## "ROTARY ANN'S"

KYR-003 Pamphlet Prepared by Rtn Balaji Veerappan, Rotary Club Salem South. In Rotary clubs throughout the world, wives of male members are affectionately called "Rotary Ann's." This designation grew out of an interesting historical occasion.

In the year 1914, when San Francisco Rotarians boarded a special train to attend the Rotary Convention being held in Houston, until the train stopped in Los Angeles, the only woman aboard was the wife of Rotarian Bru Brunnier. As the train picked up additional convention-bound delegates, Mrs. Ann Brunnier was introduced as the Rotarian's Ann.

On the train's arrival at the Houston depot, a delegation greeted the West Coast Rotarians. One of the greeters was Guy Gundaker of Philadelphia, whose wife was also named Ann.

During the rousing demonstration, someone started the Rotary Ann chant. The two petite ladies, Ann Brunnier and Ann Gundaker, were hoisted to the men's shoulders and paraded about the hall.

The group loved the title given to the two women named Ann. Immediately the same term of endearment was used for all of the wives in attendance, and the name "Rotary Ann" is here to stay.
