



As we move forward, let us remember that every effort brings us closer to saving lives through organ donation.



ROTARIAN LAL GOEL IS SET TO CREATE HISTORY AS THE KEYNOTE SPEAKER ON ORGAN DONATION AT LOK BHAVAN (FORMERLY RAJ BHAVAN) KOLKATA



Rotarian Lal Goel is set to create history as the Keynote Speaker on Organ Donation at Lok Bhavan (formerly Raj Bhavan), Kolkata, on December 17, 2025 — marking the first-ever Organ Donation Awareness Program in the Lok Bhavan (formerly Raj Bhavan), Kolkata's illustrious 222-year history.

The event will be graced by His Excellency, the Governor of West Bengal, Hon'ble Dr C.V. Anand Bose, whose presence underscores the significance of this landmark initiative.

This invitation-only gathering will bring together distinguished Doctors, leading Philanthropists, eminent Social Workers, senior Rotarians, noted Intellectuals and Special Invitees for a focused discussion on advancing the cause of Organ Donation and saving countless lives.



ROTARIAN LAL GOEL HOSTS BRAINSTORMING SESSION WITH USA ROTARIANS TO ADVANCE ORGAN DONATION INITIATIVES IN INDIA

Mumbai, December 6, 2025 - Rotarian Lal Goel, Founder and Charter President of the Rotary Club of Organ Donation International and Chairman of the Organ Donation India Foundation & GYAN, convened a strategic brainstorming session with Rotarians Sunil and Regina Gupta from the United States to explore collaborative initiatives aimed at strengthening organ donation efforts in India.

Rotarians Sunil and Regina Gupta, dedicated members of the Rotary Club of Organ Donation International, travelled to India with a mission to better understand the country's organ donation landscape. Their commitment to the cause is deeply personal—Sunil Gupta is a kidney transplant recipient, and his wife, Rotarian Regina Gupta, was his living kidney donor.

During the session, Rotarian Lal Goel shared key insights into the challenges and opportunities within India's organ donation system. He also discussed the potential establishment of Mobile Organ Retrieval Centres, a visionary project designed to expand access to life-saving organs across the nation. The visiting Rotarians expressed keen interest in contributing to this initiative and supporting its implementation.

The Guptas have pledged to return to India in February 2026 to work closely with Rotarian Lal Goel in conducting organ donation awareness campaigns across colleges, hospitals, and community platforms.

Expressing heartfelt appreciation for their commitment, Rotarian Lal Goel presented the couple with Rotary Club flags and acknowledged their unwavering dedication to saving lives. He emphasised that such international collaborations strengthen India's mission to reduce the number of patients waiting for critical organ transplants and bring hope to thousands of families.



A ROTARY INITIATIVE TOWARD SAVING LIVES THROUGH SYSTEM INTEGRATION

Rotary Vision | National Mission | Human Impact

India faces one of the world's most acute organ shortages. Every day, thousands of patients wait for kidneys, livers, hearts, and other vital organs, yet only a fraction receive them. With a deceased donor rate of 0.5-0.8 per million, India lags far behind global leaders like Spain and the United States, which achieve 30-40 donors per million.

But change is emerging—powered by integration, coordination, and compassion. This is the promise of Integrated Health, a model that aligns perfectly with Rotary's belief in Service Above Self.

"Integrated Health is not just a strategy—it is a promise that no Indian should die waiting for an organ."

BUILDING A CONNECTED SYSTEM: THE ROLE OF NOTTO

India's transformation accelerated with the establishment of NOTTO (National Organ and Tissue Transplant Organisation) in 2014, under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

This national network now connects:

- * NOTTO National coordination
- * SOTTOs State-level management
- * ROTTOs Regional transport & allocation systems

Together, these bodies maintain registries, train medical teams, support hospitals, and ensure transparent and equitable organ allocation. The shift from a fragmented system to an integrated national mechanism reflects Rotary's core principle: "Together, we accomplish more."

"When systems integrate, lives are saved."

STATE MODELS THAT SHOW THE WAY

Several states demonstrate the power of coordinated action:

- * Tamil Nadu India's most robust deceased donation program through trained coordinators and public-private partnerships.
- * Telangana (Jeevandan) Transparent centralised allocation, rapid organ transport, and high public awareness.
- * Kerala, Karnataka & Gujarat Effective integration of ICUs, hospitals, and transplant centres.

These states prove that integration is the key to increasing donation rates.

TECHNOLOGY: THE GAME-CHANGER

India's integrated health movement now uses technology to bridge distance, speed, and accessibility:

- National Transplant Registry
- Online donor pledging portals
- Real-time matching algorithms
- GPS-enabled organ transport
- Telemedicine support for rural hospitals

"India's Organ Donation Gap"

* India: 0.8 donors per million * USA: 36 donors per million * Spain: 40+ donors per million

* India's annual deaths due to organ shortage: 5 lakh+

CULTURE, COMPASSION, AND COMMUNITY TRUST

Organ donation touches faith, emotion, and family values. Today, leaders from major religions—Hindu, Muslim, Sikh, Christian, Jain, and Buddhist—recognise organ donation as an act of compassion and selfless service.

Rotary clubs nationwide are helping bridge cultural barriers through:

- * Community awareness drives
- * Youth engagement
- * Myth-busting workshops
- * Donor pledge campaigns

Rotary's trusted grassroots presence makes it an essential partner in building public confidence.

PUBLIC + PRIVATE = A STRONGER INDIA

A successful organ donation ecosystem requires collaboration:

- * Donors often come from public hospitals
- * Many transplants occur in private centres
- * Government insurance schemes expand access

Integrated systems ensure organs move according to medical necessity, not financial strength.

WHEN EVERY SECOND COUNTS

India has developed remarkable logistical systems:

- * Green corridors
- * Priority aviation transport
- * Dedicated medical vehicles
- * Drone trials for remote regions

A well-known success: A heart transported across Chennai in 11 minutes, demonstrating what coordination makes possible.

"Life-Saving Impact of One Donor"

- * 1 brain-dead donor = Up to 9 lives saved
- * Tissues donated = Up to 75 lives improved

THE ROAD AHEAD

Despite progress, India still faces:

- * Limited ICU facilities
- * Rural awareness gaps
- * Need for more transplant coordinators
- * Variations in state-level readiness

But the direction is clear: Strengthen networks, expand training, deepen public engagement—save more lives.

Integrated Health is more than a healthcare model—it's a humanitarian mission. It shows how technology, community leadership, and coordinated systems can unite to deliver the gift of life.

Chennai, December 10, 2025 - Rotarian Lal Goel, Founder and Charter President of the Rotary Club of Organ Donation International and Chairman of the Organ Donation India Foundation & GYAN, held a highly productive meeting with Lieutenant General V Sreehari, AVSM, SM, General Officer Commanding (GOC), to discuss strengthening organ donation initiatives within the Indian Army at the Headquarters of Dakshin Bharat Area.



HEALTHY FOOD - HEALTHY ORGANS

Healthy Oats Veggie Pancake

* High-Protein, High-Fiber



#Ingredients

Rolled oats $-\frac{1}{2}$ cup (soaked & ground to batter consistency)

Besan (gram flour) – 2 tbsp

Suji (semolina) – 2 tbsp

Finely chopped vegetables (onion, capsicum, bell peppers, carrot, French

beans) - 1.25 cup

Green chillies – 2, finely chopped

Ginger – 1 tbsp, finely chopped

Coriander leaves - 1/4 cup, finely chopped

Low-fat paneer - 1/4 cup, finely cubed

Salt, cumin, black pepper, red chilli powder – to taste

Curd - 1/2 cup

Fruit salt (Eno) - 1 tbsp

Water - as needed

#Method

Combine the ground oats batter, besan, suji, curd, all chopped vegetables, spices, ginger, green chillies, coriander, and paneer.

Mix well.

Rest the batter

Cover and let it rest for 30 minutes.

Add water slowly until you reach a smooth pancake-like consistency.

Just before cooking, add 1 tbsp fruit salt, mix gently once (do not overmix). Cook the pancakes

Heat a non-stick tawa or a paniyaram/paniyarappam pan.

Pour the batter and spread gently (for pancake) or fill each cavity (for panivarappam).

Cover with a lid and cook until the bottom turns golden.

Flip and cook the other side until fully cooked and crisp.

#Serve

Enjoy hot with your favourite chutneys, sauces, or healthy dips
