

A member of Nasik Grape City since 2011, she has bagged many awards at District level including the coveted Centennial Governor Vishwas Sahasrabhojanee trophy for outstanding Lady Rotarian of

the District in 2017. On day 1 of her Governorship, she joined the Elite group of donors contributing to The Rotary Foundation by donating a whopping sum of USD 2,50,000/ (Rs 2.05 crores) and became AKS, i.e Arch Klumph Society member.

CARING GUARDIAN PARENTS

Mobile was ringing. It was 9 at night. I was watching my favourite program 'Black and White 'on Aaj Tak TV channel. The call was from Vaishali Barai, Past President, Rotary Club of Nagpur Fort. 'You are calling so late. Hope all well '. I enquired. 'All fine 'she said. 'I wanted to request you for some assistance. 'She explained to me Dr. Viraj Shingade's Project in which he is selflessly working for corrective surgeries of handicapped children from remote areas. The children and their parents are quite depressed and Doctor is giving them new hope and bringing smile on their faces. This Project 'Inspire' has started wef 10 July 2023 and will end on 04 August 2023. The children will come through health check-up camps from different places. The sponsorer for this Project is 'Aalambana Foundation' which is the brainchild of Past President Rtn. Dr. Sreehari Chava.

I asked her 'What will be my role in this Project?' She said 'you will become Caring Parents for some of these Children'. 'What does this mean and please explain my role in detail' I said. What She explained was to my liking. I got interested immediately. I was required to welcome children with disability and their parents upon arrival in the Hospital. I was required to get more acquainted with them by informally interacting with them and distributing sweets. After their Surgery I was required to be in touch with them and get their queries and inform the Surgeon. As a matter of fact, my role was to act as a buffer between them and the Surgeon. I readily accepted the opportunity given to me.

I was required to be Parents of 7 children and I was very eager to meet all of them but to my surprise there were only 3 children with their Parents. I distributed sweets to them. The children were smiling and unaware of their health issues. I got into a friendly conversation with their Parents. Since I was from Village background, I could interact with them freely. I met them on 2nd day after their operation and we became friends soon. On 5th day they were discharged from Hospital. I helped them with all the queries they had at the time of discharge. These children have gone back to their Villages and we are in constant touch with each other. The children will get back for review after one month and will undergo Physiotherapy which will be an important part of their recovery and rehabilitation. I need to ensure that they are regular in their Physiotherapy sessions. Caring Parents play an equally important role as their biological Parents.

This responsibility has been taken up by Rotary Club of Nagpur Fort and I consider myself fortunate of being part of this organization. One learns a lot from this entire process. If we are successful in reducing their worries during this process then I suppose our intervention is fruitful. I requested Vaishali to give more such opportunities to serve the Society. I request maximum lady Rotarians and Rotary Anns to come forward and contribute for this noble cause.






UNDERSTANDING AND PREVENTING EYE- FLU OR PINK EYE



Pink eye or conjunctivitis refers to the infection or inflammation of protective cover of the eye. The pink eye is also called as Eye-Flu. Infection can be caused by bacteria, fungi or viruses.




The humid weather offers a favourable environment for bacteria, fungi and viruses to grow and spread. There is tremendous surge in conjunctivitis cases after heavy rains. The humid, cloudy weather along with increase in flies, especially fruit-flies contributes to the rise in cases. It affects all age groups and almost 30% cases present in severe stages. Viral conjunctivitis is eye-to-eye contact which is a very common misconception. It spreads by direct hand-to-hand contact with infected person, if not cleaned properly. Sharing contaminated towels, handkerchiefs, pillows, bed sheets, utensils along with eye drops can also spread the conjunctivitis.



Common symptoms of viral conjunctivitis include eye lid swelling, redness, discharge and pain. Some percentage of patients may experience blur vision in cases of severe or complicated conjunctivitis. Currently, patients of conjunctivitis are also experiencing flu-like symptoms. These may include cough, cold, fever and sore throat. Mild cases resolve within a span 7-10 days, but severe cases take 2-3 weeks for complete recovery through pink eye, patients might experience dry eyes for quite some time. Dry eyes are most common complication of conjunctivitis.



Conjunctivitis treatment includes use of appropriate antibiotic- steroid eye drops, copious lubricating eye drops and oral painkillers. It is very important to treat viral conjunctivitis and sore throat-flu together. It is advisable to start warm salt water gargles or betadine water gargles to relieve sore throat pain. Frequent hand wash with soap and water at work places, schools and contaminated places is the key factor. It is also important to keep our surroundings clean to avoid nuisance of flies and fruit-flies.



Once a family a member gets infected by conjunctivitis, if not treated properly can spread conjunctivitis to every single member in the family. Usually, school going children, office workers or people who work in crowded areas are at high risk of catching conjunctivitis, even if a single colleague or co-worker is affected by same. It forms a chain of conjunctivitis. Frequent hand wash, use of hand sanitizer, identification of contaminated person and maintaining hygiene are the chain-breaker points. Before leaving house, one should carry a pair of protective glasses and hand sanitizers to avoid cross-contamination. Home remedies like putting onion juice, castor oil, ghee, cold water inside the eye are strictly discouraged. It is very important to visit your nearest ophthalmologist for treatment to avoid serious complications.

Triad of avoiding to get conjunctivitis, proper medical treatment through the ophthalmologist and post recovery management of dry eyes are pearl-points in this period.

A FLASHBACK INTO THE PAST

The year was 1989, I as a young Commander had assumed command of one of our latest HDW submarines INS Shishumar, where I had been it is commissioning Executive Officer (Second in Command). It was indeed a very prestigious appointment.

The crew of the submarine were a little over 30 Officers and Sailors, who were all very motivated and keen to carry out the assigned tasks. The initial few months after I had assumed command we exercised regularly with the Fleet ships, Anti submarine helicopters, Maritime Reconaissance Aircrafts and honed our skills. As is the practice of the navy's world over. It was not long before we were designated to go on a forward deployment against our adversary which was to be over 45 days.

It was indeed a proud moment, when we set sail after having done the necessary preparations of stocking up logistically as well as ensuring our onboard systems are fully operational and the weapons in all readiness. The spirit and dedication of the crew in getting the submarine ready was something to be observed and felt. We were all gearing to go.

On the day of the departure, the Operations Officer of the Submarine Squadron came and gave us the orders for our deployment in a sealed envelope, which would tell us the area where we were to go, the duration, the tasks assigned etc. These orders are very explicit giving us a lot of details of the threat perspective, the general maritime activity in the area. These orders can only be opened by the Commanding Officer when the submarine is at sea.

The submarines normally leave harbour under the cover of darkness, and with its limited speed the conventional submarine proceeds slowly. That day it took us well over an hour and half to leave the harbour. As soon as we reached the area where we had sufficient depth to dive, we proceeded to dive. Hereinafter we were to remain dived for the entire duration of the forward deployment. Coming up only either to charge the batteries which was mostly at night in near no moon conditions, or else to have a view through the periscope to investigate contacts, which must be very discrete.

The Navigating Officer by then had worked out as to how we would proceed to our deployment area proceeding dived by the day and coming up to periscope depth at night (to charge batteries). Soon the entire crew settled down to the routine and went about our tasks. For a submarine it is of vital importance that its noise signature is minimum, so the crew goes into a watch system wherein only about one third of the crew is on watch at their posts whilst the balance is resting in their bunks. The crew also changed over to a body clock cycle to staying awake at night when evolutions such as battery charging are conducted when the submarine is most vulnerable.

We were all very eager to be in our area allotted to us and commence the task of gathering intelligence (Electronic, Radar, Sonar, Communication, as well as any visual data). It took us several days to reach our area and we settled down to our routine. We came up to periscope depth as required either to sight a ship or boat whose sonar signature we had picked up and link the same. This had to been discreetly so that no one detects our presence in the area. We would also receive messages from the Naval Headquarters giving is their inputs. The submarine however remained totally silent.

A few days after we were in the area on patrol, we were lucky to pickup sonar transmissions and propeller noise of two brand new ships and some more units of the adversary leaving harbour. (These brand-new ships were probably a largess of the Americans for being in their alliance). The entire crew was very alert and to their assigned tasks of collecting data. This process was on for several days and required the submarine to come up to periscope depth frequently.

During the period, the submarine was shadowing the units we had to be careful and alert that we were not detected. One day we saw a frenzy of activity on these ships as the ships started coming in our direction, realising that they were coming towards our last known position we dived deep and took evasive action. The sea is a great medium and it is advantageous to the submarine. After we had spent several hours in the deep, we were convinced that the ships had gone extremely far we heard underwater weapons explosion. We realised that in all probability they had picked up suspicious underwater contact and had conducted this action.

Our submarine remained in the vicinity and monitored their activity. At the next opportunity when we were receiving messages from our Headquarter, we were asked to terminate our patrol and return to the base port. Although we were disappointed, we commenced our return passage back. We had cut short our patrol by several days.

On our arrival in the base port, we learnt that the adversary had at short notice planned underwater weapon firing in the vicinity of our patrol area and promulgated the same as per international rules, the naval staff being concerned about our safety had terminated the patrol. Me and my crew were in way lucky. A lot of questions were also asked by the staff. Looking for a submarine is like searching for a needle in the haystack.


Being at the helm of affairs on the submarine I had a lot of Pride and Confidence in my crew. It was a forward deployment which me and my crew would remember for a very long time.


