Rotary International President Gordon R. McInally Message of March 2024



There are many pathways to peace, and in Rotary, we are fortunate to have Rotary Peace Fellows who demonstrate this truth time and again. Each year, Rotary awards up to 130 fellowships for leaders around the world to study peace and development, and what these peace fellows learn prepares them to work in conflict prevention and resolution and promote Positive Peace. Here are a few examples of the creative ways peace fellows advance peace:

Promoting sustainability

Alejandra Rueda-Zarate combined her Rotary Peace Fellowship in peace and conflict resolution with her master's degree in energy and resources to support her

dream of protecting the Colombian countryside. She founded the organization NES Naturaleza in 2011 to help farmers in Colombia and across rural Latin America gain access to knowledge and training to uphold sustainable farming standards. That support has improved the lives of nearly 4,500 farmers, inspiring many of them to become entrepreneurs. And it's helped promote both natural and social sustainability throughout Latin America.

Ending racism

Peace fellows Geoffrey Diesel and Kathy Doherty have applied their fellowships in peace and development studies toward co-founding the Racial Equity Project, a subcommittee of Rotary Positive Peace Activators in North America committed to studying ways to create a more peaceful society through anti-racism efforts.

The Racial Equity Project takes a deep look into how the eight Pillars of Positive Peace could support efforts to address racism, and it works to spread this message to communities across North America. The organization initially grew from Rotary's strategic partnership with the Institute for Economics and Peace, a global think tank dedicated to promoting Positive Peace.

Managing disasters using data

Through a Rotary Peace Fellowship, Jamie Le Sueur earned a master's degree in social science within peace and conflict research. He now leads emergency operations for the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, setting a management and operational

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

Editors Message

This month I have chosen to write on the "Motto's" of Rotary.

The first Rotary motto of Rotary International was approved at the 2nd Rotary Convention held in Portland, Oregon, USA in Aug'1911.

It was stated by a RC Chicago Rotarian Art Sheldon, who in his speech said," He profits most who serves his fellows best".At the same time, RC of Minneopolis,USA adopted their motto as "Service, not self".

In 1950, at the Detroit Convention, both these were approved with little editing as " He profits most, who serves best" and "Serve over self"

In 1989, "Service over self" became the principal motto of Rotary, as it best explains the philosophy of unbiased and selfless rotary service. The tradition of crafting an annual rotary theme is created to RI President Percy C Hodgson in 1949-50 who gave a 83 words proclamation, but todays motto are shorter and punchier.

Some has been short ones like:

1983-84:" Share Rotary, Serve people" 1985-86: " You are the key" 1986-87: " Rotary brings hope"

The year our club was initiated on 25th March 2022, RI President was from India Rtn Shekhar Mehta who had given the theme as "Serve to change lives". In the following year 2022-23, RI President Jennifer Jones gave the theme as "Imagine Rotary". She urged Rotarians to think big and take action. We all dream and imagine big, but need to put them in action. This years theme "Create Hope in the world" given by RI President Gordon Mcinally wants to restore hope to help the world heal from destructive conflicts and help to achieve lasting change.

So friends it begins with only **one ROTARIAN**, **one FO-CUS**, **one DESIRE**, **one DREAM** and you can accomplish your goal and dream
