

CULTURAL AND HISTORICAL CONNECTIONS BETWEEN IA AND JAPAN

Speaker Amb. Deepa Gopalan Wadhwa, Former Indian Ambassador to Japan

Making an Ambassador is not easy, because the Indian UPSC exam is one of the toughest in the world to get through, and being one is certainly not for the ordinary. You have to deal with all humanity, from Monarchs to Presidents to Generals to Spooks. You need to speak to the world and appropriately at that.

One needs to be erudite, smart, controlled and succinct. No unnecessary words, carefully crafted, to the point and to suit the occasion. And Tough! Like P G Wouehouse says, "a twenty-minute egg"

And Amb.Deepa Gopalan Wadhwa is all that!

A diplomat in the Indian Foreign Service, she has had a distinguished career as Ambassador to Japan, Sweden & Qatar and, overall, for over 35 years in the service of our nation. She was born and brought up in Chennai or Madras, as she prefers to call it. She studied in Holy Angels convent and was a student of science at Women's Christian College.

She was a National Science talent Scholar but went on to take the UPSC route to join the Indian Foreign Service. She is married to another Career Diplomat, Amb. Anil Wadhwa, who served as an ambassador to Poland, Oman, Thailand & Italy.

Personally, Amb. Wadhwa and I serve as co-Advisers of a Delhi-based Chamber of commerce where I've had the privilege of meeting him.

She was with us this Tuesday afternoon to talk about "Cultural & Historical Connections Between India & Japan". And as I said earlier, she was Fluent, Clear, to the point and hugely descriptive on the subject, as well as her personal experiences in Japan.

In her opening remarks, she emphasized that India and Japan go back a long way in time as regards their relationship. To begin with, there was a mention of a special affinity of Japan with TamilNadu.

Starting off on a lighter note, she spoke about the popularity of Rajnikant in Japan. About the tamil film "Muthu" in 1995 and the current Japanese Ambassador dancing to the song from "Jailer".

Historically, it is said that there was a 7th century sage known as "Bodhi Sena" who travelled to Japan from

Madurai. He established a base in Nara and became a priest in the temple. He attained samadhi in Nara and, even as of date, people visit Nara to offer prayers.

There is a sense of cultural comfort that the Japanese have with Tamil Nadu because of this long-lasting connection. Saraswathi, Shiva and Kuber are a part of the 7 lucky gods in Japan, and there are 160 temples of Saraswathi which still stand today. There are also Temples for Ganapathy, both Male & Female, which is unique in itself.

The 2nd stage of the relationship relates to the time of the Portuguese & Dutch occupation of India. Francis Xavier traded fine textiles and yarn from Goa to Japan. Some historical remnants still form a part of the Kyoto annual Festival even today, where they are exhibited.

The 3rd stage of engagement with India which she recalled was during the British occupation of India. Swami Vivekanand, en route to US, made a stopover in Japan for 3 months. He was so taken up with the Japanese way of life, he advocated the Japanese experience to all Indians.

Thereafter, Jamshedji Tata established a JV with NYK which exists even as of date. Subash Chandra Bose apparently sought Japanese assistance for our freedom from the British, the details of which were not elaborated on.

The 4th phase was during and in the aftermath of the 2nd World War. Imphal & Kohima saw the presence of Japanese people. Soon after, there was a Court of Justice and, akin to Nuremburg Trials a commission was set up to go into the atrocities of WWII. The most prominent story of that was, of Justice Vinod Pal who was among the judges of the commission. His bust still stands and is a landmark in Tokyo.

After Indian Independence, Indian PM Jawaharlal Nehru, despite pressure from the west, chose to treat Japan as an Asian ally and signed a special friendship treaty with them which brought the countries closer. There was also an emotional connection established when our PM gifted a baby elephant, which was greatly appreciated by the Japanese.

It was considered to be so precious and such a gesture of goodwill that it warrants a mention even today. There was an ODA (Overseas Development Assistance) signed between us that gave us access to funding through JICA and JETRO which further strengthened bilateral ties. Suzuki came into India with a small car which fulfilled the dream of every Indian family owning a car. This was the beginning of



the automobile evolution. Technology and Japanese Management style were brought in.

The 5th Stage: There was a brief lull in early 2000 wherein certain differences cropped up between us and progress was halted. Which soon corrected itself with regular dialogues and now back on an even keel. Now the PM meets every year on a regular basis. Both Japan & India are a part of the Quad with the US & Australia. Happy days are here!

Trivia: Dont go from one Indian restaurant to the other. Try Japanese Vegetarian. Especially their Tofu with Soya. Advice to RCMers! To improve Relationship: You need cross-cultural communication. Try and

understand the Japanese. They are cautious. Risk Averse. Deal with them accordingly.

There are 1500 Japanese clubs in India. There are 35,000 in China. India hopes to accommodate 15000 in the next 3 years.

Summing up: As I was leaving the meeting, an RCMer said to me in the elevator, "What a lovely afternoon. A wonderful speaker! Thoroughly enjoyed it". I guess that is the overall sentiment. Thank you Ambassador Deepa Gopalan Wadhwa.

Paying Tribute to late Rtn. Christopher Devaprakasam

I have had the privilege of working together with Christopher for 18 years on the Boys Town committee.

Kamal Chadda is now in Mumbai and Nimish joined the team later for about 10 years. Christopher lived and breathed Rotary, especially Boys Town.

We expanded the number of Boys from 170 to 600.

He used to interview each parent before taking the boy. He used to be present when we had quarterly meetings with the parents. He will counsel students and review their progress reports from the school regularly.

In 2002, we introduced Vocational training programmes in Air conditioning Mechanic Electrical wiring. Auto Repairs and Welding courses at both Selaiyur and Gummidipoondi.

Christopher was of great help in getting the programme started. In due course, when accommodation in Boys Town reached capacity,

we started the Home Support Programme.

We will pay the educational and medical expenses of students staying at home, but they will participate in all programmes at the Boys Town.

Christopher used to visit each student at his home to review progress. Sometimes he will recommend that we bear major medical expenses of the family and I used to get the funds for the same.

International donors like International Children's Trust and their individual donors. Our Partner Club. Rotary Club of Fareham Meon in the UK, of which Benjy and I are Honorary Members held him in high esteem.

Before my annual visit to these donors, Christopher used

to brief me thoroughly on Boys Town matters. I usually get matching grants from UK clubs every year.

Christopher would help to identify the projects and later implement the projects and prepare completion reports.

Christopher would also help my office colleague Rtn. Ravi Sundaresan in preparing and submitting FCRA Returns to the Ministry of Home Affairs.

We have got renewal of our FCRA Registration. He and I have visited Gummidipoondi and Selaiyur each more than 150 times. Sometimes he would drive himself and go. I stopped it and used to send my car and driver.

Besides mentoring students, he was also a mentor to Boys Town Managers Pitchai Kannan and Arumugham.

He was a wonderful human being and a close personal friend. Very few know that he was a graduate of Purdue University and held a senior position in a Multinational in Australia before returning to India. He was a Rotarian in Australia too.

His wife passed away very early. She was the daughter of Dr P.C.Cherian, former Governor of Maharastra. He has two sons and one daughter, all well settled abroad.

Towards 2016 he started feeling lonely in his flat in Victoria Crescent. So Giridhar and I would pick him up and spend some time in Presidency Club at least once in 2 months. This was during pre-covid times.

Dear Christopher, All of us miss you, We had wonderful times in Rotary and personally, May your soul rest in peace.

 - 1. The member interest survey will help you understand what new and prospective members care about and how they want to contribute.
 - 2. The member satisfaction survey (or an online version) can be distributed each year to all members.

By asking for feedback regularly and responding to it, you show that you're open to change, and you empower members to be involved in creating their ideal club experience.

- Use the Club Health Check to identify areas where your club could improve and determine how to keep your club relevant for members and the community.
- Take the Creating an Inclusive Club Culture course to discover ways for your club to become more inclusive, diverse, and equitable. Remember that for any Learning Center course, you'll need a My Rotary account.

Recognize your peers with Rotary's Service Awards

Any member can nominate another member in good standing for this award between 1 August and 30 September.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PERSONAL DAY OF

International Day of Peace September 21st is observed as 'International Day of Peace'. The United Nations' goal is to strengthen the ideals of peace, fostering compassion and empathy to resolve all conflicts.
