transformation by easing the access to relevant information.

Rtn. Rajasekar and GT: The possibilities of rural development are immense. There is wealth in waste, power in vocational education and growth in self-sustained models in the largest sector – agriculture. Designing and implementing an integrated model of community development holds the key to transforming lives by building positive relationships.

Rtn. AP: So, where do you think organisations such as RCME and LAF can come together to make a difference?

GT and **Rtn. Rajasekar** and **Rtn. P.E. Ram** Adopting clusters or villages, establishing and supporting vocational centres, empowering women to be the fulcrum of societal change and using sports as a tool to bring a community together are some of the areas where the two voluntary organisations could collaborate.

The meeting ended on a sweet note with desserts and a promising future of individual visions coming together for a common purpose.

LETTERS FROM GERMANY: A NOTE OF APPRECIATION FROM THE ROTARY CLUB WILHELMSHAVEN-FRIESLAND

The Rotary Club Wilhelmshaven-Friesland (WHV-FRI) has been committed to improving educational opportunities in Namibia for many years. All our members are always happy to see with how much enthusiasm and commitment the Namibia-Team is using our regular donations and to see how the help is received by the school children. With a vision to work with Indian schools, the club's search for a partner club led to The Rotary Club Madras East (RCME) in Chennai, Tamil Nadu.

Thus the new Global Grant "Sarada Vidyalaya – Smart Education Together" (SV-SET) was born. Sarada Vidyalaya is a girls' high school in a district of Chennai, where even less privileged girls can enjoy a good education. The three project modules proposed included "smart classrooms" for multimedia and digital teaching to improve learning standards; Improved building safety by installing fire hoses; and finally, renewable energy management through the installation of a solar panel system on the roof. Training for teachers is also being considered to underline the sustainability of the measures.

In January 2023 the Foundation Chairman of the Rotary Club WHV-FRI had the opportunity to visit the School Sarada Vidyalaya on a Saturday and spend a very impressive time at the school. The whole school class, the principal, the teachers and delegates from RCME were explaining the smart classroom facilities and presented the way how smart training works while the German Representative used the opportunity to use the tool for a spontaneous talk about Europe and Germany highlighting the importance of good education.

This was certainly not the last project that was set up together with friends in India and the Rotary Club WHV-FRI is proud and happy to have expanded its international focus.

Rajasekar Pachai, the first Tamil civilian to climb Mount Everest, shared his remarkable journey in an inspiring talk with rotarians. Born into a fishing community, Rajasekar's playground was the sea. His multifaceted background in competitive sports eventually led him to seek the ultimate challenge: climbing the highest peak in the world, Mount Everest.

Early Life and Motivation

Rajasekar's growing up years instilled in him a love for adventure and resilience. His diverse experience in various sports honed his physical and mental endurance. However, he yearned for a challenge that would push him to his limits. The towering heights of Mount Everest became his goal, embodying the pinnacle of human endeavour and determination.

The Rotary Club of Madras East looks forward to hosting similar events in the future, continuing to foster a spirit of learning and community engagement.






FELLOWSHIPS - TEMPLE TRAILS: WALKING THROUGH HISTORY AND HERITAGE




EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES - PROJECT SARVODAYA

The Rotary Club of Madras East (RCME) has embarked on a transformative initiative called "Project Sarvodaya," which translates from Sanskrit to mean "upliftment of all."

At the heart of this initiative is a collective commitment to the holistic development of a cluster of villages near Madhuranthakam. The ethos of Sarvodaya centers around understanding the nuanced needs of the community, transcending a superficial analysis.



the initiation of this collaboration. During this period, RCME will serve as the anchor and principal organization, providing the necessary financial support, leadership, and guidance to ensure the successful implementation resulting in an enduring impact. 3 projects were inaugurated under Sarvodaya in August 2024.

Project 1: RO plant in Murukencheri village | Inauguration: 3rd August 2024.

The RO plant has been placed at Murukencheri village comprising of 180 families (480 persons). It will also support the adjoining villages of Valpirai and Munoothikuppam, where 250 families with 650 people reside. In all, this project aims to service 3 Villages with 1000+ members with its 1000 LHP capacity and can run for 7.5 hrs/day



Project 2: Scholarship program | Inauguration: 10th August 2024

This program aims to empower and support college students in the village cluster. Finance assistance to 30 college students from 5 panchayats. Apart from financial assistance, there will be monthly training session aimed at enhancing life and employment skills. The program will also deliver an annual camp for networking, mentorship and skill building activities.

Project 3: Tailoring Training cum Production center at Vilvarayanallur | Inauguration: 10th August 2024

The initiative aims to train 25 beneficiaries in a 6-month course, equipping them with essential skills in sewing machine operation, jute and cloth bag making, garment production, self-stitching techniques, and cloth pads manufacturing. Upon completion, participants will have the opportunity to either seek employment or establish their own production units fostering their economic independence. We are looking to start the first batch soon and look forward to financial support to enable this.



CELEBRATING REVOLUTIONARY EXCELLENCE: Dr. M.S. SWAMINATHAN AWARD

The Dr. M.S. Swaminathan Award for Environment Protection 2024 was held on Thursday, August 8th, 2024, at the Rain Tree hotel, St. Mary's Road, Chennai. The award is instituted by the Rotary Club of Madras East (RCME) in the name of our Honorary Member and India's most acclaimed Agricultural Scientist, Dr. M.S. Swaminathan. The award is presented to either an individual, company or NGO who have contributed, either directly or indirectly, to heightening environmental protection, sustainable development and awareness, in any part of the world.



The awardee this year was Padmashri Dr. Anant Darshan Shankar. Our awardee is a pioneer in the path of revitalising Indian medicinal heritage. He is the Chairman of the Indian Institute of Ayurveda and Integrative Medicine, Managing Trustee of Foundation for Revitalization of Local Health Traditions (FRLHT) Founder-Vice Chancellor – The University of Trans-Disciplinary Health Sciences and Technology. He is a recipient of several national and international awards notably, the Norman Borlaug Award (1998) for contributions to conservation of wild populations of medicinal plants, first Indian citizen to receive Columbia University's International Award (2003) for Complementary and Alternative Medicine, and in 2011, Padma Shri by the Govt. of India in recognition of his pioneering work in promoting integrative health sciences.

The award was presented by the Chief Guest, Hon'ble Mr. Justice Senthil Kumar Ramamoorthy and the awardee was felicitated by Dr. Soumya Swaminathan. RCME thanks CavinKare Pvt. Ltd. for their support in sponsoring the award.



TERRY FOX RUN

"Even if I don't finish, we need others to continue. It's got to keep going without me" - Terry Fox

About the Run: This run is to support the cause of Cancer Research as well as to create awareness on cancer on early detection and intervention. **Terrance Stanley 'Terry' Fox** (July 28, 1958 – June 28, 1981) was a Canadian athlete & cancer activist. He became famous for the "'Marathon of Hope" - a cross country run through Canada's Atlantic Provinces for 143 days and 5,373 kilometers, to raise money for cancer research, which he ran with a prosthetic leg. Since then the Terry Fox run has been organized annually to celebrate human spirit and support cancer research in 600 cities in 53 countries.

Terry Fox of Canada inspired Akash Dube of India and Akash brought this run to Chennai in 2009. Although Akash isn't with us today, his family has been championing the cause along with Rotary Club of Madras East year on year.

About this year's event.

This year we had 2 categories - 3 km / 6 km run or walk, to suit all age groups. The Registration for the run was FREE, with an option to make voluntary donations. **'NO MATTER WHAT**' T-shirts at a nominal cost, the proceeds of which will go towards Cancer Research work at the Adyar Cancer Institute, Chennai. We organised a finisher medal for all the participants to take back memories of the event and proudly support the cause.

The event was held on Sunday 18th August 2024, at Olcott Memorial School, Besant Nagar Chennai, Lt. Gen Karanbir Singh Brar, General Officer Commanding (GOC) of Dakshin Bharat Area, Chennai was the chief guest and Rtn. J Sridhar, Past District Governor, Rotary International District 3234, Ms. Gautami, Actor and Founder Life Again Foundation, Dr. E Hemanth Raj, Executive Vice Chairman, Adyar Cancer Institute and Mrs. Sujatha Dube, Mother of Mr. Akash Dube, was Guest of Honor. Mr. Rajasekar Pachai, First Tamil civilian to reach the summit of Mount Everest and Mrs. Neerja Malik, Cancer Counseller and Motivational Speaker, flagged off the runs, in the august presence of the President of RCME, Rtn. Muthu P and Secretary Rtn. Ravi Venkataramani.

The popularity of the run has encouraged corporates to make it their own HR activity for a social cause. We had at least 12 corporates who have registered their employees from 50 to 1000 in numbers. Many individuals and corporates came forward to donate voluntarily for the Nobel cause. Overall, about 3500 people participated in the event and nearly Rs. 20 lakhs collected through this event.
