

Bharatnatyam a legacy: A story of steps and music...

Green on Paper, Bare on Ground? Tricity's Tree Dilemma



Every monsoon, cities turn green with intent. Saplings appear in schools, parks and roundabouts; photographs are clicked, numbers celebrated. But once the applause fades and the rain recedes, a question persists: What happens after the planting?

In an age of erratic monsoons, shrinking water tables and endless construction, trees are no longer ornamental. They are climate shields, public health tools and social equalizers. The way a city treats its trees reveals the kind of future it imagines. Plantation drives timed with the rains make sense. Yet with climate change, rainfall is unpredictable—sometimes scarce, sometimes punishing. This demands more than seasonal rituals. Did we plant resilient native species? Match trees to soil and site conditions? Or simply chase numbers and photo-ops? Saplings alone don't secure tomorrow-wise, climate informed forestry does.

Mature trees, meanwhile, are irreplaceable assets. They cool the air, hold groundwater, shelter biodiversity and create rhythms of shade we take for granted. Yet they are often felled casually for road widening or "beautification," losses that rarely spark outrage—even in a city designed as a green lung.

Preservation doesn't photograph well, but it is where real climate action lives. Many saplings die not from weather, but from neglect—left unwatered, unguarded, forgotten. Technology like QR tagging and citizen adoption helps, but nothing replaces daily care and long-term commitment.

To grow trees is to accept inconvenience: slower traffic, longer shade, softer heat. Planting is easy. Nurturing is where a city proves what it wants to become.

ast year, in the month of November, I visited the Terrace Garden in Sector 33-C, Chandigarh, to enjoy the beautiful exhibition of Chrysanthemum flowers displayed in creative models, figures, and thematic arrangements. In one corner of the park, an artist, welltrained in pencil sketching, was attracting a large crowd. People of all ages, men, women, young and old queued patiently for their turn to have a live sketch made by him. For a modest fee, the artist would spend nearly half an hour capturing the likeness of the person seated before him. The result never failed to thrill, filling the subject's heart with joy as they saw their reflection come to life on a simple sheet of paper.

The most striking part of the process was the intimacy of the experience. The client had to remain seated for about thirty minutes while the artist traced each feature, line by line, occasionally seeking suggestions to perfect the profile. In that span, a silent bond formed between the artist and the subject, an unspoken collaboration aimed at producing a portrait both truthful and charming. Onlookers would inevitably applaud, while the customer's heart swelled with happiness, for the sketch was more than

an image; it was a symbol of care, attention, and artistry, crafted lovingly with every stroke of the pencil.

As I watched this scene unfold, I was suddenly overcome by a strong sense of déjà vu, as though I had lived this very moment before, or experienced it in another time and place, with the same emotional intensity. Puzzled, I searched within my memory until I realized its source. It was a couplet by Mirza Ghalib, one that had long ago captured the very essence of what I was witnessing:

"Seekhte hain hum taqrir ka fun unse, Kuch to ba-har-e-mulagat chahiye musavvir se."

Ghalib, ever the ingenious lover, had devised to train himself as a portrait artist so he might have the perfect excuse to call upon, or sit with, the moon-faced maiden he adored. By sketching her likeness, he could gaze upon her freely, under the guise of art, and no one could take offence after all, he was only performing a professional service, as was the practice of those times.
