



Know The Mother Earth 3

In The Himalayas Fish Fossils speak Volumes of its Origin

Let us know about the environment spectrum of the Himalayas in a different aspect millions of years ago as evidenced by fossils collected by geologists. The mighty Himalayas, also known as 'The Roof of the World', rise up to



an incredible height, disappearing into the clouds on some days. Some of the world's highest peaks are in the Himalayas, including Mount Everest, which at 29,029 feet is the highest mountain in the world. At these altitudes, the air is thin, and the temperatures are extreme.

The land is arid and brown, and it looks like it's been this way since the beginning of time. These mighty mountains are hundreds of miles away from the closest sea. So how is it possible that marine fossils have been found in multiple locations in the Himalayas. The Spiti



Valley is rife with evidence dating back to 540 million years ago and attracts palaeontologists from around the world. The villages of Komic, Mud, Hikkim (where you'll find the world's highest post office), Langza and Lalung lie along a belt of fossil-rich sediment in Spiti.

In Nepal, ammonites (marine cephalopods with shells) are found along the bed of the Kali Gandaki River. Climbers who have been to the top of Mount Everest brought back rocks in which the fossils of sea lilies were discovered. It's hard to imagine that this vast expanse of weather-bleached land was once a thriving ocean bed, with fish and marine creatures populating the water. To understand this, we need to know how the Himalayas came to be formed.

Continental drift: Let us also know about movement of continents and their changing shape. Millions of years ago, a massive geological event called the Continental Drift took place. Before this, the world as we know it didn't exist. Instead, there were supercontinents or gigantic land masses that comprised of the continents that we know today. India was part of Gondwanaland, which included Australia, Africa, Antarctica, India, and South America. It was about 150 million years ago that India broke off from Gondwanaland and began to move north, approaching Eurasia. The Tethys Sea, which lay between the two landforms, had a rich and diverse marine life. It took about a hundred million years for the two landforms to collide, but when they did, it was with so much power that the dense crusts of both, crushed together by the immense force, rose upward, forming mountains that rose from beneath the sea. Even today, the layered rocks of the Himalayas are rich with the fossils of the inhabitants that once populated the Tethys Sea, as well as fossils of coral reef remnants and marine plants. The discovery of these fossils reveals the truth about the origin of the Himalayas. It also reveals that the path to the roof of the world was once deep under an ocean.
