RI President's Message for October

What community-led development looks like

October is Rotary's Community Economic Development Month, a time to spotlight our efforts to help communities build thriving, sustainable futures. This month's observance aligns perfectly with the Rotary core value of leadership.

Leadership means empowering people to guide their own progress. That is precisely what Rotary's economic development projects aim to achieve

Take, for example, a recent initiative in southern India in which Rotary members unlocked the power of women of the Adivasi tribal groups through sewing training to earn a living and regain social inclusion. Historically, wildows and abandoned women in this region lose social standing and are shunned by society or blamed for their

misfortunes. Opportunities to support themselves or obtain training are minimal. This year, the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, partnered with clubs in Districts 3203 and 3234 in India — and with the Indian organization Sevalaya Trust — to provide sewing machines and training to 80 Adivasi women. They learned to stitch saree blouses, kurta tunics, and salwar suits, enabling them to support themselves and their families. Each woman received a certificate for completing the program, and the sewing-machine provider offered free long-term maintenance for the machines. The project offered vital income and dignity to women ostracized by society after widowhood.

This story is one example of Rotary leadership in action: local people guiding solutions that address their community needs. Our role is not to deliver charity or to impose outside models, but to foster self-reliance by investing in leadership, skills, and sustainable enterprise.

This October, I invite Rotary members worldwide to reflect on economic leadership in their communities. Who is stepping forward to lead local economic initiatives? Where is there untapped talent that could be supported with training or mentorship? How can your club catalyze opportunity through partnerships with local businesses, vocational schools, or savings groups?

Leadership is not always about being visible. Sometimes it means listening, working collaboratively, and amplifying the voices of others. That approach lies at the heart of Rotary's philosophy and our lasting impact on economic development.

By building capacity — whether through microcredit groups, vocational training workshops, or entrepreneurship programs — we enable communities to lead their own transformation. When people take ownership of their progress, change becomes sustainable.

Let us lead with good intention and provide support with heart. By nurturing local leadership, we can create opportunities that ripple through communities, empowering individuals, families, and societies. Together, we can support economies that work for everyone and enact community development projects that

Sudhakantha Dr. Bhupen Hazarika: The Bard of the Brahmaputra মানুহে মানুহৰ বাবে

A Tribute on his Birth Centenary by RCGW

Dr. Bhupen Hazarika, born on September 8, 1926, in Sadiya, Assam, was a multifaceted artist whose talents spanned singing, composing, lyric writing, poetry, film-making, and journalism. The eldest of ten children, he was exposed to Assamese folk traditions through his mother and began singing at the age of 10. By 12, he had performed in the Assamese film Indramalati (1939). Hazarika pursued higher education at Banaras Hindu University, earning a Master's in Political Science, followed by a PhD in Mass His artistic career was characterized by a deep intertwining of folk traditions, social messages, humanism, and communal harmony. Hazarika's notable songs, including "Manuhe Manuhor Babe" and "Bistirno Parore," transcended linguistic and cultural boundaries. He composed music for numerous films across various languages, winning prestigious awards such as the National Film Award for Best Music Director for the Assamese film Chameli Memsaab (1975). His filmography includes works in Assamese,

Bengali, and Hindi cinema, contributing In the realm of public service, Assam Legislative Assembly from were recognized through Padma Shri (1977), Sangeet Dadasaheb Phalke Award (1992), He was posthumously awarded highest civilian honor. themes of social justice, unity, and groups, effectively introducing the folk



into the mainstream. Influenced by his experiences abroad, he embraced a sense of universalism, drawing inspiration from notable figures like Paul Robeson. As 2025 marks the centenary of his birth, a series of commemorative events and observances have been planned, including a year-long celebration approved by the Government of Assam. A commemorative silver coin has been authorized, and a biography detailing Hazarika's life is to be distributed widely. Cultural concerts, seminars, film screenings, and tributes are among the planned activities to honor his legacy.

Zubeen Garg: Assam's Musical Heartbeat and Humanitarian Force a tribute to Zubeen by the Club

Zubeen Garg, one of Assam's most beloved cultural icons, passed away on 19 September 2025 in Singapore at the age of 52. Known for his prolific musical career and deep commitment to social causes, Garg left behind a legacy that transcends entertainment and touched the lives of thousands.

A Voice That Echoed Across India

Zubeen Garg rose to national fame with the Hindi hit "Ya Ali" from the film Ganaster, but his influence was most deeply felt in Assam and the Northeast. Over a career spanning decades, he recorded an estimated 38,000 songs in more than 40 languages and dialects. His work ranged from Assamese film music and pop to Bollywood playback singing, and he was also a composer, actor, and poet. Garg's concerts drew massive crowds, and his music helped bring Assamese culture into the national spotlight.

A Nation Mourns

His sudden death—reportedly due to drowning after swimming—sparked an outpouring of grief across Assam and among Assamese communities worldwide. Public memorials, mass gatherings, and musical tributes marked the days following his passing. State honours were accorded during his cremation, and fans organized donation drives and remembrance events in his name.

A Life of Giving

Beyond the stage, Zubeen Garg was a tireless philanthropist. Through the Kalaguru Artiste Foundation and other efforts, he provided flood relief, distributed medical supplies, and organized benefit events such as charity football matches and concerts. During the COVID-19 pandemic, he opened his resources to those in need and actively participated in relief drives.

His influence extended to artist welfare and youth empowerment. Inspired by his example, fans and volunteers set up donation boxes at his memorial site to continue supporting causes he championed mental health, underprivileged youth, and struggling artists.

Guardianship and Compassion

One of the most poignant aspects of Garg's legacy was his role as a guardian to underprivileged children. Alongside his wife Garima Saikia Garg, he cared for 15 children, providing them with shelter,

education, and emotional support. These children were not biologically related to him but were

treated as family. Among them was voung girl named Kajali, whom Garg rescued in 2014 from abusive conditions involving child labour and sexual exploitation. He filed a police case, supported her through legal proceedings, and later helped her gain independence by gifting her a sewing machine. His efforts ensured that the children under his care were raised with dignity and given the tools to thrive.

Unanswered Questions

In the wake of his death, authorities in Assam formed a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to probe the circumstances

surrounding the incident. Cooperation requests were made to Singapore for access to CCTV footage and other evidence. Media reports have also highlighted scrutiny of financial transactions involving some of Garg's associates, prompting public calls for transparency.

A Legacy Etched in Melody and Humanity

Zubeen Garg's life was a symphony of art and altruism. He was more than a performer—he was a mobilizer of compassion, a cultural ambassador, and a guardian to the vulnerable. His music will continue to echo through the hills and valleys of Assam, but it is his quiet acts of kindness that will remain etched in the hearts of those he touched.

Rotary's international convention in June 2026

Rotary International President Francesco Arezzo has announced that over 30,000 members from over 120 countries will convene in Taipei. Taiwan, from June 13-17. 2026, for the annual international convention. The event, originally canceled due to the COVID pandemic, is expected to contribute approximately US\$50-55 million to the local economy, benefiting Taipei's hotels, restaurants, and tourism sectors. The conventions aim to foster connections among members, enabling them to share insights on addressing community issues while promoting health, peace, and prosperity globally. The event will take place at the Taipei Nangang Exhibition Center and Taipei Dome, where attendees will explore over 100 humanitarian projects and listen to renowned speakers. Taipei City Mayor Wan-An Chiang has extended a warm welcome to the Rotary members, while local chapters are eager to showcase Taipei's rich culture, exceptional cuisine, and the remarkable impacts of Rotary's initiatives. Rotary members are actively involved in sustainable, community-based projects globally, including science education programs for rural schools, support for Indigenous communities, computer refurbishing to tackle e-waste, and companionship services for senior citizens.



Community Economic Development, India

During the early stages of a global grant project to support mothers and their children, the COVID-19 pandemic forced the Rotary Club of Hiranandani Estate in Maharashtra state to reimagine the enterprise. Rotarians pivoted to organize vaccination camps, distribute emergency food, and establish basic health care. The three-year effort reached more than 6,000 people across four communities in the city of Navi Mumbai. The club partnered with the Rotary Club of Metropolitan Lubbock, Texas, on the nearly \$50,000 global grant, which also provided 12 industrial sewing machines and offered training in their use. Namrataa Srivastav, project director, lauds the program as a "milestone, opening doors for future collaborations between Rotary and prestigious social service institutions."
