Rotary History Friendship Trees : Paul Harris' Lasting Symbol of Goodwill

As Rotary's president emeritus, travelled extensively during the 1920s and 1930s, often accompanied by his wife, Jean. During these trips, the nature-loving Harris planted trees to symbolize goodwill and friendship.

In the fall of 1932, Harris embarked on a five-week tour of European Rotary clubs and planted trees along the way.

"Wednesday forenoon I planted my first tree of friendship in European soil. It seemed to me especially appropriate that it took place in Germany — in its metropolis — Berlin. The planting occurred in a sports platz formerly devoted to war purposes, and a large number including Rotarians, city officials, and others were in attendance."

Ever since, Rotarians have planted trees in the name of fellowship, friendship, and community service. These trees, which can be found worldwide, have grown into enduring monuments of Rotary's ideals.

Later in his tour of Europe, Harris also planted trees in Estonia, Norway, and Sweden.

Planting trees became a hallmark of his travels, including in Australia, Brazil, Japan, Mexico, and New Zealand. In "My Road to Rotary," Harris recalled, "With the cooperation of Rotarians and local governments, I have planted friendship trees in the parks and playgrounds on five continents of the world and even on some of the major islands of the seas. Our trees stood as symbols of international understanding and good-will."

Other Rotary presidents also observed the tradition. In 1931-32, then-RI president Sydney W. Pascall planted trees at the sites of Rotary clubs he visited, reportedly at Paul Harris' suggestion.

Not all of the trees were planted outside the United States. The Harrises often entertained visiting Rotarians and dignitaries in their Chicago home and planted trees with their guests to mark the occasion. They called the garden their Friendship Garden.

Rotarians continue to plant trees to symbolize enduring friendships and fellowship, to beautify parks and communities, and to contribute to a greener world.

ROTARY CLUB OF HONAVAR: EMPOWERING WOMEN THROUGH MENSTRUAL HYGIENE MANAGEMENT

Menstrual hygiene is an essential aspect of health and well-being, yet it is often shrouded in silence and stigma. Recognizing the importance of this issue, the Rotary Club of Honavar has taken

proactive steps to address menstrual hygiene challenges, ensuring that everyone, especially young girls, has the knowledge and resources to manage menstruation with dignity and health. As part of Rotary International's Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) program, we have been working relentlessly to break the stigma, promote awareness, and provide access to necessary sanitary products and hygiene education.

The Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) program has several clear and impactful goals. First, it aims to ensure that every person has access to clean, safe menstrual products. Second, it focuses on spreading awareness about maintaining proper hygiene during menstruation. Third, it encourages healthy habits that promote overall menstrual health. Lastly, the program seeks to break the social taboos surrounding menstruation, enabling individuals to talk openly about their menstrual health without shame or fear.

The Rotary Club of Honnavar has been a pioneer in driving awareness about menstrual hygiene, especially in rural areas. This year alone, we have conducted the MHM program in 10 schools across Honavar and surrounding rural regions. These workshops have reached more than 800 girl students, providing them with essential information on menstrual hygiene, health practices, and the importance of maintaining personal hygiene during menstruation.

Our outreach efforts have included schools such as RES Haldipur High School, Janata Vidyalaya Kasarkod, St. Thomas High School, New English High School, Jnaneshwari English Medium High School Karki, Holy Rosary Convent High School, Govt High School Manki, and MPE Society Central High School. In each of these schools, students were given the opportunity to learn about the biological aspects of menstruation, how to manage menstrual health, and how to maintain proper hygiene throughout the menstrual cycle. More than 800 girl children have covered so far.

The program was made even more impactful with the support of our distinguished resource persons, all of whom are doctors and healthcare professionals. These selfless individuals took time from their busy schedules to educate students, answer their questions, and guide them on how to safely and hygienically manage menstruation. The doctors who contributed their expertise include:

Their contributions have been instrumental in creating a safe and open space for girls to ask questions and learn about menstrual hygiene in an informative and supportive environment.

In addition to the workshops and health talks, our club has been actively involved in the distribution of sanitary products to girls in need, ensuring they have the tools to manage menstruation with dignity and comfort. The provision of sanitary products is a vital part of the MHM program, as many girls in rural areas may not have access to affordable or hygienic options. By distributing sanitary products, we help remove one barrier to maintaining proper menstrual health.

Beyond the educational and product-based initiatives, our club is also advocating for public policies that integrate menstrual health management into school curriculums and communities. This long-term approach aims to create a systemic change that ensures menstrual hygiene management is prioritized in schools, healthcare facilities, and local government policies.

We owe the success of these initiatives to the collective efforts of the doctors, teachers, school principals, headmasters, and volunteers who have supported the MHM program. Their dedication to improving the health and well-being of young girls is commendable and deserves our heartfelt thanks.

As the Rotary Club of Honnavar continues its mission to create awareness and break the stigma surrounding menstruation, we recognize that the journey is ongoing. But with every workshop, every sanitary product distributed, and every conversation sparked, we are one step closer to a society where menstrual health is openly discussed, and all individuals have access to the resources and education they need.

We are grateful to everyone who has been part of this transformative journey, and we look forward to continuing our work to ensure that every young girl can navigate menstruation with confidence, dignity, and the knowledge that their health matters.

Know your Rotary A few important things about the Rotary

1. THE CLASSIFICATION PRINCIPLE

Virtually all membership in Rotary was based upon a "classification." Basically a classification describes the distinct and recognized business or professional service which the Rotarian renders to society. The principle of Rotary classification is somewhat more specific and precise. In determining the classification of a Rotarian it is necessary to look at the "principal or recognized business or professional activity of the firm, company or institution" with which an active member is connected or "that which covers his principal and recognized business or professional activity." It should be clearly understood that classifications are determined by activities or services to society rather than by the position held by a particular individual. In other words, if a person is the president of a bank, he or she is not classified as "bank president" but under the classification "banking," It is the principal and recognized activity of a business or professional establishment or the individual's principal and recognized business or professional activity that determines the classification to be established and loaned to a qualified person. For example, the permanently employed electrical engineer, insurance adjuster, or business manager of a railroad company, mining company, manufacturing concern, hospital, clinic, etc., may be considered for membership as a representative of the particular work he or she may be doing personally or as a representative of the firm, company, or institution for which the professional service is being done. The classification principle also permits business and industries to be separated into distinct functions such as manufacturing, distributing, retailing and servicing. Classifications may also be specified as distinct and independent divisions of a large corporation or university within the club's territory, such as a school of business or a school of engineering. Though the classification principle is not as dominant as it once was it is still important that we make an effort to assure that each Rotary club represents a cross section of the business and professional service of the community.

2. EXCHANGE OF CLUB BANNERS

One of the colorful traditions of many Rotary clubs is the exchange of small banners, flags or pennants. Rotarians traveling to distant locations often take banners to exchange at "make up" meetings as a token of friendship. Many clubs use the decorative banners they have received for attractive displays at club meetings and district events. The Rotary International board recognized the growing popularity of the banner exchange back in 1959 and suggested that those clubs which participate in such exchanges give careful thought to the design of their banners in order that they be distinctive and expressive of the community and country of which the club is a part. It is recommended that banners include pictures, slogans or designs which portray the territorial area of the club. The board was also mindful of the financial burden such exchange may impose upon some clubs, especially in popular areas where many visitors make up and request to exchange. In all instances, clubs are cautioned to exercise discretion and moderation in the exchange of banners in order that the financial obligations do not interfere with the basic service activities of the club. Exchanging club banners is a very pleasant custom, especially when a creative and artistic banner tells an interesting story of community pride. The exchange of banners is a significant tradition of Rotary and serves as tangible symbol of our international fellowship.

Rotary Vocational Service Month: Celebrating

Professional Excellence in January

January marks Vocational Service Month in Rotary International's annual calendar, a time when Rotarians worldwide reflect on and promote the importance of ethical practices, professional excellence and the dignity of all occupations. This month underscores one of Rotary's five core avenues of service: Vocational Service, which calls upon members to use their skills and expertise to serve their communities and foster high ethical standards in business and professions.

Understanding Vocational Service

Vocational Service is rooted in Rotary's history and mission. It aligns closely with the second object of Rotary: to encourage and foster high ethical standards in business and professions, recognize the worthiness of all occupations and dignify each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society. Through Vocational Service, Rotarians are encouraged to apply their talents, knowledge and resources to solve pressing societal challenges and inspire others by example.

Key Objectives of Vocational Service

Promoting High Ethical Standards: Rotarians uphold the Four-Way Test in their professional dealings:

Is it the truth?
Is it fair to all concerned?
Will it build goodwill and better friendships?
Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

Recognizing the Value of All Occupations: Vocational Service emphasizes that every profession contributes to the community's well-being and development.

Leveraging Professional Expertise for Service: Members are encouraged to use their professional skills to support projects, mentor others and address local and global issues.

Encouraging Youth and Career Development: Through programs like Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) and Rotary Youth Exchange, Vocational Service Month inspires young people to explore ethical practices and career growth.

How Rotary Clubs Celebrate Vocational Service Month

During January, Rotary clubs engage in various activities to highlight vocational service's importance. These include:

- Career Guidance and Mentorship: Clubs organize career counseling sessions for students and young professionals. Experienced Rotarians mentor participants, sharing insights on career paths, industry trends and ethical practices.
- Ethics Workshops: Rotarians host workshops or seminars to discuss ethics in the workplace and how professionals can contribute to fostering integrity and trust in their industries.
- Recognizing Vocational Excellence: Clubs honor outstanding professionals who demonstrate high ethical standards, leadership and dedication to their communities.
- Job Fairs and Skills Training: Rotary clubs collaborate with local businesses and organizations to conduct job fairs or provide vocational training for unemployed individuals, empowering them with new skills and opportunities.

- Promoting Rotary's Code of Conduct: Clubs revisit and promote Rotary's Code of Conduct, which encourages
 Rotarians to act responsibly and ethically in their professions.
- Rotary Networking Events: These events provide platforms for Rotarians to share their expertise, collaborate on community projects and learn from each other's experiences.

Examples of Vocational Service Projects

- Scholarship Programs: Providing scholarships to students pursuing vocational training or higher education in specific fields.
- Professional Development Workshops: Hosting training sessions for teachers, healthcare workers and other professionals to improve their skills.
- Apprenticeship Opportunities: Partnering with businesses to offer apprenticeships for underprivileged youth.
- Business Ethics Campaigns: Raising awareness about ethical business practices in local communities.








