Archana and Atul Chandra Goswami Memorial Award for a Visually Impaired Student 2024-2025

This year's awardee for the Archana and Atul Chandra Goswami Memorial Award for a Visually Impaired Studentis Sri Diganta Nath from Srimanta Sankar Mission Blind School, Barhampur, Nagaon. He is a student of Class X and has been chosen for his proficiency in music. Diganta has 100% visual impairment. He has been performing in public platforms for the past few years. He has participated and won accolades in many singing

competitions including those organised by DY365, News Live, Assam Talks and NKTV. Diganta has himself composed the lyrics for a couple of songs that he sings. He excitedly tells us that he has had the opportunity of sharing the stage with Zubin Garg a couple of times. Diganta is a very talented boy. He has a natural talent for music despite having no formal training. He simply sings by listening to songs.



Deva Kanta Kakati Memorial Vocational Excellence Award 2024-2025

The Deva Kanta Kakati Memorial Vocational Excellence Award 2024-2025 was conferred on Sri Jayanta Kumar Das of Udalguri for his commendable work in the field of environment and wildlife preservation, more particularly, in the pursuit of advocating the initiative among children and youth of Udalguri and the neighbouring regions.

Jayanta Dasworked as Hony Wildlife Warden of Assam (Udalguri district) from 2012-2020 for the

conservation of nature and wildlife. Currently, he is the Joint Secretary of Kaziranga Wildlife Society. As a correspondent of The Assam Tribune, he has been reporting on wild life conservation since 2007. He was the chief coordinator for Assam of "Elephants on the Line" programme. It was a joint programme of India, Bhutan and USA for the mitigation of human-elephantconflict in Assam, especially in Udalguri, during

2013-2016.

Jayanta Kumar Das has establishedthe Kanaklata Das Biodiversity Park at Kalaigaon in 2009 at a 60 bigha plot of land donated by his father, freedom fighter late Pani Ram Das. This small man made forest is now the house of smaller animals, birds and reptiles. So far he and his team have rescued 1 European black vulture, 7 pythons, 26 Monitor lizards, 13 barn owls, 4 spotted owls, 1 tokay gecko, 2 baby foxes, 6 tortoisesand

3 Asian palm civets, among others.

Sri Das has been organising awareness campaigns in the villages of Udalguri district since 1986 for conservation of nature and wildlife. As an active member of the Assam Science Technology and Environment Council, he has also been actively crusading against superstitions and blind beliefs since 2012. Jayanta Kumar Das is a Life member of PragjyotishAmateur Astronomers Association, Guwahati



Nirmali Kakati Memorial Vocational Excellence Award 2024-2025

The *Nirmali Kakati Memorial Vocational Excellence Award* 2024-25 was conferred on Dr. Sriparna Bhuyan Baruah for encouraging and motivating entrepreneurship and livelihood amongst women.

Dr Sriparna B Baruah is a Development Professional with 35 years of work experience in Management Education and in Small and Medium Enterprise Development. Dr Baruah was associated with the Indian Institute of Entrepreneurship as Head (Centre for Industrial Extension) and as Director i/c. Dr Baruah is curently associated with the North East Handloom and

Handicraft Development Corporation (NEHHDC) as Advisor (Livelihoods and Entrepeneurship)

During her career span of 35 years, in the initial ten years when she was working with the Assam Institute of Management, Dr Baruah played a pioneering role in promoting Management Education in N.E India. Later, when she joined the Indian Institute of Entrepreneurship her experience for more than two decades has been on Entrepreneurship and Livelihood Promotion. Dr Baruah has extensive experience in action research and projects relating to development of livelihood clusters specifically

in all the eight states of North Eastern Region of India.

Dr Baruah has also been working towards developing the eco-system for promoting women entrepreneurs and start-ups in the social sector. For the last five years, she has been actively involved in facilitating creation of a start-up eco-system in North East India and has been regularly mentoring and handholding existing and potential start-ups in opportunity guidance and scaling up. Her strong academic experience and background has helped in contributing towards documenting case studies of various successful livelihood initiatives. She has also presented papers and shared Indian experiences of small enterprise promotion in both national and international forums.

Dr Baruah has represented NE India in various international forums and lead Business Delegations delegations globally. She has also represented the country as a speaker in international conferences in countries like Latin America and MalaysiaShe regularly provides academic and consultancy support to MBA departments

of all major universities of North East India ,institutions like TISS, NIRD, AASC etc.Dr Baruah has been a member of the Board of Management of the School of Vocational Education (SOVET) IGNOU, the North East Network(NEN), the Cancer Research Foundation (CRF), BRTC A BIRAC-KIIT-TBI initiative, India Women Network, Council for Social and Digital Development (CSDD),Margdarshak Advisory and is actively involved with various industry associations like CII, FICCI and FINER.Dr Baruah is currently an independent Director in the board of IIT Guwahati Technology Innovation and Development Foundation and the SM Corrporation Ltd.

Dr Sriparna B Baruah received the 'BHARAT VIKAS AWARD' for her contribution to the Livelihood Sector from the Institute of Self Reliance on 19th November 2017. She also received the lifetime achievement award for her contribution to the field of entrepreneurship development and livelihoods from NFED (National Foundation for Entrepreneurship Development) on 8th March 2022.

MEDICAL CAMP CONDUCTED AT KALYANI NIWAS

On 30th March 2025, Rotary Club Of Gauhati South (RCGS) organized a free medical camp in the campus of Kalyani Niwas, Rupnagar, Ulubari, Guwahati, a home for destitute children (Girls). Medical examination for various illnesses was carried out for the inmates by a group of doctors from Nemcare Hospital led by Rn. Dr. Anil Mahanta. Apart from Rtn Dr. Mahanta, the other doctors were Dr. Swaswati Sanyal Choudhury, DR. Mridu Pawan Saikia and Dr Abhay Garg.

A total of 61 persons were aexamined by the doctors. Among them, there were children from *Kalyani Niwas*, a homefor destitute children, *Asha Neer*, a home for handicapped children, *Amaya Chaliha Open Shelter*

for Boys and few staff members from the Kalyani Niwas. After the check up free medicines were distributed to them by RCGS. During the camp, officials from Kalyani Niwas lead by Rtn. Krishna Barua, Secretary of the organization, helped and assisted the team for smooth conduct of the camp.

After the closing of the medical camp, the children of Kalyani Niwas presented a beautiful cultural programme in which a visually impaired child also rendered a melodioussong. This was followed by a lunch which the visiting Rotarians and doctors had with the children of Kalyani Niwas.

MINUTES OF THE 2330th WEEKLY REGULAR MEETING HELD ON 28th FEBRUARY, 2025

The 2330th WRM was held on 28th September 2024 at Hotel Rajdhani Regency on 28 February 2025. The President called the meeting to order at 6.40 PM. After the National Anthem, the President welcomed all the Rotarians, Annes and guests present. The President greeted Rtn. Jayanta Goswami on his birthday and honoured him with a rose for offering the fellowship.

The President informed the house about two training programme scheduled to be held on 3rd an 4th March at Chapaidang, Bonda and Rajabari and requested Rotarians to participate in the programme. Rtn. (Dr.) Gayatree Goswamee introduced Dr.(Mrs.) RitusmitaGoswami, the guest speaker of the day. Being a National science day, the club celebrated the day though a discussion on different environmental issues initiated by Dr Goswami, a noted environmental scientist and faculty member of Tata institute of social Sciences (TISS), Guwahati . She has vast experience on environmental issues based on her research work for last several years. She spoke on "Climate Change facts and Concerns: Confronting Our New Reality". Her speech highlighted the multifaceted impacts of climate change including the observed impacts on ecosystems, food productivity, water quality, human health and socio economic conditions. She emphasised that forclimate change mitigation we have to work together with wholehearted participation. Climate awareness at the individual level and society as a whole is an urgent need in this regard. Individual actions like reducing energy consumption, waste minimization and

adopting sustainable lifestyles can be the viable options for reducing green house gas emission to a great extent. Moreover, there is a need for immediate and significant global action to limit warming and avoid the most catastrophic impacts. During the discussion members shared their views and interacted with Dr. Goswami on differentaspects of climate change.

Rtn.(Dr.)Rabin Mazumder while offering vote of thanks shared some facts related to pollution of the Baharalu river.

Rtn. Manjusri Baruah presented the statistics of the meeting in the absence of secretary. 20 Rotarians, 4 Annes, and 2 guests with a total of 26 persons were present in the meeting and the sunshine collection was Rs.450.00.

The President adjourned the meeting at 7.35 PM after the rendition of the *JatiyaSangeet*.
