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**The Fellowship of the Unlikely:  
How Rotary Builds Families Across Every Divide

What happens when a doctor, an agriculturist, a builder, a women entrepreneur, a businessman, a GST officer, an educationist, and an architect walk into a room? In the real world? Nothing. They don't even share the same parking lot. In Rotary? Everything. Including the last samosa.

I walked into my first Rotary Club of Aspiring Agartala meeting in 2025 as just an Engineer—armed with blueprints, a calculator, and the unshakable belief that every problem can be solved with a spreadsheet. I thought I was joining a service club. I was wrong. I had accidentally adopted a family. Loud, chaotic, and full of people who have no business being in the same room.

**Let me paint the picture.**

There's the Doctor. Steady hands. Sober demeanor. He saves lives before breakfast. Next to him sits the Agriculturist—not a hobbyist with a kitchen garden, but the man who decides what an entire state eats. Beside them, the Architect is locked in a debate with the Builder. Outside Rotary, these two communicate exclusively through lawyers and change orders. Here? They're fighting over who brings better snacks.

Then there's the Women Entrepreneur—she runs an empire and somehow still has time to remind everyone about the meeting agenda. The Businessman who can spot a business model in a potluck dinner. The GST Officer—yes, a GST officer voluntarily sitting in a room with businessmen. Miracles do happen. And the Educationists, who carry the weight of the next generation in their handbags.

And then there's me, the Engineer, wondering how my world of beams and budgets collided with soil, scalpels, tax codes, and sales targets.

Here's the magic: we don't speak the same language. Yet we understand each other better than colleagues who've shared a cabin for twenty years. When the Agriculturist talks about crop failure, the Builder thinks about storage sheds. When the Doctor mentions malnutrition, the Businessman starts calculating supply chains. When the GST Officer opens his mouth, everyone else suddenly becomes very interested in compliance. One problem. Eight professions. Solutions that actually work.

Then there's the senior-junior dynamic. The grey-haired pillars—who've survived droughts, policy wars, tax reforms, and floods—could dismiss us restless juniors as naive. Instead, they do something outrageous: they listen. The Builder doesn't laugh at my sketches; he tells me where the pipes will actually go. The Agriculturist doesn't lecture; he makes a call and opens doors that would've taken me a decade to knock on. The GST Officer? He explains tax exemptions. Twice. Slowly. With diagrams.

Ask any member what they treasure most. They won't mention a project or a fundraiser. They'll tell you about the Doctor who gave a midnight second opinion on WhatsApp—in his pajamas, squinting at the screen. Or the Builder who showed up with his truck at 6 AM, no questions asked, because a fellow Rotarian needed help. Or the Women Entrepreneur who quietly funded a member's community project before they could even finish explaining it.

I came to serve my community. Instead, I gained one. I walked in as an Engineer. I stayed as a Rotarian. And somewhere between the weekly meetings, the shared chai, and the audacity to believe we can actually fix things—I found my most unlikely, most extraordinary family.

So, what happens when a doctor, an agriculturist, a builder, a women entrepreneur, a businessman, a GST officer, an educationist, and an architect walk into a room?

**If it's Rotary? They build a home. For everyone else.**

## HOW MIGHT FOLLOWING A FEMINIST FOREIGN POLICY LEAD TO A FAIRER AND STABLE WORLD ?

*The central focus of Feminism is to advocate for equal rights and equal treatment of women socially, economically, politically and morally. Feminism not only seeks to disrupt gender-related oppression, discrimination, and injustice, but also seeks to build a space where women will thrive and have equal opportunity to rights as men. In other words, feminism is looking for a world in which equal opportunities are afforded to all sexes.*

Feminist theory has historically evolved, providing a myriad of perspectives that emphasize and centre on some of the many feminist issues such as social justice and political representation. Feminist theory continues to build on the ideas of women's rights and empowerment including the rights of women in international relations. The goal of feminist foreign policy is to incorporate feminist approaches into the traditional foreign policy framework, seeking to establish a more equitable global community.

A feminist foreign policy comprises several components, aimed at changing customary diplomatic processes, such as including women's voices in decision-making processes regarding peace-building and conflict resolution. A feminist foreign policy makes the commitments of gender equality, human rights, and social justice paramount. Where traditional foreign policy centres on military strength and economic interests, a feminist foreign policy privileges peace-building, diplomacy, and global development that is inclusive of social justice. A feminist foreign policy also calls for a re-examination of the military, moving away from permanent militarization as the 'answer' to conflict, and moving toward non-violence and peaceful resolution in response to conflict. It advocates for the comprehensive inclusion of women in peace-building processes.

The significance of intersectionality in feminist foreign policy has been a major emphasis of feminist debates. A good leader is one who has empathy, is connected to the ground reality of the conditions of their community and the problems they're facing and an individual who actually resonates with each member through some common characteristics such as having the same race. Therefore, special representation of women at a global level is extremely vital because there are people who don't share the same privileges as us and it is our responsibilities to help them with the little power we hold.

The situation in countries like Afghanistan and Iran bring forth to us the urgent need to focus on Feminist Foreign Policies. In Afghanistan, women have been systematically erased from public life since the Taliban returned to power in 2021. Women in those countries have been prohibited from attaining education, jobs, and even from basic health care as women can't even be seen by a male doctor. This has been a global failure to protect and uphold human rights. A Feminist Foreign Policy would attempt to prioritize support for Afghani women and provide safe haven for activists and it would not work to legitimize regimes that oppress ordinary people through unquestioning engagement. Similarly, women in Iran have led organized movements, such as the 'Women, Life, Freedom' demonstrations even if it means risking their lives for their demands to end the patriarchal state violence and compulsory hijab laws. However, these struggles are often ignored in favour of the economic positioning of interests. A Feminist Foreign Policy would provide a platform for the voices of feminist activists in Iran, mobilize action towards upholding civil liberties, and wherever possible, ensure that sanctions or policies do not negligently put vulnerable populations at risk. Traditional foreign policy prioritizes power, profit, and security over human rights whereas Feminist Foreign Policy highlights justice, equality, and human dignity, and shows that no peace or development can occur if there is no gender equality.

*Therefore, I believe that following a feminist foreign policy lead to a fairer and stable world.*

This concept revolves around the idea of granting women the power to make the choices, participate actively in decision-making processes, and achieve their full potential. Women Empowerment is not just about giving women a seat at the table but it's about ensuring that their voices are heard, their talents are acknowledged and their rights are protected*

*By promoting and understanding Women Empowerment, we aim to foster a world where women can contribute to their fullest potential, breaking down barriers and stereotypes that have hindered their progress for far too long.*

*Women Empowerment also importantly involves educating women to become financially independent and make their own decisions. It means ensuring protection against violence without any discrimination. The well-being and progress of a society are deeply connected to the empowerment of its women.*

*Women Empowerment involves safeguarding women's rights, ensuring protection against criminal offenses, and eliminating discrimination. The key true empowerment lies in education, which plays a pivotal role in transforming the status of women. An educated women acts as a guide in the family, advocating for the education of every child regardless of gender.*

*The global conversation on Women Empowerment is more significant today than ever. In India women have long faced physical violence, mental torture and harassment. Issues like rape, dowry related violence, workplace discrimination and limited access to education hinder their progress and consequently, the nation's advancement*

*A significant portion of women's work is unpaid in India and falls within the unorganized sector. Despite constituting 49% of the agricultural workforce, women own less than 2% of the land. In rural areas, many women lack bank account their names and few own valuable assets. Their contribution to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is only 17%, far below the global average of 37% shockingly over 90% of women in Delhi report experiencing some form of physical or sexual offense in public places.*

*In conclusion, it may be said that the Government of India is taking steps by enacting and implementing laws to protect women's interests. Education, economic empowerment and political participation are key components of this process. But it needed collective efforts, and requires not only Government intervention, but also the active participation of society, along with public and private organizations. Discrimination based on gender, class, religion or social status should have no place in a society aspiring for development. It is an indispensable prerequisite for the progress and prosperity of any nation.*
