Rtn. Kalyan Banerjee



Kalyan Banerjee was the President of Rotary International on 1 July 2011, succeeding Ray Klinginsmith to lead a worldwide network of millions of individuals from more than 200 countries. Mr. Banerjee belongs to the Rotary Club of Vapi, Gujarat, India. He earned a degree in chemical engineering from the Indian Institute of Technology Kharagpur in 1964. He is Rotary International's third President from India, the third largest contributor to The Rotary Foundation. He is a director of United Phosphorus Limited, the largest agrochemical manufacturer in India, and the chairman of United Phosphorus (Bangladesh) Limited. He is a member of the Indian Institute of Chemical Engineers and the American Chemical Society. He has been president of Vapi Industries Association and chairman of the Gujarat chapter of the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII). Banerjee is based in Vapi.

Rtn. K R Ravindran

Ravindran, a business leader from Colombo, Sri Lanka, took office on 1 July 2015 as the 105th president of Rotary International. Ravindran is the founder and CEO of Printcare PLC, a publicly listed company and global

leader in the tea packaging industry. He also serves on the board of several other companies and charitable trusts. He is the founding president of the Sri Lanka Anti-Narcotics Association, the largest antinarcotics organization in Sri Lanka. A Rotarian since 1974, Ravindran has served Rotary as a director and treasurer of Rotary International and as a trustee of The Rotary Foundation.

Ravindran, a member of the Rotary Club of Colombo, led efforts to eradicate polio from Sri Lanka. His country became one of the first in Asia to become polio-free. The PolioPlus task force he headed consisted of representatives from Rotary, UNICEF, and the Sri Lankan government. He has been awarded The Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service, Distinguished Service Award, and the Service Award for a Polio-Free World.

Challenges in Filmmaking

ast Monday, we had the privilege of hosting Mr. Ojaswwee Sharma, Film Director and National Award Winner, who shared his journey and challenges in filmmaking. He was accompanied by his team, including Abhinav Sharma, the lead actor of his recently released Hindi film, "Rabb di Awaaz." Mr. Sharma is widely acclaimed as a film director and recently received the 'Rajat Kamal' award from the President of India at the 68th National Film Awards. Alongside his recent film, he is also known for directing "Admitted," which won the Best Feature Documentary award at NIFF 2022 from the Films Division at the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting. He was honored with the Chanakya award by the Public Relations Council of India for 'Communicator of the Year' in films.

Mr. Sharma expressed his pride in being from Chandigarh and how he does most of his shooting within the city and region. He likes to address social issues by fostering a sense of awareness and responsibility among his audience. His work has significantly contributed to social change by highlighting marginalized voices and promoting inclusivity in all forms. He has produced numerous campaigns focusing on breakthrough stories from the region, aiming to revive and amplify the art of storytelling.



Although he was generally happy with the response to his film, "Rabb di Awaaz," India's first multi-inclusive film that has just completed its silver jubilee with six months of continuous running, he was a bit disappointed with the local city audience's response. He appealed to our members to watch the film and support his cast and crew. In the concluding session, Rtn. Upneet Lali delivered the vote of thanks on behalf of the club, commending Mr. Sharma's work and the presence of our city in the picture "Rabb di Awaaz." Rtn. Developing an Effective Project

Well-planned projects are more likely to have positive and sustainable results. Every community has its own strengths and concerns, so the best approach is to work closely with people from various groups that have a stake in the outcome. Maintain effective and transparent communication with all involved.

• You can get advice from fellow Rotary members who have been through the process and understand what's needed. For local and international projects, ask your district international service chair to connect you with experts early in the process for guidance about planning your project. Through the district resource network, you'll connect with local and international Rotary experts, including members of Rotary Action Groups and The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers.

Work with the local community to identify a need, decide with residents how to address it, and find out what resources are available. Make sure that community members are actively involved in every step of the process, especially the assessment and project design. A Rotary Community Corps can help you build a relationship with people in the area who have a stake in the outcome.

The goals you set for your project should be guided by the community's objectives and by the immediate results and short-term effects that you're seeking. Start by asking yourself what positive, lasting change you and your community partners hope will be the ultimate impact of your work. Then determine what activities will lead to that result. Decide how you'll gather data before the project starts and collect information throughout the project so you can measure your progress and know if you're meeting your goals.

Your partners can contribute expertise and resources that improve the project, expand your reach, and increase your impact. Consider working with fellow Rotary and Rotaract members through club collaborations, as well as with Rotary Action Groups, Rotary Community Corps, or Intercountry Committees. You can also collaborate with Interact clubs, Rotary Peace Fellows, and Rotary's strategic, service, and project partners.

• Developing a comprehensive project plan and budget will help you manage your resources, be ready for problems, and evaluate your project's success. As you plan the budget, seek competitive prices for goods and services and set aside funding for unexpected expenses or cost increases. Get community members and other people who will benefit from the project involved to make the project sustainable. Make sure you and they understand the ongoing costs of operating or maintaining the project and have the funding arranged.

Remember to include the costs of data collection, analysis, and communication in your budget because these things allow you to measure the positive change from your project and share with others what you accomplished and what you learned. Review your implementation plans and timeline with stakeholders regularly and make adjustments as necessary.

 When you're ready to share your project plans and goals, post your project on Rotary Showcase to raise awareness within Rotary, tell people about your club's service, and find partners and funding. You can also publicize your project using social media, club newsletters, club websites, and other channels.

The Rotary Foundation supports projects across all our areas of focus, including District grants that fund small-scale, short-term activities that address community needs, Global grants that support large international service activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes, Disaster response grants that support communities affected by a natural disaster, and Programs of Scale awards that support longer-term, high-impact programs led by Rotary members that have already demonstrated their success on a smaller scale.

 Funding for your project can come from many sources, including individual donors, corporations or local businesses, other foundations, nonprofit or nongovernmental organizations, government agencies, and other clubs and districts.

As you carry out the project, be sure to keep people informed about its progress, work to raise awareness of it, and stay in contact with the experts who helped you develop your plan. Keep volunteers, community members, partners, funding organizations, and anyone else who has a stake in the project up to date. Ask people from all of these groups for feedback on how to improve the project implementation while remaining focused on your overall goal. Clear communication is an important part of

carrying out a project successfully.

 Use social media, messaging platforms, and your club website to let people who aren't involved in the project know about it and to find more volunteers, spur community support, and bring people to your fundraisers.

Your project isn't really complete until you've evaluated its outcomes, measured its successes, and reflected on its challenges. This can be useful to you and your club for future projects and can help people who are trying to design and implement similar projects. Using the data that you gathered throughout your project, measure the change that you've had on your community. Determine if you reached the goals that you set. If not, think about what you could do differently in the future. Sometimes we need to adapt and change our strategy to have a bigger impact. As people of action, we stay committed to making positive, lasting change.

The better the data you collected, the better able you'll be to tell your story of service and positive change. Share how you overcame any challenges you faced, what lessons you learned, and tips for how other people can best approach similar projects. A good way to celebrate your success and inspire others is by using Rotary Showcase. Be sure to use photos and share the page on social media. Find more ways to promote your club's project. Remember to share a final report with your partners, supporters, and others who have been involved in the project.
