Report of the Club Assembly of the Rotary Club of Gauhati South

The Club Assembly of the Rotary Club of Gauhati South was convened on 18th July 2025 at Hotel Rajdhani Regency. President Rtn Priyama Goswami called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM, addressing the members with words of encouragement and unity for the Rotary year ahead.

- Rtn Devajyoti Hazarika, (Treasurer), presented the tentative budget for the Rotary year 2025–26 and welcomed all new members. He emphasized that new ideas would be appreciated and duly considered by the board.
- Rtn Dr. Anjana Choudhury Saikia, (Director Service Projects), shared the upcoming service initiatives planned for the year. She informed the members that a tree plantation drive would be held on 20th July at 4 PM at Faguna Rabha High School, Kahilipara. Furthermore, she outlined additional service projects including an eye check-up camp, a general health camp in remote regions, and an awareness programme for school children on the dangers of tobacco use. The impactful Animal Welfare Camp would continue in rural areas to help prevent livestock diseases. Two women's skill development training programmes and five "How to Face Interview" sessions for students are also scheduled for the year.
- Rtn Ranjan Bhuyan, (Director Membership), spoke on the importance of involving the next generation in Rotary. He encouraged the inclusion of younger members, especially those aged 40 and above, to ensure diverse perspectives. He stressed the importance of focusing on the quality rather than the quantity of new members.
- Rtn Dipak Bhagawati, (Director Administration), laid out plans to make regular meetings more vibrant with the inclusion of guest speakers. He proposed promoting fellowship through "Family Fridays" and member-sponsored events, and conveyed his full faith in the new team's leadership for a successful Rotary year.
- Rtn Atanu Kumar Chowdhury, (Director Public Image), appreciated the positive reputation of RCGS in District 3240. He acknowledged the club's consistent service delivery and assured members that he would strive to publish updates of all projects and services carried out by RCGS. He encouraged all members to share reports and photographs of their work so that it could be circulated in public domains and published in the press.
- Rtn Indira Bordoloi, (Literacy Chair), elaborated on several educational initiatives under the TEACH programme, including a training programme for teachers focusing on skill development. She discussed e-learning modules for students, child development projects, and the HAPPY SCHOOL initiative, through which schools lacking basic infrastructure would be provided with essential resources like digital boards, fans, and recreational materials such as carrom boards and volleyballs. She also mentioned programmes like book reading and storytelling sessions that are currently underway.
- Rtn Gayatri Bhattacharyya, (International Service Convener), presented ideas for vocational exchanges between Rotary clubs, emphasizing the value of skill-sharing across communities, both local and international. She proposed that such initiatives could prove transformative for both the club and its partner institutions. She also mentioned continuing participation in initiatives such as Polio Plus and the Rotary Family Exchange programme.
- Rtn P.D. Chowdhury, (Chair Strategic Planning), urged the club to embrace innovative ideas to enhance its vibrancy. He encouraged new members to share their views and contributions, and appealed to senior members who had stepped away to return and rejoin the fold, promising them a renewed and welcoming environment.
- Rtn Bhupendra Nath Das, (Community Service Chair), underlined the importance of organizing a board meeting involving all committee members to discuss and streamline the club's programme for the upcoming year.

With all inputs received and appreciated, President Rtn Priyama Goswami formally concluded the meeting at 6:55 PM, thanking the members for their valuable contributions and reaffirming the club's commitment to meaningful service.




Tree Plantation Programme



Kakaty were huge inspiration not just to me but to the whole club as well as the Annes and Rotarylets. GLORIOUS PAST OF THE RC GAUHATI SOUTH

It is always good to go down memory lane, and reflect on the bygone years of our club, the RC Gauhati South, and point out a few of its more important achievements of the earlier years of its life.

It is also hoped that the newer members of our Club will be interested to read about these achievements.



The spread of education among women and children, toilet facilities, sanitation etc. have always played a large part in formulating the Club's projects. Some instances of the ways in which our Club has endeavored to promote the high ideals of Rotary are listed below:-

- 1. An orphanage was adopted in North Guwahati, where, besides providing the necessary materials and money, all the Rotarians and their families went regularly and acted like close relatives to the children; (This 18 year old project unfortunately came to an end in 2002).
- 2. A drinking water supply and sanitation project was implemented under a Matching Grant from a Rotary clubs of Canada. A number of deep tube wells were bored to ensure perennial supply of potable water in some thickly populated rural areas. Several sanitary latrines were also constructed with the participation of the beneficiaries at two different locations. The concluding function, which was graced by the then Chief Minister, Assam, took place in 1986-87. Late Rtn. N.B. Barthakur who was the main person behind the successful implementation of this vast project was presented a Special Award personally by the then RI President.
- 3. RCCs (known as RVCs in those days) were formed at Maloibari and Athgaon.
- 4. Counselling programmes for vocational guidance, and functional literacy programmes were held in the adopted villages, and also in the local Institutions for the handicapped, namely, the deaf and the blind schools.
- 5. A number of lady entrepreneurs were trained in the craft of small-industrial activities in collaboration with the IETE;
- 6. Youth welfare activities, including Rotary Foundation programmes, e.g., GSE, RLYA Camps, formation of Rotaract and Interact clubs, etc. were undertaken.
- 7. Hepatitis-B Vaccination programmes were undertaken by our club in 1999-2000, and 2000-2001, both within the city and also in nearby rural areas. This was the first non Govt. organization to take up this vaccination programme.
- 8. In 1981, the club purchased two Oxygen Cylinders, as it was found that there was a great dearth of Oxygen Cylinders in Guwahati. Rtns. B.K. Bhuyan and D.K. Kakati, took charge of these cylinders, and for almost ten years, people from different parts of the city, as well as from the suburbs, benefited from these cylinders in times of emergency. It must be put on record that the entire family of Rtn. B.K.Bhuyan involved themselves in the distribution of the Oxygen cylinders. In 1999-2000, the club again donated three Oxygen cylinders to the local Vivekananda Kendra.
- 9. In 1999-2000, the Club adopted two schools, in accordance to the directive of the then District Governor. The Saraswati Shishu Niketan is flourishing, and the pre-Primary school at Satgaon Dalbari is also doing well. In 2003-04, the Club donated building materials as well as building expertise under the guidance of late Rtn. Hareswar Talukdar, to the school.
- 10. Eye Care and Treatment camps for the very poor were organized with the help of the RCC, Tribeni Chowk, Karara, in 2000-2001, and 2001-2002. The treatment was carried out at the Regional Institute of Opthalmology, Gauhati Medical College, where, besides other treatment, 90 patients were fitted with Intra-Ocular lenses.
- 11. An expensive equipment, (Rs.1100,000) for eye surgery was donated to the above Institute under a MATCHING GRANT.
- 12. Three Computers with all necessary accessories were donated to the local T.C.Girls' High School, under a Matching Grant from a Rotary Club in USA. (1999-2000).
- 13. Career Guidance programmes, and a course on "How to face an Interview" have been two of the most popular projects of the Club. The main architects of these courses were late Rtns. (Col) T.B.B.Lahkar, Hem Chandra Goswami, and B.K.Bhuyan.
- 14. THE Club undertook a unique project "Animal Welfare and Veterinary Health Check up camp" organized at the Bogol's Chowk area in the year 2000 2001. This programme won the DISTRICT ORIGINAL PROJECT AWARD. It is heartening to note that this project still continues to be a vibrant project of RGGS, very ably managed by Rtn. Bibeka Saika.

In another spectacular achievement, late Anne Nirmali Kakati of our club, received the highly prestigious JEAN HARRIS AWARD in 1997-98, for her exceptional service to women in the field of Economic Upliftment etc. Late Anne Nirmali Kakati was the first, and so far the only, recipient of this award from North East India.

In what is perhaps one of the major achievements of the Club, in 2002, its candidate, Dr. Nani Gopal Mahanta, was selected by RI as one of the 70 gifted scholars world wide, awarded the First WORLD PEACE SCHOLARSHIPS, to study Conflict Resolution at seven top selected universities in six countries. After this Our Club has not looked back and we have the distinction of sponsoring many Peace Scholars.

(I think that in the recent past, we have not been very successful in this area. The programme has been made simpler and we only need to advertise the Scholarship and its details. Interested candidates will apply themselves and only come to us for sponsorship.) ...
