## "Flag Hoisting"

The terms "Flag Hoisting" and Flag "Unfurling" may sound synonymous, but they involve distinct techniques and significance. The two terms are used to describe different flag ceremonies of the Indian Independence Day (August 15) and Republic Day (January 26) respectively.

On Independence Day the flag is hoisted and positioned at the base of the pole. The tricolor is then raised from the bottom to the top by the Prime Minister. Hoisting symbolizes the Nation's freedom from Colonial rule, marking the significance of the historical moment.

Key Differences of Independence Day and Republic Day.

The flag is hoisted (Raised from the bottom) and the Ceremony is led by the Prime Minister of India. It symbolizes India's independence from British rule. In contrast the Republic Day flag is tied first at the top of the pole. It is then unfurled or revealed by the President of India, which signifies the establishment of India as a Sovereign, Democratic Republic under its own Constitution.

My grandmother often recounted, with vivid emotion, the unforgettable day of August 15, 1947, in her village in Assam. The entire community had gathered — united in joy and hope — to celebrate the dawn of a free India. Patriotic songs filled the air, the national flag was proudly hoisted, and tears of joy were shared among villagers who had long yearned for this moment.

Her memories — of resilience, struggle, and renewed hope — have always been a source of inspiration for me. That day was not just a historical milestone; it was the birth of a new identity, a new purpose, and a collective dream.

As we commemorate our freedom, her story serves as a powerful reminder of the sacrifices made and the values we must continue to uphold. I am grateful for the opportunity to share this personal piece of histor

#### Personal anecdotes of pre-independent India...

My grandfather who resided in Dibrugarh, was a principled man of virtue. His personal life had challenges but the support of a joint family helped him to raise six children without his wife...my grandmother, passed away at her prime leaving my mother, the eldest child, a mere 16 year old or so and the youngest child, just a baby. Her father was involved passionately in the freedom movement spending time in and out of prison.

An interesting fact is that when my mother got married in 1944, she was made to wear khadi bridal attire...banning any foreign fabric into the household. Ma married Deuta at the age of 19 and one interesting episode she used to relate to us is that, special permission was sought to release her father on parole to give away his daughter's hand in marriage.

'Gora Paltans'... British officers wanted to come and see the bride at the wedding. It was an order met with some consternation and disapproval from the family but nothing could be done about it. Quiet compliance was the only way to maintain peace. This was probably to check if the reason of his parole was genuine.

Ma grew up in the ideals of Gandhiji which stayed with her all her life. Such were the days of preindependance in India at the time.

We only have memories....mostly bitter but now given to enjoy the fruits of freedom to be valued for eternity

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My grandfather had met SUBHASH CHANDRA BOSE at the DC's Bunglow on his visit to Gauhati way back on 31.8.1938.



She shared profound insights into the importance of mental health and the role of professional guidance in navigating life's complexities. She also provided a concise overview of business psychology. The President then announced that a special Soap Making training to the local women residents of Kharghuli area will be held at 4pm on the 10 th August in collaboration with the *Pragya Mahila Samaj* at Beltol, Kharghuli. Attendance of Rotarians were solicited.

The President also announced that as part of the Independence Day celebration, the national flag hoisting ceremony will be held at RCGS's Happy School Nandi Mikir School at Chachal at 8.30 am on the 15 th August 2025 followed by a musical programme by the IFRM Guwahati.

- i) The monthly rent of Hotel Rajdhani Regency was hiked to Rs. 12980/- from Rs. 11800/- by the hotel which was agreed by the BOD considering it reasonable.
- ii) The family of the Thalassemia patient which was supported by RCGS in the last two years is facing acute financial hardship. It was decided by the BOD that, out of the Thalassemia fund, RCGS will provide a Fast Food Cart to the family to carry out a small business to relieve them of their hardship to some extent.

This was followed by a very interesting and informative presentation by in house guest speaker Rtn Jamuna Prasad Sarma. His topic was "A Visit to Sadhguru Ashram Isha Foundation, Coimbatore." His excellent deliberations on his experience kept everyone spellbound. He was assisted by Miss Anuradha Musahary and Mr. Hridayanshu Das, both from the Isha Foundation. There were elaborate interactions on the topic by the Rotarians.

The Secretarial report was then presented: Rotarians present: 23, Ann: 3, Rotaractors: 4, and Guests: 2. Sunshine Collection: Rs. 540.00 The Vote of Thanks was deliberated by Rtn Pritam Mohan with special mention of the in house speaker's presentation.



It was the "BLUE, WHITE, AND GREEN REVOLUTION", - blue for water, white for milk, and green for environment and agriculture.

A very important step was the inauguration of a Rotary Trust Office in an apartment donated by Rtn. Rajkamal Bhuyan.

MINOTI BORTHAKUR WAS AWARDED the highly prestigious RI SERVICE ABOVE SELF AWARD a few years back, bringing laurels not only to herself, but to the Rotary Club of Gauhati South as well. Thus, it is clear that the RC Gauhai South has always tried its best to live up to the high ideals of Rotary. We are sure that, with the above record, we can confidently look forward to more significant work in the years to come. SOME OF THE SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE ROTARY CLUB OF GAUHATI SOUTH DURING ITS EARLY YEARS:-

- Polio Vaccination camps at Dispur Govt. Health Centre (1977) and Ulubari Urban Health Centre (1978).
- Adopted Barpathar village, Basistha (1977-78), and Sishugram Children's Home North Guwahati (1983-84).
- Implemented a WCS project, Project Water and Sanitation- under a Matching Grant with a RC in Canada, RID5050, and the Canadian International Development Agency, Rotary International, and the Rotary Club of Gauhati South, (1986-87). Ten deep tube wells and 155 Low Cost Sanitary Latrines were provided at Bonda and Maloibari. The Matching Grant was Rs. 800,000. In the year 1992, Rtn. N.B. Barthakur was honoured for this with a Special Award handed over to him personally by RI President Clifford Dochterman at Bangalore. A Toilet Block was constructed by the Club for the Maloibari Girls' High School in the year 1987-88).
- The club exceeded its share of contribution to Polio Plus, fixed by RI, by 134.08%. The Club was specially honoured for this by RI in the Asia Regional Conference held in New Delhi in 1987.
- Inducted the first Lady Rotarian in RI District 3240.
- Late Anne Nirmali Kakati had the unique distinction of being awarded the prestigious Jean Harris Award. (1997-98).
- Donated 3 Computers with all accessories to local T. C. Girls' High School under a Matching Grant from a Rotary Club of U.S.A.(1999-2000).

#### Rotary Club of Gauhati South Undertakes Fingerling Release Drive

Rotary Club of Gauhati South Undertakes Fingerling Release Drive at Deepor Beel Guwahati, July 30, 2025. As part of its annual environmental and ecological conservation initiatives, the Rotary Club of Gauhati South once again reaffirmed its commitment to preserving natural ecosystems by organizing a fingerling release drive on 30th July 2025. The initiative was spearheaded by Rtn Dr. Balendra Kr. Das, who has been a consistent advocate for sustainable biodiversity efforts in the region.

In a dedicated effort to enhance aquatic biodiversity and support the regeneration of native fish populations, the club released 5.5 quintals of fingerlings into Deepor Beel, a renowned freshwater lake located on the outskirts of Guwahati. The released fingerlings included a mix of Rohu, Catla, and several other native fish species, chosen for their ecological and economic significance.

Deepor Beel, a Ramsar-listed wetland, plays a crucial role in maintaining the ecological balance of the region, acting as a habitat for numerous aquatic and avian species. This initiative aims not only to replenish fish stocks for local communities that depend on the wetland for livelihood but also to strengthen the ecological resilience of the lake itself. The program witnessed enthusiastic participation from Rotarians and local stakeholders, underlining the importance of community-driven conservation actions. The Rotary Club of Gauhati South reiterated its ongoing commitment to protecting Assam's natural heritage through such sustainable and impactful programs.-

- I have been a Rotarian of RCGS since 1993, and an Anne since 1973, when my husband joined the Rotary Club of Shillong.
- I was inspired initially by my father, who was a member of RC Shillong. In spite of the fact that we the Rotarylets did not usually attend rotary meetings, once when I was in my senior class in school my father took me to a Rotary meeting. The Guest Speaker that evening was the then US Ambassador to India, Mr. John Galbraith. I was greatly impressed by the ambience of the meeting and its strictly formal atmosphere of dresses and regulations. It was quietly punctual. The Guest Speaker was far beyond my expectations, and that speech was probably my first impression of the true strength and influence of RI in the world.
- After that I did not see a Rotary meeting until my husband joined the Rotary Club of Shillong in 1973, by which time Rotary regulations had slackened a bit, and the Annes too sometimes attended the meetings and projects. It was then that I was once again inspired to join Rotary. But we women had to wait until 1989 to be allowed to join as Rotarians
- After that, I met many District Governors and Past DGs, and attended many District Conferences, and four Rotary International Conventions, which were truly motivating and inspirational.
- So far as the RCGS is concerned, I always say that my fellow members and friends have been of great benefit to me, and that it is Rotary that has kept me young at heart!
- It is truly wonderful to be a Rotarian, and it gives me a great sense of pride that I have had the
