

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A HOME FOR HEADQUARTERS

The idea that Rotary should own its headquarters dates back at least to the 1920 convention, when Albert Adams, 1919-20 Rotary president, told attendees that he hoped to someday see the headquarters in a beautiful building of Rotary's own.


The National Association of Rotary Clubs — now Rotary International — formed in 1910 and had its headquarters in the Chicago, Illinois, USA, office of its secretary, Chesley R. Perry. In March 1911, Rotary's headquarters moved to rented space in the First National Bank Building, one of many downtown Chicago rentals.

In 1914, Rotary set up its headquarters in the Karpen Building on South Michigan Avenue. Citing increasing rent after World War I, Rotary moved to the Atwell Building in 1923, then to several more buildings after that. After so many moves, some Rotary leaders began to call for a world headquarters that RI itself would own. Delegates at the 1921 convention attempted to pass a resolution to purchase a site for a building of Rotary's own, but they were unsuccessful. The 1928 convention delegates adopted a similar resolution, which had two notable conditions: There would be no increase in the per capita tax or assessment on clubs, and the site was to be in Chicago.

Finally, in 1943, the debate over sites got underway when the RI Board appointed a headquarters committee consisting of 1939-40 RI Director Roy Weaver from Colorado, 1942-43 RI Director Fred Haas from Nebraska, and 1935-36 RI President Ed Johnson.

The 1944 convention delegates approved expanding the headquarters search beyond Chicago. Many rotarians however reinforced the connection between Rotary and the city, noting that "Chicago business and civic leaders have a justifiable pride centered in the fact that Rotary is an offspring of Chicago."

Rotary leaders gathered at 1600 Ridge Avenue for a groundbreaking ceremony in 1953, and the building opened in August of the following year. In that first month, 250 Rotary members and friends visited to see it for themselves.Despite initial room to grow and a later addition, Rotary eventually outgrew that space. In 1987, Rotary purchased the building on Sherman Avenue in Evanston from Baxter Travenol Laboratories. Known today as One Rotary Center, that building is still home to Rotary International World Headquarters and welcomes more than 2,000 visitors a year.



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TREE PLANTATION PROGRAMME

A Tree Plantation Programme was organized on August 9th at the College of Veterinary Science, Assam Agricultural University, Khanapara, Guwahati, in the presence of District Governor Rtn. Sukhminder Singh, the First Lady, and Assistant Governor zone IX Rtn. Pranjal Kr Mena. Around 50 saplings, of various avenue, fruit bearing and commercial trees were planted in the Campus of veterinary Colleg.

Ceremonial plantation was done by DG Rtn. Sukhminder Singh, the First Lady, AG Pranjal Mena, and several other Rotarians of Rotary club of Gauhati South as well as Rotaractors from Rotaract club of South Guwahati.

INTERESTING TRIVIA



Before 1920, it was actually possible to send children through the U.S. Postal Service, but certain conditions had to be met. The children needed to weigh under 50 pounds, and stamps were attached to their clothing as payment. Surprisingly, this method was often more affordable than buying a train ticket. During the journey, the children would ride in the mail car of a train, where they were supervised and provided with food by the mail clerks. One remarkable instance of this unusual practice involved a child travelling over 700 miles from Florida to Virginia, with just 15 cents worth of stamps.
