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


The Rotary Foundation helps Rotary members to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating



The Foundation was created in June 1917 by Rotary International's sixth president, Arch C. Klumph, as an endowment fund for Rotary "to do good in the world." It has grown from an initial contribution of US\$26.50 to more than US\$1billion. Thanks to his vision and staunch advocacy, and the extraordinary generosity of Rotarians worldwide, that fund has become one of the world's leading humanitarian foundations and has spent more than \$4 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects.

Through its various programmes like the polio eradication programme, humanitarian grants programmes and educational programmes, Rotary has impacted large segments across the world. For as little as 60 cents, a child can be protected from polio; \$50 can provide clean water to help fight waterborne illness; \$500 can launch an anti-bullying campaign and create a safe environment for children.

By donating to Rotary Foundation we are able to touch the lives of countless deserving people across the globe, which otherwise would have been impossible. And equally important, our donations reach the most deserving and needy persons without any personal management hassles. The Foundation transforms our gifts into service projects that change lives both close to home and around the world. ROTARY NEWS

The earliest form of the magazine was *The Eastern Rotary Wheel*, founded and edited by Rtn. Alistar Mac Rae. It was published by A Mac Rae & Co., from Bombay in 1930. In 1947, Rtn. Alistar Mac Rae immigrated to South Africa and sold his business. The new owners continued the publication of *The Eastern Rotary Wheel*. In 1950, RI closed down its Middle Asia Office in Bombay and *The Eastern Rotary Wheel* also ceased publication.

PDG Debu Hosali from Bangalore, who was publishing the magazine Mysindia, took over the responsibility of bringing out a Rotary magazine in 1952. The first issue of *Rotary News* came out on July 15, 1952. The magazine covered areas comprising of India, Burma, Ceylon, Pakistan and Afghanistan. The magazine was printed in the Hosali printing press and in 1960, the circulation was about 7,000. This continued well into the 1960s.

In 1973, steps were taken to designate *Rotary News* as the Official Regional Magazine of Rotary International. A committee was set up to take over the magazine from its private owner, PDG Hosali. PDG Ramesh Pai, of the Manipal Group, brought out the magazine; PDG Hosali continued to be the editor while PDG Ramesh Pai was the publisher. The magazine covered the areas India, Bangladesh, Burma, Nepal, Sikkim, Sri Lanka and Pakistan.

On November 30, 1982, the Rotary News Trust was formed and registered at Udupi by PDG T. Ramesh U. Pai. The magazine was taken over by the Trust from the

Manipal Group. The first secretary of the Trust was PDG M K Panduranga Setty.

In 1983, a Hindi version of the magazine, titled *Rotary Samachar* was introduced. The first issue was released by RI President-elect William B Skelton at the Asia Zone II Institute at Calcutta on January 8, 1983. Rtn. George Paul from RC Bangalore looked after the editorial content. PDG Madhura Chatrapathy was the Associate Editor.In July 1984, RI recognised *Rotary News* and *Rotary Samachar* as the official RI Regional Magazine.

In 1988, both the magazines were taken to Bombay for publishing and PDG Jyotindra Vakil was in charge. He was the Editor of the magazines and Secretary of the Trust from 1988 to 1990.

In November 1990, the magazines were shifted to Madras and PDG B Viswanatha Reddy administered the magazine as the Editor and publisher. In addition, he served as the Secretary of the Trust. The magazine was now designated as the official magazine for India, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh and Nepal. The first issue printed in November 1990 in Madras had 32 pages compared to the 24 pages that were being published out of Bombay.

The number of pages rose steadily and in 1966, totalling 64 pages and the magazine was printed in multi-colour.In 1998 there was a need to revamp the functioning of the magazine and in October, PDG Krishnan V Chari was made the Editor of the magazine and Secretary of the Trust.

From September 2005, Rtn. T K Balakrishnan took over as the Editor. The magazine was adjudged the 'Best Regional Magazine' then and the combined circulation of the magazines rose to 1,06,000 per month with a readership of 3,60,000.

Ms. Rasheeda Bhagat is currently the Editor of *Rotary News* and *Rotary Samachar*. She comes with 36 years of experience in Journalism and her brief is to widen the scope of the content, introduce new sections of general interest and give a fresh new look to the magazine. Today, Rotary News and Rotary Samachar enjoy a subscription base of 1,13,000 a month.

The next exciting development is to launch E version of Rotary News. The Rotary News website www.rotarynewsonline.org was launched.

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ROTARY COMMITS FUNDS TO POLIO OUTBREAK RESPONSE IN GAZA (ROTARY INTERNATIONAL)

The recent detection of variant poliovirus type-2 isolates in environmental samples and the confirmation of a 10-month-old child who has contracted polio in Gaza is a stark reminder that as long as polio exists anywhere, it is a threat everywhere. The ongoing crisis in Gaza has contributed to reduced routine immunization rates and an increased risk of vaccine-preventable diseases, including polio. The crisis also poses a significant challenge to fully implementing disease surveillance and vaccination campaigns.

The World Health Organization (WHO) considers there to be a high risk for the spread of this polio strain within Gaza and internationally, particularly given the current situation's impact on public health services.

A humanitarian pause allowed a two-round polio vaccination campaign to begin in Gaza. The first round was successfully implemented from 1-12 September 2024 and vaccinated 559,161 children, or an estimated 95% of eligible children at the governorate level, according to independently conducted post-campaign monitoring.

The second round of the emergency polio vaccination

campaign in Gaza began on 14 October. The campaign started in Central Gaza, vaccinating children under ten years old with nOPV2, where children aged between 2-9 years old were also offered Vitamin A.

As of 23 October, the Polio Technical Committee for Gaza, including the Palestinian Ministry of Health, WHO, UNICEF, the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA), and partners have been compelled to postpone the third phase of the polio vaccination campaign. This final phase aimed to vaccinate 119,279 children across northern Gaza.

The current conditions, including ongoing attacks on civilian infrastructure, continue to jeopardize people's safety and movement in northern Gaza, making it impossible for families to bring their children for vaccination safely and health workers to operate.

Rotary has committed US\$500,000 to bolster the initiative, channelling these funds through a dedicated Polio Outbreak Response Fund. This contribution represents Rotary's sustained support to the WHO in combating polio globally.

Dipanwita Ghosh. The first prize was cinched by Rtn. P.M.Goswami and the second prize prize by Rtn. Majushri Barua.
