Our fight against Cervical Cancer

Cervical cancer is a significant health issue globally, and it poses a particular challenge in India, where it is the second most common cancer among women. The project aims at preventing cervical cancer through HPV vaccination in young girls. The project's vision is to empower a generation of healthy young women and ultimately achieve freedom from the preventable disease, cervical cancer. The mission is to provide comprehensive HPV vaccinations to school girls aged 9 to 14.

Disease Burden of Cervical Cancer in India:

Cervical cancer is a significant health concern in India. It is the second most common cancer among women, with a



high associated mortality rate. Around 51.15 crore Indian women aged 15 years and above are at risk of developing cervical cancer. India accounts for 21% of global cases and 23% of global deaths due to cervical cancer. This highlights the urgency of addressing this issue and implementing preventive measures.

Causative factor:

HPV is responsible for 99.7% of cervical cancers. This virus is highly prevalent among sexually active individuals, with the highest risk occurring in adolescents and young adults aged 15–25. HPV can also lead to other types of cancer, such as oral, penile, vaginal, vulval, and anal cancer. Low socio-economic status is associated with an increased incidence of and mortality from cervical cancer. Fortunately, cervical cancer is preventable through education and awareness, screening, and HPV vaccination.

Solution:

Vaccination against HPV has been proven to prevent over 83% of cervical cancers. The World Health Organization (WHO) has set a global strategy to ensure that at least 90% of girls are fully vaccinated with the HPV vaccine by age 15.

Vaccination Schedule:

HPV vaccination should be ideally administered to females before they reach an age when the risk of HPV infection increases. Since the highest prevalence of HPV is between ages 15-25 years, the project aims to vaccinate girls aged 9 to 14, who shall receive a 2-dose schedule at 0 and 6 months. Women aged 15 to 26 years should be administered a 3-dose schedule at 0, 2, 6 months.

Implementation:

This project is being implemented through schools like yours where the HPV vaccination drives are being conducted to administer the HPV vaccine to girls aged 9 to 14.
