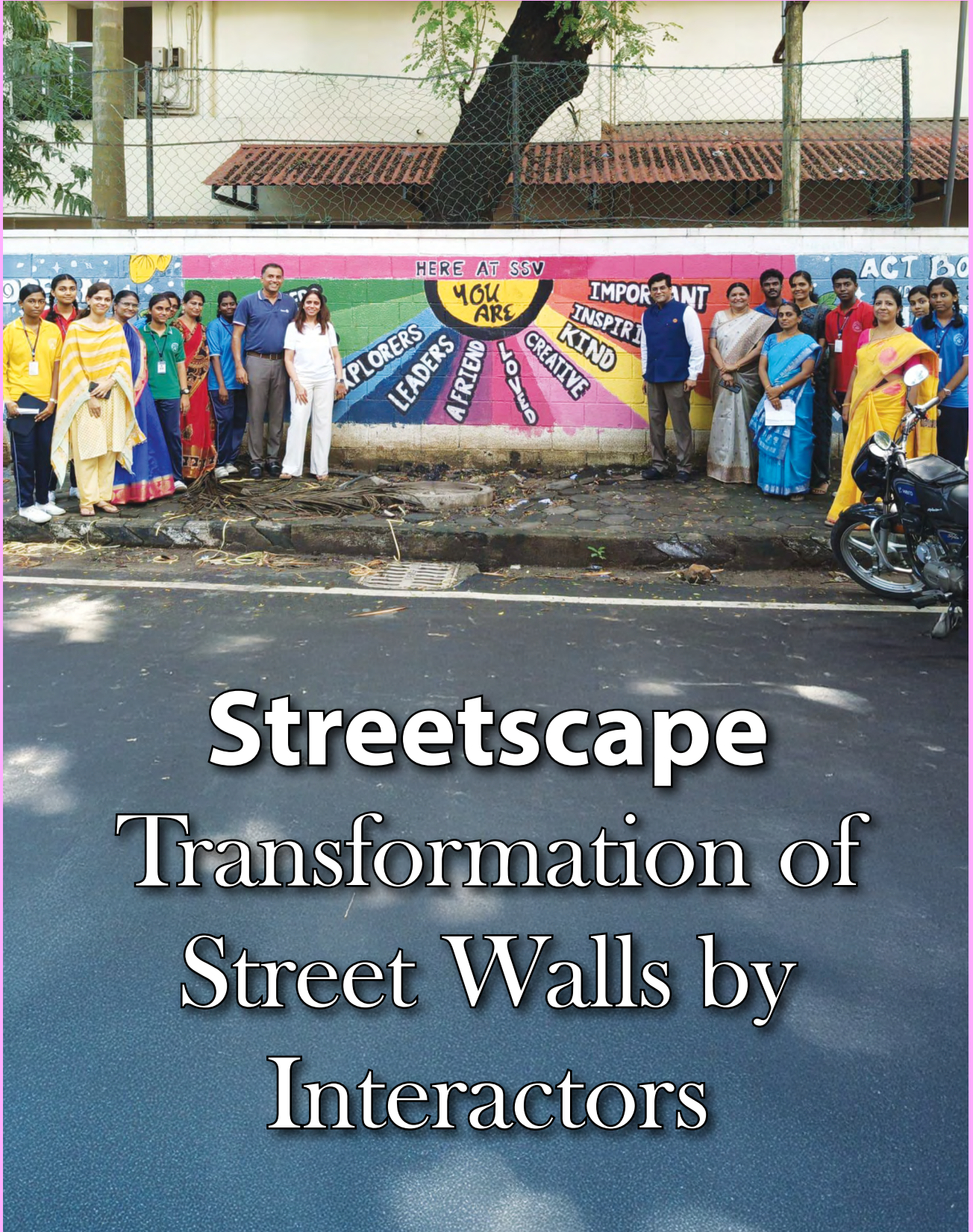

- Recognition through numerous awards, including the Shaurya Chakra and the Army Commander's Commendation Card.

Col. Bala Karthik shared inspiring experiences from his military career, including operational challenges and leadership lessons.

President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna thanked the chief guest, members and guests for their participation.





A Braveheart of the Indian Army Speaks

At the end of the speaker's talk at the RCM meeting on the 19th Nov 2024, I headed towards the exit as always. I had reached the reception of the hotel, but something kept pulling me back. It kept playing on my conscience that I did not shake hands with this personality and I would regret this life long.

I am so glad that I could walk back and personally shake hands with Colonel Bala Karthik and tell him that it was an honour to do so. This was the profound effect the speaker had on the minds of all present at the meeting.

Shaurya Chakra winner Colonel Bala Karthik, born in 1983 in Madurai, is a decorated officer of the Indian Army. It is said about him that, out of the 41 years of his life, he has proudly been in uniform for 31 years, as he has always taken a keen interest in military activities since his childhood days in school.

He completed his training at the National Defence Academy and the Indian Military Academy in 2005 and was commissioned into the Special Forces of the Indian Army. With his grit and determination, he joined the very elite Para Special Forces of the Indian Army at the young age of 21.

He has been passionately involved in the training of Para Commandos in Bangalore and has also had a stint in North-East India. Colonel Bala Karthik is an ace marksman and a sniper. He holds the proud distinction of hoisting the Indian Flag at the South Pole at -50°C.

Colonel Bala Karthik described the Special Forces as a part of the Indian Army that has unconventional

warfare capabilities. It is trained for special operations and receives training in highly specialised tactical equipment. As it is involved in many clandestine and high-risk operations, the unit's visibility is low, but the risk exposure is proportionately high.

All ranks of this force are physically and mentally toughened to adapt and perform in the most hostile and inhumane conditions, whilst preserving the honour of the country. The credit for the success of many heroic operations in the country (e.g., The Mumbai Attack, Anti-Piracy Operation, Surgical Strikes, and operations in the North East) goes to this force.

Colonel Bala Karthik proudly believes that it is the sweat, blood and efforts of the military forces that allow the citizens of the country to sleep peacefully. However, the will to serve efficiently must be coupled with proper preparation and

strategy. The officer explained his first stint in the Kashmir valley, where he was introduced to techniques like terrain mapping, camouflage dressing, identifying choke points and getting into the minds of the enemy.

The soft-spoken Colonel Bala Karthik was kind enough to share his experience of a deadly operation in Kashmir in 2008 for which he was awarded the Shaurya Chakra. This 8-day-long operation is recorded as one of the longest gun fights to flush out terrorists in the valley.

In Oct 2008, there was





a credible threat to disrupt the railway line work that had commenced in Kashmir. The army received concrete intelligence that anti-insurgent activity was being planned by the (P.O.K.) Pakistan-occupied Kashmir militants to sabotage this event. A team of 16 under the officer, Bala Karthik was readied to search for and eliminate this threat.

The operation was around a lake at the foothills of a mountain peak north of Srinagar. The intelligence indicated 13 terrorists. As the operation involved taking on the enemy having the advantage of height, normally the army would deploy its officers at the ratio of 10:1. However, the brave team of 16 under its officer took on this challenge as they considered themselves “Ek Baraabar Bees ”(translated as each commando is equivalent to 20).

The operation started with a helicopter drop followed by an 18-hour gruelling trek in extremely challenging terrain. The team, with their rucksacks, moved forward and upward on a 15,500 ft snow-clad mountain. The task was made further difficult by the fact that it was devoid of cover, had very limited foot-holding and the temperatures dropped to sub-zero in the late evenings. Receiving the precise location of the terrorists, owing to a Satellite Phone Intercept, the team started triangulating it.

The enemy was spotted on the 24th of September and the hunt commenced. The search party lost one of its brave soldiers, who were peppered by seven bullets. It was heart-wrenching as the Colonel revealed that despite this, the wounded soldier kept supporting and pushing his team forward till his last breath.

The gunfight dragged on for 8 long days and the unit had to resort to unconventional strategies and on-the-spot improvisation. This unit ultimately eliminated all the terrorists one after the other and the operation was successful. Huge amounts of explosives, tools, weapons, dry fruit rations and currencies etc., were recovered from the bodies of the terrorists.

The Indian Army takes pride in its humanity even after such a deadly kill. The operation concluded with the team bringing the bodies down the hill and providing them with a dignified funeral as per the religious customs of the terrorists.

This operation won the team many awards including an Ashoka Chakra (Posthumous), three Shaurya Chakras, two Sena Medals and four Commendation Cards. The unit also received a proud unit citation during India's Republic Day ceremony in 2009.

Colonel Bala Karthik shared his takeaways and learnings from numerous such operations. The officers of the Indian Armed Forces imbibe the following skills as

they serve their nation with such deadly and determined special operations:

- Knowledge of Terrain
- Local Awareness
- Determined Leadership
- Speed vs Suspense
- Offensive Spirit
- Fire Discipline
- Command & Control
- Patience
- Improvisation
- Act vs React
- Check, Check and Check

The members of RCM gracefully offered this very special guest a standing ovation as he ended his presentation with his favourite Zig Zigar quote, “Success is when Opportunity meets Preparation.”

Blood Donation Camp at Sri Sankara Vidyashramam

On 16th Nov 2024, the Interact Club of Sri Sankara Vidyashramam, under the umbrella of the Rotary Club of Madras, successfully organized a blood donation camp on the school premises.

This noble initiative was inaugurated by Rotary Club's President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna, in the presence of Mrs. S. Sashirekha principal of Sri Sankara Vidyashramam, Rtn. A.M. Visvanathan Director of Community Service 2 (Health), Rtn. PP. George B. Cherian, Chairperson of Blood Donation Committee, Rtn. Rinku Mecheri Co-chairperson of Blood Donation Committee and Rtn. Sumit Kumar Kalra.

This blood donation camp marks the 23rd consecutive year it has been held at the school, a significant milestone in the Interact Club's 25-year history.

If you just choose to pray.

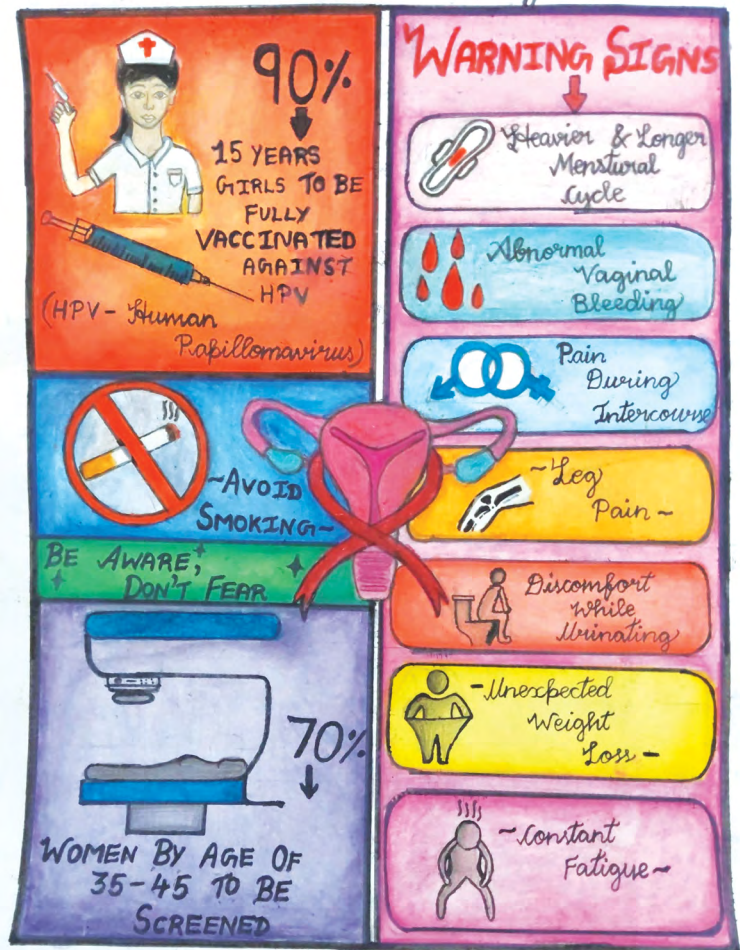

Rotary Nostalgia

ROTARY CLUB OF MADRAS 1937 – 1943 – Part 2

(This is the second in the series of three articles on RCM during the period 1937 – 1943)

It was at this time that the Second World War struck. Recognizing that its service activities had to be steered towards supporting other, more urgent issues, the Committee at the Rotary Club of Madras passed a resolution on November 12th, 1940 to pause scholarship and other similar aid in favour of utilizing scarce resources towards better purposes.

It was a time of global war and the Madras Rotarians rolled up their sleeves to play their part. But even before that, it is necessary to record the impact that the war had on the world of British business in Madras, their social clubs and organisations such as Rotary, all of which had thus far seen either exclusive or at least dominant white memberships. Suddenly there was a depletion, as younger members of the community left for war duty, many of whom never to return. War absentees were treated as honorary members of the Rotary Club of Madras but that did not help either membership or the coffers. This may have been an important reason for the sudden drop in Club activities.

This was also the time when Indians began to play a larger role in the Club. Sir Mohammed Usman had been the first Indian to become President, and that was in 1935-36. The next year saw Sir Frank Birley, the Managing Director of Best & Co. take over, and assisting him as Secretary was an Indian – Capt. Abdul Hamid. Educated at the

Madras Christian College and then at Balliol, Oxford, this suave educationist was the first South Indian to be given the rank of a commandant in the Army in India Reserve of Officers (AIRO).

At the time of his joining the Rotary, he was the Principal of Government Mohammedan College, Madras. Abdul Hamid would have a long tenure as Secretary – from 1936 to 1941, perhaps a record in Rotary history. It is also perhaps reflective of

a severe shortage of membership. 1939-40, the first year of the war would see an Indian President and Secretary holding the fort – Abdul Hamid, never to become President, was Secretary and the presidential incumbent was Mariadoss Ratnaswami.

If Abdul Hamid was an Oxonian, Ratnaswami was from Cambridge, having qualified in law. He however seems like his Secretary to have preferred becoming an educationist, for after serving at Baroda, he became successively Professor of History, Principal of Pachaiyappa's College and later Principal of the Law College, Madras. He had also served as a member of the Madras Legislative Council for two terms.

Under the efficient leadership of President M. Ratnaswami and Secretary Capt. M. Abdul Hamid in the year 1939-40, the Rotary Club of Madras extended a helping hand to support one of their own - Mr J. Munro, a former member and Editor of the Eastern Rotary Wheel, a magazine founded by Rtn. Alistair McRae and published from Bombay in the 1930s.

The Club established a Munro fund amounting to Rs. 2,000, the proceeds of which were used towards the treatment of Mr J. Munro at the Sanatorium at Madanapalle.
