

Rotary Club of Madras (RCM) Minutes of the Illustrious 97th Charter Nite

held on 19 July 2025 @ 7.00 pm @ Hyatt Regency, Teynampet, Chennai

I. Commencement of Proceedings

The evening's distinguished proceedings commenced with a profoundly symbolic gesture as the esteemed Sergeant Rtn Dhananjaya Das ceremoniously collared President Nikhil Raj, marking the official commencement of the grand assembly. Following this venerable tradition, the President, with an air of dignified authority, promptly called the meeting to order, setting the stage for the unfolding of a memorable Charter Nite. The atmosphere was then imbued with solemnity and camaraderie as the 4-way test was delivered by Rtn Rachna Muralidharan.

He eloquently chronicled the Rotary Club of Madras' rich legacy in Youth Service, highlighting its pioneering efforts in establishing Interact and Rotaract clubs, and its deeprooted commitment to empowering the next generation. His speech stood as both a testament and tribute to the Club's unwavering focus on youth, blending history with heartfelt pride.

The President and the District Governor, Rtn Vinod Saraogi, then joined the MC on stage as the names of past Youth Services Directors were read out.

Each name evoked applause, appreciation, and pride. In a grand ceremonial gesture, the President and DG personally honoured each of the Past Directors for their exemplary service to Interact, Rotaract, and beyond.

This was followed by PDG Rtn JB Kamdar's reflective account of the growth and institutionalization of Youth Services in the Club. According to him, Rotary's Youth Service has undergone a significant transformation from 1999 to 2025, evolving from informal club-sponsored activities under "New Generations" to a full-fledged Avenue of Service with Rotaractors recognized as equal partners and co-creators of change. This shift includes Rotaract becoming a membership type of Rotary International in 2019, granting youth greater access to leadership and global initiatives, and integrating their voices into Rotary's projects and priorities.

Following him, Rtn Sesha Sai brought focus to the future, speaking about RYLA and Guiness World Record on Drug Awareness.

IV. Recognition of Service Milestones

The celebration continued with recognition of Stalwart members who completed 25 years and 40 years of uninterrupted service. As the names were read aloud, the hall resounded with admiration. The President and DG presented commemorative plaques, honouring these Rotarians not merely for longevity—but for lives devoted to purposeful service.

V. Centenary Logo Release

The Centenary Logo presentation was a pivotal moment, weaving together the rich tapestry of the club's history with the vibrant promise of its future. PP Rtn George Cherian, Chairperson, Public Image of Centenary Committee set the tone with his stirring remarks, eloquently honoring the past, celebrating the present achievements, and igniting palpable excitement for the club's upcoming 100th year. Following this powerful introduction, Rtn Sid Chandrasekar took to the stage as the accompanying audio-visual presentation illuminated the hall, expertly detailing the concept and vision behind the Centenary Logo.



Each of them has been a sculptor, chiseling character, competence, and compassion into the youth that they mentored. Their efforts translated into Interact Clubs that continue to thrive with innovation, Rotaract events that continue to inspire, and youth-driven projects that echo the very motto of Rotary—Service Above Self.

Fueling the Flame: The Unstoppable Rise of Youth in Rotary

In Rotary, Youth Service has transformed remarkably from 1999–2000 to 2025. Then known as "New Generations," it was not formally recognized as an Avenue of Service. Programs like Rotaract, Interact, RYLA, and Youth Exchange existed but were viewed as

club-sponsored activities. Rotaractors were enthusiastic contributors, not equals. RYLA focused on traditional leadership and Youth Exchange faced logistical hurdles due to limited digital communication.




By 2025, Youth Service has become a full-fledged Avenue of Service, equal to Club, Vocational, Community, and International Service. A pivotal moment came with the 2019 Council on Legislation (COL), which made Rotaract a membership type of Rotary International. Rotaractors now hold leadership roles, access global grants, and function independently shifting the relationship from sponsorship to partnership. Modern RYLA programs are immersive and integrate leadership, innovation, sustainability, wellness, and technology. Youth Exchange includes virtual exchanges and improved safeguarding. Rotary now champions diversity, equity, and inclusion, welcoming youth from all backgrounds. Importantly, Rotary listens to youth voices, allowing them to shape projects and priorities. From being a support system in 1999 to becoming co-creators in 2025, the youth are now central to Rotary's mission. Empowering them is key to securing Rotary's future.

Illuminating Paths with Purpose, Empowering Youth with Vision


Since the early 1960s, the Rotary Club of Madras has championed the cause of youth, recognizing early on that the torch of tomorrow must be kindled today. In 1961, the Youth Service Award was instituted, honouring young achievers like Anand Amritraj. The Interact movement found a swift and enthusiastic sponsor in RCM, which eventually nurtured 27 Interact clubs—once a world record—each engaging in meaningful service, from adult literacy in villages to organizing health and blood donation camps.In 1968, RCM again broke new ground, sponsoring the world's first community-based Rotaract club. Over the decades, 11 Rotaract clubs, college and community alike have served with distinction, responding to crises, uplifting the underserved, and exemplifying leadership. The Club's commitment extended to organizing RYLA camps, offering financial aid through its Loans and Scholarship Committee, and building camaraderie through family engagement and Annette initiatives. Moments of inspiration included dream flights for underprivileged children graced by dignitaries like Chief Minister M.K. Stalin and Actor Kamal Haasan and educational trips to Malaysia and local



landmarks. Through decades of thoughtful action, the Rotary Club of Madras has crafted a lasting legacy empowering youth through opportunity, instilling service as a virtue, and illuminating paths with purpose and compassion.



ROTARY-SBIMF INITIATIVE POWERS MINIMALLY INVASIVE SURGERY AT RSRM



11 July 2025 – The Rotary Club of Madras, in partnership with SBI Mutual Funds, donated an advanced laparoscopy machine to Government RSRM Lying-In Hospital, strengthening the hospital's surgical care capabilities. This initiative marks another important step in supporting public healthcare infrastructure.

Valued at 94 lakhs, the laparoscopy unit will significantly improve the hospital's ability to conduct minimally invasive gynaecological procedures. It ensures better patient outcomes through reduced surgical trauma, quicker recovery, and less post-operative pain. The system also provides surgeons with high-definition visualization, allowing for greater accuracy in diagnosis and treatment. With this upgrade, RSRM Hospital is now equipped to handle advanced procedures such as hysterectomy, ovarian cyst removal, and tubal











surgeries. The handover ceremony was graced by dignitaries, namely Mr. Rajat Grover, Chief Human Resources Officer, SBI Mutual Funds and Mr. S. Benjamin, DVD & Channel Head – Institutional Business from SBIMF. The Guests of Honour were Dr. Kalanidhi Veerasamy, Member of Parliament, North Chennai, Thiru R. D. Sekar, MLA, Perambur, Thiru Idream R. Murthy, MLA, Royapuram and AKS Rtn Vinod Saraogi, District Governor – 3234.

Representing Rotary Club of Madras, President Nikhil Raj, and District Governor Nominee Rtn Dr Vijaya Bharathi Rangarajan were present at the event. From the medical fraternity, Dr. P. Magesh, Dean FAC Government Stanley Medical College, and Dr. Shanthi K. Elango, Superintendent of Government RSRM Hospital, were present to acknowledge the impact of the donation on public healthcare delivery.

The following Rotarians were present namely PP Rtn Ravi Sundaresan, President Elect Rtn S Balakrishna, President Nominee, Rtn Ganesh Ananthakrishnan, Director - Community Health, Rtn Arjun Ananth, Rtn AM Visvanathan, Rtn Bharath Pujara, Chairperson, Community Health Rtn Ashish Ahuja, Rtn Rajasekaran Rajendran, and Rtn Dr Srinath Yeswanth.

The program began with the Tamizh Thai Vazhthu and the ceremonial lighting of the lamp. Dr. Shanthi K. Elango delivered a warm welcome address, explaining basics of laparoscopy, how it works, and its benefits. President Nikhil Raj emphasized the fact that the needs of the society are immense and intense and hospitals need all the help that they can get. Thiru Murthy (MLA) who was incidentally born in the same hospital immensely thanked Rotary Club of Madras for the support.

AKS Rtn Vinod Saraogi delivered a special address, emphasizing the vital role of SBI Mutual Funds in supporting the medical initiative and highlighting RSRM Hospital's efforts as the implementing partner. He spoke about Rotary Club's ongoing contributions to strengthening medical infrastructure over the years.

Mr. Rajat Grover, praised the Rotary team for executing such a major project efficiently and acknowledged the RSRM medical team for their support.

Dr. Kalanidhi Veerasamy, MP, North Chennai, expressed his gratitude to the RCM and SBIMF for donating a much-needed machine to a government facility. He highlighted the importance of this initiative for the residents of North Chennai, especially the economically disadvantaged, noting that even patients from other States would benefit from RSRM due to its impressive zero-mortality rate in 2024.


The program concluded with a vote of thanks delivered by Dr Niranjan, Professor of Anaesthesia, followed by National Anthem.

This project showcases the strong commitment of all stakeholders towards improving public healthcare and ensuring access to modern surgical facilities for all.

History of The Rotary Foundation



In 1917, RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed that an endowment be set up "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, when the endowment fund had grown to more than US\$5,000, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.

Five Trustees, including Klumph, were appointed to "hold, invest, manage, and administer all of its property as a single trust, for the furtherance of the purposes of RI."

Two years later, the Foundation made its first grant of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organization, created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen, later grew into the Easter Seals.

The Great Depression and World War II both impeded the Foundation's growth, but the need for lasting world peace generated great postwar interest in its development. After Rotary's founder, Paul P. Harris, died in 1947, contributions began pouring into Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the Foundation. That year, the first Foundation program – the forerunner of

Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships was established. In 1965-66, three new programs were launched: Group Study Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, and Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Objective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants. The Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants program was launched in 1978, and Rotary Volunteers were created as a part of that program in 1980. PolioPlus was announced in 1984-85, and the next year brought Rotary Grants for University Teachers. The first peace forums were held in 1987-88, leading to the Foundation's peace and conflict studies programs.

Throughout the time, support of the Foundation grew tremendously. Since the first donation of \$26.50 in 1917, it has received contributions totaling more than \$1 billion. More than \$70 million was donated in 2003-04 alone. Till date, more than one million in dividuals have been

recognized as Paul Harris Fellows – people who have given \$1,000 to the Annual Programs Fund or have had that amount contributed in their name.

Such strong support, along with Rotarian involvement worldwide, ensures a secure future for The Rotary Foundation as it continues its vital work for international understanding and world peace.


