On **28** July 2020, we conducted the last meeting of the month virtually with 12 members attending. The video was off and on and it was fun by itself.


Three migrant families were given the standard ration kit, even though they had missed the bus earlier. Club President Raghavendra P gave away the kits on 29 July.

A TWO IN ONE PROGRAM OF WATER MANAGEMENT & URBAN FORESTRY—THE ROTA

Water is precious. Water is life. Water is scarce. But the question is how effective its use is? As Rotarians what we can do to make a judicious use of water? Can we go a step ahead and make use of water that is considered to be a waste? That is, is it possible to make use of water flowing out of kitchen and bathrooms? How productively we can use it for growing mini forests, that too, in an urban set up?

Rotary Club Surathkal's (RI 3181, Ch.27539) experiment on Miyawaki forestry tries to answer both the above questions: utilizing the waste water from kitchen and bath rooms and channelizing the same for growing a bunch of trees.

Rotary club of Surathkal has taken up the task of growing Miyawaki method of forestry as a part of its commitment to the Rotary major project 'Preserve Planet Earth'. The club is in the forefront of environmental care and protection since many years.

Miyawaki Urban Forest is developed on a small area of land measuring 20' x 100' located in a

corner of playground belonging to Vidyadayinee group of educational institutions managed by century old H.V.Sangha (R). In this 2000 sq. ft. area 200 saplings are planted. The saplings are from 20 varieties of species like **Teak, Mango**, **Jackfruit, Raktachandana, Doopa, Neem, Sandal, Booruga, Ashoka, Honne** etc. which are naturally grown in this area. Some of them are fruit yielding so that the students, birds and animals get their due share during the ripening seasons. The trees also yield valuable revenue to the educational institution over a period of time. More important than that is the contribution to the ecology which cannot be measured in terms of money.

Another feature of this project is the **utilization of waste water** of the Backward Community Boys Hostel located in the neighborhood. The kitchen and bathroom waters are filtered and supplied through pipelines to the forest so that not only the plants get water but even the precious waste water is re-utilized for a better cause.

All these have happened just at a cost of around Rs.25000 which covers the cost of preparing the land, cost of plants, filtering the water and laying of pipelines. This cost has been met by the Petroleum giant M.R.P.L. as a part of its CSR activity. Rotary Club of Surathkal has involved a number of organisations in this project like Nagarika Salaha Samithi Surathkal, Rotary Club Surathkal Educational and Charitable Trust, H.V.Sangha Surathkal, Backward Community Hostel Surathkal, Govinda Dasa College, Surathkal and Rotary Community Corpse Surathkal.

Note: Miyawaki Urban Forestry is a technique of developing small thick forests in areas where there is a shortage of space for tree plantation. It is propagated by a Japanese botanist and expert in plant ecology Akira Miyawaki. It helps in building dense native forests. It involves planting of many native species in a small area. It requires some care during the first three years after which it becomes maintenance-free. It is estimated that under this method the plant growth is 10 times faster and the resulting plantation is 30 times denser than usual. The Miyawaki method of afforestation is gaining popularity now-a-days owing to the growing realization of saving environment and utilizing the available space for greenery to a maximum extent.

"Miyawaki Urban forest project of RC Surathkal has become a Community Project in the real sense and this model can be very well adopted by all Rotary Clubs for environmental care and protection wherever some space is available" - Rtn. Ravindra Bhat, DGE, RI 3181 during his inaugural address of the Project on 21st June 2020.

"It was a problem for us to dispose of nearly 15000 litres of used water daily. Miyawaki forest has solved this major problem. I am also happy that the used water is no longer a waste. It has become a source for feeding 200 saplings." - Sri Radhesh, Superintendent, BCW Boys Hostel.
