

Meet Mr. S. Chockalingam, the creative mastermind behind India's most iconic cricket fan movement: Whistle Podu. Not just an ad campaign, but a cultural phenomenon that flipped the coin and made

ACT 1: The First over - A Lucky Break

It all began in Madras, circa 1988. The IPL wasn't even a thing yet, but India Cements had a dream: a cricket team that would one day become a religion.

With just three friends, one dog and a lucky call, Chocka and the team had two days to pitch a strategy that would launch a legacy.

ACT 2: Let the People Decide

"Great marketing makes the customer feel smart." – Joe Chernov

They didn't just want fans, they wanted co-creators.

So they launched a contest, "Pera Kettala Adhirudhula" (Just hearing the name should give you goosebumps!) across newspapers and social media to let the public choose the team name.

25,000 entries later, one stood tall: Chennai Super Kings.

ACT 3: Painting the Town Yellow

Corporate colors were blue and yellow — but Chocka made a bold call: yellow it was. Before the IPL began, during an India-South Africa match at Chepauk, everything turned yellow — the stands, the seats, the signs. The commentary even joked:

"Even the grass looks yellow!"

With a shoestring budget, CSK became impossible to ignore.

ACT 4: Budget Blues, Creative Highs

After splurging on players, there was little left for ads. So instead of hiring stars, they turned the stadium into the hero. Strategic camera placements ensured yellow ruled the screen and the hearts.

ACT 5: How to Cheer - Not Just What to Cheer

With IPL shifting to South Africa, CSK was away from home.

But Chocka believed:

"You don't have to tell Chennaites to cheer for CSK. You just need to show them HOW." Thus, Whistle Podu was born, a catchy tune, local flavor and raw fan energy.

Shot on a handycam, featuring real fans, folk music and players speaking Tamil, the video went viral. Even MS Dhoni got his iconic moniker, "Thala" from this campaign.

ACT 6: From Chennai to the World

Uploaded to YouTube, the first comment came from New Zealand.

The video caught the attention of Channel V and then Sony, both wanted to air it for free. No expensive celebs, no ads spend just pure emotion and authenticity.

ACT 7: Loss on the Field, Victory off It

Though CSK lost in the semis that year, the fan videos exploded. Some were even better than professional ones!

One new anthem featured a massive Mexican wave at Marina Beach — the viral sensation that sealed the "Thala" title for Dhoni.

ACT 8: Homegrown Heroes

Content included:

- · Players attempting Rajinikanth-style glasses flips
- Pulled coffee ads with folk beats
- Sanitation workers, fans and everyday people real Chennai

This wasn't just a campaign — it was Chennai's soul on screen.

ACT 9: Fans Take the Wheel

Fans became the marketers.

They ran Facebook pages, created memes and flew across India — some even painted themselves yellow.

"It wasn't just marketing, it was a movement."

ACT 10: The Comeback

After a two-year ban, 2018 was the comeback. With no budget again, Dhoni posted a silent Instagram photo - yellow shirt, No. 7, and "Thala."



That was it.

The internet turned #WhistlePodu yellow. No big launch. Just fan power.

ACT 11: Whistle Podu Express

When matches were shifted to Pune due to the Kaveri riots, Chocka helped organize the Whistle Podu Express, a train filled with fans, fully sponsored, fully passionate.

What We Learned from Chocka:

- · Let your consumer own the brand
- · Celebrate your fans constantly
- · Speak their language
- Converse, don't broadcast
- · Content = dialogue, not a calendar



n April 1, the Rotary Club of Madras (RCM) held the Bhoomi Pooja ceremony for the construction of a new staircase and also officially inaugurated the Noon Meals Kitchen at Sri Ramakrishna Math National Primary School in Mint, Parrys. The ceremony was graced by the presence of several dignitaries, including District Governor Rtn. N.S. Saravanan, District Secretary Vidya Ragu and RCM President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna, Director of Community Services I Rtn. Dr. Anuradha Ganesan, Co-Chair of WASH Rtn. M.M. Philip, Director of Community Health, Rtn. A.M. Visvanathan, Rtn. Mahinder Jain, Rtn. N.K. Bhatia, Rtn. Anil Srinivasan, Rtn. Prasanna Rajagopalan and Rtn. G. Ravindran and school officials.

The first item on the agenda was the Bhoomi Pooja, which was conducted by the RK Math Seers. During the ceremony, Mr. Mathivanan, the project's contractor, demonstrated the betel leaf tradition, in which water was poured towards the northeast to symbolize the invitation of harmony and stability. Next, the Noon Meals Kitchen was officially inaugurated; the kitchen provides hygienic and nutritious mid-day meals to 460 students. Following the inauguration, the Rotarians inspected the new toilet blocks, which were almost complete.

Following the ceremony, the event continued at the Prayer Hall, where the Headmistress



delivered the Welcome Address. She emphasized the significance of the new developments in supporting the students' personal growth, academic success and overall well-being and how these improvements would contribute to their future achievements.

Swami Shashishikananda, the spiritual leader of RK School, expressed heartfelt gratitude to the Rotarians for their unwavering support. He recognized the crucial role of RCM in supporting underprivileged students and expressed his eagerness for continued collaboration for future needs.

He especially appreciated President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna for promptly endorsing the WASH proposal, reflecting RCM's strong





commitment to education and community welfare. He also thanked Rtn. Dr. Anuradha Ganesan for her efforts in bringing the project to fruition.

Swami Satyajnananandaji Maharaj (Adhyaksha, RKM, Mylapore), a senior leader, presented a memento to District Governor Rtn. N.S. Saravanan and all Rotarians involved. DG Saravanan, President Chella and Director Dr. Anuradha Ganesan presented a cheque to Contractor Mr. Mathivanan for the staircase project.

A cultural program followed with students' performance, including a singing program, a solo Thirukkural recital and a dance.

Rotary Club of Madras South

- The Rotary Club of Madras sponsored the Rotary Club of Cochin in 1937. Diwan Bahadur R.K. Shanmukham Chetty, then Diwan of Cochin, served as the Charter President. Later, he became India's first Finance Minister in the Central Cabinet headed by Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru.
- In 1958-59, during the presidency of Rtn. K.V. Srinivasan (Managing Director, Standard Motors) at the Rotary Club of Madras, the then District Governor T.S. Rajam (of TVS Group, Madurai) appointed Rtn. PP. Kalluri Gopal Rao as the Governor's Special Representative to establish a new Rotary club. As a result, the Rotary Club of Tirupati was formed in 1959, with the Rotary Club of Madras serving as its sponsoring club.
- Chevalier Rtn. PDG J.L.P. Roche Victoria served two half-terms as Director of Community Service of the

- Rotary Club of Madras in 1953-54 and 1954-55. He was elected District Governor in 1948-49 while he was a member of the Rotary Club of Tuticorin. Much later, he joined the Rotary Club of Madras.
- Rtn. Kalluri Gopal Rao, who served as President of the Rotary Club of Madras in 1957-58, became District Governor in 1959-60. During his tenure, the Rotary Club of Madras South was sponsored. At that time, the President of the Rotary Club of Madras was Rtn. A.R. Narayana Rao, who had joined the club in 1944.
- Sir C.P. Ramaswamy Ayyar, a member of the Rotary Club of Madras, later joined the Rotary Club of Nilgiris, which was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Madras in 1941. At the age of 73, he went on to serve as District Governor in 1952-53.


