CHIEF GUEST SESSION

The President welcomed the Chief Guest, Mr Muneer Sait, former Olympian and Indian hockey legend. PP Rtn Satyan Bhatt introduced the Chief Guest and moderated a talk and interactive session titled "Hockey – Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow" covering:

India's Olympic hockey legacy,

Vote of Thanks proposed: By Secretary Rtn Prasanna Rajagopalan.

Evolution of the game,

India's resurgence with bronze medals at Tokyo 2020 and Paris 2024.

Members were given the opportunity to view an Olympic medal brought by the Chief Guest.

Adjournment: The President adjourned the meeting.

HOCKEY – YESTERDAY, TODAY, AND TOMORROW



Chief guest, Mr Muneer Sait, a former Olympian described as a "trailblazer on the field, a titan in the boardroom", a bronze medalist at the 1968 Mexico Olympics and a gold medalist at the 1967 Madrid pre-Olympics, remains a fitness inspiration at 85, still actively playing squash, golf, and swimming.

The session was expertly moderated by PP Rtn Satyan Bhatt, who set the stage with a nostalgic yet critical overview of Indian hockey. Satyan

reminded the audience of India's unparalleled history: six consecutive Olympic golds from 1928 to 1956, and a total tally of eight gold, one silver, and four bronze medals. He noted that while the country hit a nadir by failing to qualify for Beijing 2008, recent years have seen a resurgence with bronze medals in Tokyo 2020 and Paris 2024—the latter marking the first time in 52 years when India beat Australia at the Olympics.

GLORY DAYS AND HEARTBREAKS

Prompted by PP Rtn Satyan, Muneer captivated the audience with anecdotes from the golden era, specifically the 1936 Berlin Olympics. He recounted how Hitler, expecting a German victory after a 4-1 practice match win, watched in shock as Dhyan Chand's India won the final 6-0. Legend has it that Hitler even suspected Dhyan Chand's stick had a magnetic impact, though he graciously offered Chand German citizenship, which was refused.

Muneer spoke candidly about missed opportunities, specifically the 1968 Mexico Olympics. He attributed the loss of the gold medal to internal politics and the disastrous decision to appoint "joint captains" (Prithipal Singh and Gurbux Singh), which created a divided team. This leadership struggle led to poor selection choices during the semi-finals against Australia, where India lost despite dominating the game.



THE ASTROTURF ERA AND THE SHIFT IN SKILL

A significant portion of the conversation, guided by Satyan's questions, focused on the introduction of Astroturf in 1976. Muneer identified this as a turning point where India "lost our way". On natural grass, Indian players utilized superior wrist work and body swerves to play "artistic hockey," maneuvering around stiff-bodied opponents. The synthetic surface, however, demanded sheer physical power and

stamina, favoring European teams. Muneer lamented that the game has shifted from skill and dribbling to a "brute game" focused on speed. He also noted how goalkeeping has changed; unlike his era where keepers relied on agility without heavy gear, modern keepers are heavily padded and often lie flat to block shots.

CHALLENGES AND THE ROAD AHEAD



Addressing the decline in popularity, Muneer noted that hockey is often viewed as a "poor man's game" with little money or media coverage compared to cricket, discouraging parents from supporting aspiring players. He also highlighted how regional politics in the past, specifically the dominance of Punjab Police officials in the federation, often alienated talent from other strong hockey centers like Madras, Bombay, and Bhopal. Consequently, major tournaments like the Bombay Gold Cup have faded, with only the MCC Murugappa tournament remaining a key fixture in the South. However, the tone was not entirely bleak. Muneer acknowledged the massive efforts of Odisha Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik, who invested heavily (reportedly Rs.300 crores) to revive the sport. While Muneer remains realistic about the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics predicting a tough fight against physically dominant European teams, he noted that the current Indian team is fit and well-supported by experts, including a South African coach and Japanese physio. The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks and a rare showcase of Muneer's 1968 Olympic Bronze medal, a tangible piece of history that the members were invited to view.

THE MANY WORLDS OF SEEMA KOHLI

Artist Seema Kohli is no stranger to Rotary, and to our club in particular. Over the years, she has generously contributed significant works of art to our annual fundraiser, the Art Auction, adding both prestige and value to the event. Seema's donations have supported several Rotary Club of Madras initiatives, ranging from the installation of dialysis machines to other key community projects, bringing relief and hope to thousands of beneficiaries.

To date, Seema's donations in artwork to Rotary Club of Madras projects have fetched Rotary Club of Madras a sum of approximately over Rs.1 crore—unique and impactful contributions, given where they matter most.

An artist, sculptor, and poet, Seema Kohli's creative journey extends far beyond painting alone. Her oeuvre spans sculpture, poetry, installations, and performance, reflecting a deeply layered and evolving expression in varied forms of art. Seema has received many awards including the Lalit Kala Akademi National Awards for Women, in 2007.



Widely acclaimed both in India and internationally, her work has found expression in leading museums and galleries across the world, earning her a place among the most celebrated contemporary artists of our time.

You have a giant body of work spanning not just painting, but sculpture, installation, poetry and performance. This is a rather larger palette to work across. How do you balance all?

Every idea I explore begins as a dot that moves on to become lines drawn on paper. That image then whispers what it needs, what it, in turn, wishes to become: a painting, sculpture, embroidery, video or even performance.

I don't jump mediums randomly—it's a flow, not a switch. The line is my anchor, the seed. As that visual energy grows, it may feel best clothed as a canvas, or as a tapestry embellished with beads, or as a live performance that invites sound and movement. If one medium feels incomplete, I follow it to the next. In every form, it's the same image speaking. I just let it choose how it wants to come alive.

As a feted and recognised artist the world over, is there one muse or many inspirations in your work?

I have two muses, the Tree of Life and the Hiranyagarbha. Through them, I explore the universe that exists within us, illustrating how we are all interconnected within this singular, 'Golden Womb'. My works show rebirth and cosmic cycles, where creation diffuses into dissolution, only to be met by continuous regeneration.

There is a lot of the feminine in your work. Comment?

I engage with the sacred feminine as an ever-present energy, translating the mythic power of Shakti and the Yoginis into the language of the modern world. My practice moves between ancient temples and urban life, blending family history and everyday objects with divine symbolism. Through pieces like Hiranyagarbha, I recast traditional narratives to celebrate the creative power and spiritual agency of women today. To me, these ancient feminine forces become invitations to experience strength, vulnerability and interconnection, all of which I see as realities of contemporary feminine existence.

As a celebrated and awarded artist, do you think such acknowledgements are important for the artist? Why, or why not?

I would not go so far as to say recognition is essential, but it is certainly rewarding. There is a quiet, encouraging power in being acknowledged by your peers.

Art is an expression that serves to communicate across boundaries, engenders conversations and transformation. In that sense, how would you define your association with Rotary?

The Rotary Club has been instrumental in bridging the gap between my creative work and my desire to serve society. While navigating the complexities of hospital administration and charitable outreach can be daunting, the Rotary Club has provided me with the necessary structure and direction to ensure aid reaches those most in need.

For me, art is my primary medium for communication and connection. I am grateful to know that the proceeds from my paintings are channelled directly toward patient care and charitable initiatives, allowing my work to make a difference in people's lives.

Is there a new form that you would like to experiment or work with? What's exciting and new on the horizon for you?

I am excited by a multitude of new forms. The world for me is a garden of ideas, and I draw inspiration from every part of it. For me, the 'new horizon' isn't just one thing but a continuous journey of exploring.
