

## **RIPE Shekhar Mehta conferred Honorary Doctorate**

The 9th Convocation of IIS (deemed to be University), Jaipur, was held on 9 April 2021 on the premises of the IIS. The event was graced by the distinguished presence of Padmashri Prof. SukhadeoThorat, the Chief Guest for the day as well as **Justice Dr. Shivraj V. Patil** (albeit virtually) and **Rtn.. Shekhar Mehta**, both of whom were conferred the degree of **D.Litt.** (**Honoris Causa**) on account of the stellar contribution made in their respective fields of work and influence.

Prof. Thorat is former Chairperson, University Grants Commission and ICSSR, New Delhi; Justice Dr. Patil is a former Judge of the Supreme Court of India; and, Rtn. Shekhar Mehta is the President of Rotary International for the year 2021-22. The solemn ceremony was presided over by Dr Ashok Gupta, Hon'ble Chancellor of the University and was joined by Prof. Mathur. Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor; members of the Board of Management and the Academic Council as well as other invited guests, including quite a few senior Rotarians.



The graduating class of 2020 had the proud privilege to be addressed by the inspiring words of wisdom spoken by the Chief Guest and also the two special recipients, each of whom egged the graduates on to listening to their heart's calling and reaping the benefits of a robust education.


The occasion saw the conferment of the degree of D.Litt. on Rtn. Shekhar Mehta for his invaluable contribution in the field of literary-promotion in India. The ceremonious manner in which the conferment was gone about added sheen and luster to the day's proceedings. Dr. Ashok Gupta presented Sh. Mehta with a shawl, a *shreephal* and a Citation along with the Degree, before the august gathering. In his Acceptance Speech, Rtn.. Mehta began by articulating his missionary zeal to see India literate by 2025 and exhorted the youth to come forward and partake in such a noble cause by helping India achieve the status of cent percent literacy. In addition to this, he reminded the graduates to grow from the inside out; to awake, arise and not stop until the goal is reached.

### FIRST SIGN OF CIVILISATION

Years ago anthropologist Margaret Mead was asked by a student what she considered to be the first sign of civilization in a culture. The student expected Mead to talk about fishhooks or clay pots or grinding stones.

But no. Mead said that the first sign of civilization in an ancient culture was a femur (thighbone) that had been broken and then healed. Mead explained that in the animal kingdom, if you break your leg, you die. You cannot run from danger, get to the river for a drink or hunt for food. You are meat for prowling beasts. No animal survives a broken leg long enough for the bone to heal.

A broken femur that has healed is evidence that someone has taken time to stay with the one who fell, has bound up the wound, has carried the person to safety and has tended the person through recovery. Helping someone else through difficulty is where civilization starts, Mead said.

We are at our best when we serve others.
