Call to Order

President Nikhil Raj called the 18th weekly meeting to order at 1:30 pm.

The meeting commenced with the Rotary Song.

"Toilets and Sanitation," highlighting Rotary's commitment to hygiene, healthcare, women empowerment, and environmental protection.

President Nikhil Raj welcomed all members, Anns, and special guests to the meeting. He extended a warm welcome to Mr Ramachandran and Dr Karpuswamy from the Probus Club. Dr Venkata Karthikeyan & Mr Suraj Saravana Raman attended their first RCM meeting. It was noted that despite rain, the attendance was encouraging.

President's Announcements

President Nikhil Raj shared updates on recent and upcoming club activities.

Rotaract Club of Vepery Installation was held at Maris Hotel. This marked the 4th charter for the club, and the new team looks promising for continued activity.

Full Club Fellowship (1 Nov 25) hosted by PDG Rtn J.B. Kamdar and Ann Marlene saw excellent participation and fellowship.

RYLA Program 80 students from RCM's Interact schools left for Kuala Lumpur on 2 Nov 25. President Nikhil Raj and Youth Service Director, Rtn Suman Voora flagged off the group. Students would be visiting schools, colleges, and cultural sites in Malaysia. On 14 Nov 25, another batch of 60 students from Vidya Mandir Sr Sec School, Mylapore would travel under the guidance of YSD, Rtn Suman Voora, Rtn Himanshu Budhia, and Rtn Sesha Sai.

Medical Camp (7Nov & 8 Nov)

Organized by Dr Anisha Ashok through her laparoscopic clinic for women at Rotary Nagar and coordinated by PP Rtn Rani Muralidharan, Rtn Dr Sangeetha Viswanathan and the medical team led by Rtn Arjun Ananth.

President Nikhil Raj outlined the scale and scope of ongoing community service projects.

Total Project Value: Rs. 16.02 crores (total projects being executed)

Expenditure thus far:

Q1: Rs.2.39 crores

Q2: Rs.2.28 crores

Project Categories

Homes, Toilets, Environment, School Infrastructure, Medical Equipment, HPV Vaccination, Mental Health, Medical Camps, Education, and Skilling.

Efforts are on track to meet projected completion by 30 June 2026.

Presentations by Directors

Rtn Suresh Amirapu – Director, Community Service Development (CSD)

He presented an update on five key verticals under CSD

Homes for the Homeless – Chairperson: Rtn. N. Prakash

RCM Hope Village, Irembedu – 100 homes for Irular tribals.

39 completed and handed over; 22 under progress; others awaiting clearances.

Includes greening, water body, vegetable gardens, and community centre.

Villagers are forming a registered society to self-manage the settlement.

Smaller projects at Perathur, 18 homes and Beerakuppam, 15 homes are also progressing.

WASH (Water, Sanitation & Hygiene) – Chairperson: Rtn. Arvind Kumar Shankar

Chintadripet Boys' School: Long-pending toilet project completed despite COVID delays.

Presidency Girls' School, Egmore: 200-year-old school – new WASH blocks completed.

Anganwadi, Perambur: Work nearing completion.

Thanipoondi - 130 toilets across 4 villages, CSR project of Sundaram Fasteners Limited. Major government clearances secured. Driven by PP Rtn. S. Ravi.

Boys Town Society – Chairperson: Rtn. Rajesh Vummidi

Currently 78 boys (Classes 5–12), government-referred through CWC.

RCM supports boarding, education, tuition (via Chudar), and activities with Krea University. Yoga, sports, and counselling are integrated for holistic development.

Lake Restoration – Chairperson: PP Rtn P.N. Mohan

Projects at Kadaperi and Old Perangudi are ongoing through Exnora.

New projects under discussion with Brigade Group and others. A major upcoming project at Srimavathur Lake will involve multiple donors.

Environment – Chairperson: Rtn. B.V. Gautam

Biogas Plant, Govt. School, Thiruvannamiyur – completed, funded by Rtn Kadiresan Adityan R.

Vandalur Zoo Water Restoration:

Langur Enclosure – Rs.15.7 lakhs (civil work commenced).

Chimpanzee Enclosure – Rs.13 lakhs (donor identified).

Hippo Pond – Rs.35 lakhs (seeking donor).

Projects executed with Cirgen Technologies and approved by zoo authorities under an RCM MOU.

Afforestation at Loyola College: Donor: Rtn

Geetha Nagu and family (Rs.10 lakhs).

Vendor: EFI; to be completed within one month of PO issuance.

President Nikhil Raj and other members engaged in discussion on technical aspects and donor partnerships, appreciating the scope of the environmental projects.

Discussion on Project Sustainability and Health Initiatives

PP Rtn Srikanth commended the club for its diversity and scale of projects, while emphasizing the importance of project sustainability. Drawing from his experience, he cautioned that many WASH projects worldwide face long-term sustainability issues, with nearly 50% becoming non-functional within five years. He recommended that each project include a "failure report" to record learnings and urged the club to conduct follow-up assessments to evaluate long-term impact and usage.

President Nikhil Raj responded affirmatively, informing members that a survey was conducted last year in the Gummidipoondi area under IPP Rtn Chella Krishna's leadership. Of about 250 toilets built, 220 were in active use, while others had been repurposed. He assured members that sustainability and monitoring mechanisms are being built into all current and future projects, with plans to establish a Project Monitoring Committee.

Rtn Bharat Shetty representing Director Rtn Arjun Ananth, presented the Community Services Health report. Highlights included:

46 HPV vaccination camps conducted this year with 3,641 girls enrolled, 1,620 second doses given, and 2,000 more in process.

Major donations and sponsorships totaling several crores for ambulances, dialysis machines, and medical equipment across multiple hospitals, including Child Trust Hospital, Hindu Mission, and government hospitals at Mannargudi, Erode, Hosur, and Trichy.

Sponsorship acknowledgments were made to Rtn Govind Parekh, Rtn Hari Venkatesh, Rtn Anthony Lobo, PP Rtn N K Gopinath, PP Rtn Vivek Harinarain, Rtn Mahendra Jain, Rtn Vardhaman Jain, and Rtn Krishnamurthy Vijayan.

A shortfall of Rs.1.3 lakh was reported in the dialysis project due to increased equipment costs, for which members were invited to contribute.

Dr. Sangeetha Viswanathan updated members on the HPV vaccination initiative,

now scaled nationally through a partnership with Inner Wheel Clubs of India.

Approximately 1,890 girls have been vaccinated under this collaboration, with commitments for another 2,000 vaccinations, bringing the total close to 4,000–6,000 by November.

The project aims to vaccinate 1 million girls by the club's centenary year, supported by CSR funds and a proposed Global Grant.

The Serum Institute handles distribution and collection of unused doses through its dealer network.

About 10% dropouts have been recorded for the second dose, but even one dose provides partial protection.

PP Rtn Mohan Raman P.V. led a light-hearted crowdfunding appeal, successfully raising funds towards the Rs.1.3 lakh dialysis shortfall and additional contributions for the HPV vaccination program. Several Rotarians volunteered Rs.25,000 each, with President Nikhil and others also pledging support.

President Nikhil Raj expressed gratitude for the generosity shown and acknowledged PP Rtn S Ravi for his efforts in identifying hospitals for the SBI Mutual Fund-sponsored dialysis project. He also mentioned progress on the hyperbaric machine project.

Dr Sharon's presentation (delivered by PP Rtn Rani) highlighted the first-quarter activities under the Vocational Services vertical, described as "the beating heart of Rotary," connecting members' professional skills with community needs.

Focus Areas

Women's empowerment, children's skilling, RCM members' professional growth, and DEI initiatives.

Nine sub-verticals operate under this area, focusing on skill development, education, and employability.

Key Project Updates: SELU (Center of Excellence for Women's Empowerment)

Continued legacy programs: MS Office, Tally, tailoring, and hand embroidery.

Courses are now nationally certified (NIIT for digital learning; Apparel Skill India Council for tailoring/embroidery).

Spoken English course by MCC & Chennai Volunteers Group.

Paramedical courses launched with VNEPR Skill Development Center.

Health & awareness programs:

General health and cancer screening (147 women benefited)

HPV vaccination awareness (50 girls registered)

Meditation and wellness camp (50 participants)

Bhavodini School for Autism: Vocational training for 20–25 children.

Handmade bags venture: Initiated by Anne Deepti Prasanna; 700 bags sold—profits given to women graduates.

Rotary Nagar: New Building:

Vocational & educational courses for women (certified by NIIT).

Tuition center for 70–100 children (LKG–12th).

STEM enrichment, ISRO space science, coding by Rtn. Anjali Poni, and spoken English

classes.

Old Building:

To be converted into a sports, yoga, and self-defense center.

Currently hosts medical camps and Anganwadi.

Current Enrollments (as reported by PP Rtn Rani):

Seliyur/Sembakkam: 11 (MS Office), 15 (Tally), 20 (Spoken English), 37 (Tailoring), 10 (Embroidery).

Rotary Nagar: 21 (Digital Literacy – 17 MS Office, 4 Tally), 60 (Tuition Center), 15 (Coding), 30 (Spoken English – 15 women + 15 children).

New Initiative:

Exploring retail job training programs with guaranteed placement for local youth.

Planning courses in DTP, welding, electronics, and TNPSC coaching.

Focus on impactful, employment-linked vocational training.

V.P. Raman Award: Award for living the Rotary 4-Way Test presented to Interact schools on 7 Oct 25.

Health Camp Follow-up (Q&A):

Screening camps link patients to partner hospitals for further treatment; costs are often covered by RCM.

Eye screening camps identify refractive errors; Rotary arranges glasses at nominal cost and maintains records for follow-up.

Closing Remarks by President Nikhil Raj

Emphasized the passion and diversity of RCM's service efforts.

Announced a 3-month calendar (Nov–Jan) listing project visits to encourage members to personally visit and experience Rotary

projects.

Visits to be organized via carpooling and coordination with project directors.

Meeting was adjournment.

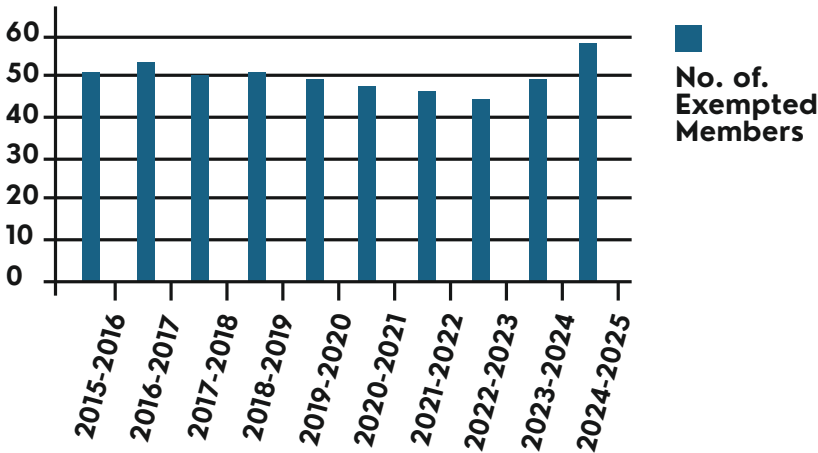
The Quiet Backbone: Tracing the Trend of Exempted Members (2015–2025)

Every organization has its silent contributors, those who may step back from the spotlight but remain closely tied to its heartbeat. In Rotary, Exempted Members represent this quiet strength. Though no longer obligated to attend every meeting, their presence, whether physical or symbolic, remains deeply valued.

A Gradual Decline: 2015–2023

In 2015–16, there were 50 exempted members, a number that remained stable over the next few years with minor fluctuations. By 2017–18, the number dipped slightly to 49, and then to 48 in 2019–20. This downward slope continued more noticeably post-2020.



The numbers fell to 46, then to 45, and reached the lowest at 43 in 2022–23. This gradual decline could be interpreted as a combination of factors, perhaps more members becoming actively involved again, changes in membership structure, or even demographic shifts within the club.

A Surprising Rebound: 2023–2025

Just when the trend seemed irreversible, a surprising uptick appeared. In 2023–24, the number jumped to 48, and in 2024–25, it surged to 57, the highest in the decade.

What triggered this reversal? It could suggest a renewed recognition of long-standing members, a more inclusive membership policy, or perhaps, in a post-pandemic world, a flexible approach that allows members to stay connected without regular attendance.

What This Tells Us

Exempted members are more than just statistics, they're the club's memory keepers, its legacy holders. The data shows a cycle of transition: a dip as new blood enters, and a rebound as the organization matures and circles back to embrace those who paved the way.

Recognizing and engaging this group isn't just respectful, it's strategic. They carry stories, connections, and wisdom that fuel the future.

They may not walk through every door,
