## Guest Speaker Dr. Tilak Ranjan Bera



Dr. Tilak Ranjan Bera is an acclaimed explorer, author, and Indologist who has dedicated over three decades of his life to uncover the untold history of ancient India. Dr Bera completed graduation from Calcutta Medical College and post-graduation from Mumbai University in medicine. He joined Indian Armed Forces in 1984. He served in the Armed Forces till 2007 prior to his pre-mature retirement. He was awarded the Fulbright-Nehru Fellowship (2011-12) because of his passion in Indology and was affiliated to the Yale University, USA during his Fellowship. He was also awarded Senior Research Fellowship by the Ministry of Culture, Government of India.

employs tools from genetics, anthropology, archaeology, and geo-physiology to trace early human migration and cultural exchanges. His work challenges conventional historical narratives, suggesting India as the origin of modern civilization. He has authored several books and conducted ground-breaking research on ethnic links between India and regions like Egypt and the Mediterranean. Dr. Bera's contributions continue to inspire fresh perspectives on the antiquity and global influence of Indian civilization.

Dr Bera not only delivered lectures in Yale University but also was invited to do the same at the Bar Ilan University, Tel Aviv, Israel. He has delivered lectures in the Asiatic Society, Kolkata; Vivekananda Science Circle, Ramkrishna Mission, Golpark, Kolkata; IIT Delhi; Sangam Talks, New Delhi and many other national and international conferences. Many of his lectures are available on the internet and uploaded by the respective institutes.

In a garage outside Salinas, California, young people who are learning to restore classic cars are doing more than developing a skill — they are reclaiming their futures. This training program provides mentorship and, for some, a path away from gang involvement toward meaningful employment. Graduates leave with certifications, practical experience, and hope. This is

what Rotary's Vocational Service Month celebrates each January — the power of bringing together people with unique skills to do good in the world. It reminds us that integrity isn't just about our actions matching our words. Integrity is in everything we do. The California automotive program has been such a success because it was built on integrity. Members of the Rotary Club of Carmel-by-the-Sea didn't assume they knew what the community needed. They listened. They learned there was a shortage of skilled mechanics as well as a large number of young people lacking job training. They recognized that technical skills alone wouldn't be enough, so they partnered with Rancho Cielo, a nonprofit offering counseling and support services alongside vocational training. That is The Four-Way Test in action. Those four simple questions help us not judge others but guide us toward genuine, effective service. Consider our commitment to ending polio. For nearly 40 years, we have promised the world's children we will eliminate this disease. Despite obstacles, we persist, and today we are closer to defeating the virus. Keeping this promise is the very definition of integrity. The same integrity must drive our

## RCC Ranihati Eye Camp



An Eye Camp was successfully conducted at RCC Ranihati, where approximately 160 individuals underwent eye examinations. Of these, 106 beneficiaries were advised to use spectacles, while around 16 patients were identified as requiring cataract surgery. The camp commenced at 10:00 a.m. and due to the overwhelming response and demand from the local community, continued smoothly until 4:00 p.m.

The initiative was very well received by the residents, who expressed their appreciation and enthusiasm for organizing similar health camps in the future. We sincerely thank the organizers of RCC Ranihati for their excellent arrangements, which contributed significantly to the smooth and effective conduct of the camp.

RCC Ranihati is a highly active and vibrant centre, undertaking several impactful community initiatives. They conduct stitching classes and supply high-quality women's garments to various organizations, creating substantial employment opportunities. Through these programs, many students and homemakers have been empowered to start small businesses, work from home, and contribute meaningfully to their family incomes. Additionally, the RCC runs regular computer training programs, where students complete certified courses that enhance their employability.

It was a pleasure to collaborate with such a dynamic RCC, and we look forward to undertaking more projects with them in the future, based on their needs and community requirements.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to President Rtn. Debnath Chattopadhyay for arranging the medical team and for personally examining several patients and offering valuable guidance on critical eye-related issues. We also express our sincere appreciation to Hon. Secretary Rtn. Ashok Kr. Basu for his dedicated presence at the project site throughout the day, actively assisting in addressing concerns and discussing ways to provide future support.

Subject to these modifications the draft By Laws were approved and passed as there were no other suggestions or objections. The Chairman will circulate the final version of the By Laws.
