



The Dean of ICAT inspiring words highlight the importance of combining creativity with commitment, encouraging students to continue exploring and learning.
























Kumbhabhishegam of Ramakrishna Mutt in Salem

We are very happy to share with you in August, a total of 6 students visited the center, with 2 new memberships added. During the month, 1,300 pages were scanned and 924 pages were voice recorded. Additionally, 8 GB of data was copied to pen drives, and 9 GB of content was uploaded and shared with students via drive.

Four books were successfully converted into e-pub format, including TN TRB-Assistant Prof-GK Polity & Governance (110 pages, English, 5,843 words), The Neo-Classical Age (445 pages, English, 3,197 words), Moli Pairpiyeal (140 pages, Tamil, 1,355 words), and Tamilaga Varalaru (1585–1806) (212 pages, Tamil, 5,778 words), totaling 907 pages converted into accesible format for the month.

OASIS@SCHOOLS DIGITAL LITERACY TRAINING

In August month, under digital literacy training,35 students from classes 2 to 8 were trained on various concepts. The sessions covered computer basics, keyboard typing, spelling tools, and short story writing, along with tests, exams, and Independence Day speech and poem typing practice.

Focus on next month will be:

- . To Strengthen Tamil and English typing practice.
- Continue spelling tool exercises for classes 6-8.
- Complete keyboard lessons for classes 2-5.
- Encourage typing of O&A and short stories.
- Conduct revision tests.
- Enhance reading practice for younger students.
- Provide extra support for slow learners.

CLUSTER BASED STREAM TRAINING PROGRAMME!

Cluster training was conducted in Bargur and Hosur blocks of Krishnagiri district. In Hosur, 14 children participated, with two students successfully mastering 150 keyboard shortcut keys.

Overall outcomes included improved phonetic skills, shape recognition, Tamil story writing, and typing accuracy (up to 5 words per minute).

The demonstration received enthusiastic appreciation from KVF staff and parents alike. While the device is still in its early development stage, with the right support and resources, it holds great potential to become a transformative aid for visually impaired persons.

The day concluded on a note of pride, innovation, and inspiration-celebrating not only India's independence but also the creativity, resilience, and aspirations of visually impaired students.

GOVT PRIMARY SCHOOL

PERUNGUDI

On 11th August 2025, an engaging Environmental Education session was conducted at Govt Primary School, Perungudi, reaching a total of 150 enthusiastic students. The session, held in the morning at 11:00 AM and lasting 1 hour 30 minutes, focused on the Importance of Fauna & Animal Rights.

The session included both theory and practical activities, with the highlight being the "Chain of Life" activity, which allowed students to understand the interconnectedness of all living beings. A PowerPoint presentation complemented the practical activity, helping students visualize the concepts effectively.

The session was led by Vedhapriya Ganesan, with facilitation volunteer support from Samaran Thamarai (BCI). Students actively participated through Q&A sessions and quizzes, demonstrating curiosity and eagerness to learn.

From the very beginning, it was clear that these children were curious and eager to learn. Their questions ranged from simple and playful to surprisingly thoughtful, reflecting their natural inquisitiveness and willingness to engage with the world around them.

The afternoon session, held from 2:00 PM to 3:30 PM, combined theory and practice to create a truly immersive learning experience. The highlight was the "Chain of Life" activity, where students discovered how every living creature, big or small, is interconnected within the ecosystem. A vibrant PowerPoint presentation complemented the activity, helping the children visualize complex concepts in a fun and memorable way.



WATER IS GOLD, DON'T LET IT FOLD

The session at Govt Primary School,
Thoraipakkam on 8th August 2025 was a
whirlwind of excitement and discovery for 50
young students. As soon as the PowerPoint
presentation began, showing the amazing
variety of species from peacocks and tigers to
dogs and cats the children erupted with joy,
pointing and shouting, "Hey, this is a peacock!"
or "Look, it's a tiger!" Their enthusiasm mirrored
what one might see if they were experiencing
these animals in real life.

The excitement peaked during the snake video, where some students were a little cautious, while others were thrilled, expressing a desire to interact with animals and learn more firsthand. Many shared that at home, parents often hesitate to allow close interaction with animals, so these sessions offered a rare and valuable opportunity for hands-on learning and curiosity-driven exploration.



SAY NO TO PLASTIC, SAY YES TO PLANET

During the "Chain of Life" and food web activities, the children fully immersed themselves, playfully shouting, "I will eat you!" as they acted out the predator-prey relationships like a fish being eaten by a bird or a snake by another predator. The session was alive with laughter, excitement, and learning, as students eagerly shared newfound knowledge with their classmates, explaining concepts to those who hadn't fully understood earlier.

It was inspiring to see children not only absorbing knowledge but also spreading it, showing genuine interest in biodiversity, animal rights, and the natural world. Moments like these reflect the power of environmental education: sparking curiosity, fostering respect for nature, and nurturing the next generation of eco-conscious citizens.

MOOTAIKARANCHAVADI

On 19th August 2025, In recent sessions at Govt Primary School, Mootaikaranchavadi, students ranging from young children to middle schoolers brought a wide spectrum of curiosity and perspectives to discussions on Fauna, Animal Rights, and Environmental Conservation.

On 14th August 2025, 7 enthusiastic students of the Rotaract Club of Drishti participated in a 4-hour afternoon session at the Blue Cross of India to explore the Importance of Fauna & Animal Rights. Unlike typical sessions, this one was designed specifically for visually impaired students, including those with low vision and complete blindness, offering a hands-on 'touch and feel' experience to connect with animals in a way that words alone cannot achieve.

To make this possible, we partnered with Blue Cross of India, which provided access to community-rescued animals, including cows, cats, dogs, rabbits, birds, donkeys, goats, ants, and pigs. Some of the animals were friendly, while others were naturally wary. The students were able to physically touch and feel the animals, understanding their textures, movements, and emotions—creating a deep emotional and sensory connection. Initially, some students carried walking sticks, which startled a few animals.



USE, REUSE, RECREATE

Through careful explanation and guided interaction, we taught the students why animals might react fearfully, often due to prior negative experiences with strangers, helping them approach animals safely and compassionately.

Once the students understood this, the interactions became joyful and engaging. They played, danced, and spent time bonding with the animals, experiencing first-hand the importance of coexistence and human-animal connection. Discussions reinforced the idea that animals have essential roles in our ecosystems and that positive interaction, rather than fear or harm, is key to building respect and empathy.

By the end of the session, students were visibly excited and emotionally enriched, sharing how much they enjoyed both the practical and theoretical components. The session highlighted that inclusive environmental education, combined with hands-on experiences, can foster empathy, understanding, and a lifelong commitment to protecting animals and the environment.



PRINCE COLLEGE

On 25th August 2025, 400 students of Prince Shri Venkateshwara College of Arts and Science participated in an afternoon session from 2:00 PM to 4:30 PM to explore the Importance of Fauna & Animal Rights, These students have a strong foundation in environmental initiatives, having participated last year in pond creation, cleanup drives, and multiple campus activities aimed at making the college more eco-friendly. This year, their enthusiasm continues, with many students actively supporting environmental advocacy and taking on responsibilities despite other academic commitments.

The session included a dynamic PowerPoint presentation and the "Chain of Life" activity. designed to help students understand the delicate balance between species. ecosystems, and human intervention.

The interactive nature of the session allowed them to experience environmental concepts hands-on, discuss the functioning of wildlife laws, and better understand how humans can positively impact the natural world.

By the end of the session, the campus atmosphere reflected energy, curiosity, and commitment, with students eager to continue their eco-friendly projects and advocate for biodiversity. This session reinforced that when guidance, practical engagement, and enthusiasm come together, college students can become powerful catalysts for environmental awareness and action.

The drive showcased the power of collective action and highlighted how education, engagement, and teamwork can bring lasting positive impact to local biodiversity.






