RAWA IDLI

Take 1/4th (one-fourth) kg Semolina (Bombay Rawa). Fry Rawa well with ghee till you get

aroma. Put it in a vessel and allow it to cool. Then mix it with salt, Curd and add chopped coriander leaves.

For seasoning: Take ghee add mustard, when mustard splutters add 1 table spoon Channa dal, 1 table spoon wad dal and a fistful Cashewnuts. Fry these and Then add finely chopped green chillies and curry leaves (Kadipalta) Fry well.

Add this seasoning to Rawa-Curd mixture, mix it and keep it ascide for 1 (one) hour. After one hour the consistency of the batter should be like Idli batter. If necessary add more curd to bring it proper consistency.

Grease Idli vessel with ghee, add batter and steam for 15 to 20 minutes. See of the idli is cooked. If not steam for some more time.

Put off the flame after opening the Idli vessel. After 5 minutes you will get hot Rawaldlies. Eat it hot with ghee and green chutney. Green Chutney is prepared with coconut and coriander leaves. Rawa-Idlis are vey delicious and healthy too. ¼ kg. Rawa makes about 10 normal size Idlis.



Know your Rotary Few Important Things About the Rotary.

1. DEFINITION OF ROTARY

How do you describe the organization called "Rotary"? There are so many characteristics of a Rotary club as well as the activities of a million Rotarians. There are the features of service, internationality, fellowship, classifications of each vocation, development of goodwill and world understanding, the emphasis of high ethical standards, concern for other people an many more descriptive qualities. In 1976 the Rotary International Board of Directors was interested creating a concise definition of the fundamental aspects of Rotary. The turned to the three men who were then serving on Rotary's Public Relation Committee and requested that a one-sentence definition of Rotary be pre pared. After numerous drafts, the committee presented this definition, which has been used ever since in various Rotary publications: "Rotary is an organization of business and professional person united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build goodwill and peace in the world."Those 31 words are worth remembering when someone asks, "What is a Rotary club?"

2. A BRIEF ROTARY HISTORY

The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois, USA, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul P. Harris, an attorney who wished to recapture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The name "Rotary" derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices. Rotary's popularity spread throughout the United States in the decade that followed; clubs were chartered from San Francisco to New York. By 1921, Rotary clubs had been formed on six continents, and the organization adopted the name Rotary International a year later.

As Rotary grew, its mission expanded beyond serving the professional and social interests of club members. Rotarians began pooling their resources and contributing their talents to help serve communities in need. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its principal motto: Service Above Self. Rotary also later embraced a code of ethics, called "The 4-Way Test" that has been translated into hundreds of languages.

3. FIRST NAMES OR NICKNAMES

From the earliest days of Rotary, members have referred to each other on a first-name basis. Since personal acquaintanceship and friendship are cornerstones of Rotary, it was natural that many clubs adopted the practice of setting aside formal titles in conversations among members. Individuals who normally would be addressed as Doctor, Professor, Mister, the Honorable or Sir are regularly called Joe, Bill, Charley or Jerry by other Rotarians. The characteristic Rotary club name badge fosters the first-name custom.

In a few areas, such as Europe, club members use a more formal style in addressing fellow members. In other parts of the world, mainly in Asian countries, the practice is to assign each new Rotarian a humorous nickname which relates to some personal characteristic or which is descriptive of the member's business or profession. A member nicknamed "Oxygen" is the manufacturer of chemical gas products. "Trees" is the nickname for the Rotarian in the lumber business, "Building" is the contractor, "Paper" is the stationery or office supply retailer. Other members might carry nicknames like "Muscles," "Foghorn" or "Smiles" as commentaries on their physical features.

The nicknames are frequently a source of good-natured fun and fellowship. But whether a Rotarian is addressed by a given first name or a nickname, the spirit of personal friendship is the initial step which opens doors to all other opportunities for service.

Rotary International's Enduring Commitment to Global Peace and Understanding

Rotary International has long been dedicated to promoting peace and understanding on a global scale. As an organization of service-minded professionals, Rotary has actively sought ways to foster international cooperation and address the root causes of conflict. From the early 20th century to the present, Rotary's initiatives have had a lasting impact on global peace efforts, focusing on education, dialogue, and humanitarian action. The organization's work, particularly during and after World War II, demonstrates its unwavering commitment to building a more peaceful and just world.



The Institutes of International Understanding



One of the earliest examples of Rotary's commitment to peace came in 1934, when Rotarians in Nashville, Tennessee, initiated a program aimed at fostering international understanding. This event, which included 11 days of public meetings featuring prominent authors, economists, scientists, and political figures, addressed critical issues like the global economy, world peace, and scientific advancements. The program, which came to be known as the Institutes of International Understanding, sought to bridge cultural and intellectual divides, encouraging people to think beyond national borders and recognize the interconnectedness of the world.

The success of this initiative led Rotary International to encourage other clubs to replicate the Nashville model. By 1936, Rotary had endorsed the creation of similar institutes in other parts of the world, particularly in the Americas, Australia, and New Zealand. Over the next decade, more than 900 Rotary clubs organized these educational events, drawing thousands of people eager to learn about global issues and the importance of international cooperation. The Rotary Foundation helped fund speakers' expenses, making these discussions accessible to communities that might not otherwise have had the resources to host such events.

The Institutes of International Understanding became a

platform for open dialogue about global challenges, fostering awareness and empathy across borders. By bringing together people from diverse backgrounds and perspectives, these institutes helped to nurture a spirit of mutual respect and collaboration, essential ingredients for lasting peace.

Rotary Amid World Conflict: A Call for Peace During World War II

The onset of World War II in 1939 deeply affected Rotary International, pushing the organization to reaffirm its commitment to peace. In 1940, at the height of the conflict, Rotary delegates at the annual convention adopted the statement Rotary Amid World Conflict. This powerful declaration emphasized that Rotary's core values—freedom, justice, truth, respect for human rights—could not thrive in an environment of violence and oppression. The statement concluded that "where freedom, justice, truth, sanctity of the pledged word, and respect for human rights do not exist, Rotary cannot live nor its ideal prevail."

Walter D. Head, then president of Rotary International, called on Rotarians to seek better ways of resolving international differences than through warfare. His call was a plea for diplomacy, understanding, and cooperation rather than violence. This statement marked a significant turning point in Rotary's history, underscoring the organization's resolve to work for peace in a world torn by war.

In addition to public statements, The Rotarian magazine played an important role in promoting peace during and after the war. The magazine published essays by leading figures, such as politicians, philosophers, and human rights advocates, discussing the importance of peace and the role that individuals and organizations could play in fostering global stability. These essays, compiled into collections like A World to Live In (1942) and Peace Is a Process (1944), offered readers valuable insights into the causes of conflict and the paths to peace. The magazine continued this series into the post-war years with Peace Demands Action (1947), reinforcing the idea that peace is an ongoing process that requires active engagement from all people and nations.










