August marked a meaningful milestone for our club with the publication of the first hard copy of Inspiration. The last six months have been intense, demanding, and deeply fulfilling. Our calendar was full, weekends were often committed, and yet the energy and enthusiasm of our members never faded. Medical service continued to be a major focus area. Through multiple medical camps, Thalassemia awareness and detection initiatives, and highly impactful corrective eye and plastic surgery camps, our club touched lives in a very direct and meaningful way. These were not routine activities; they were interventions that restored confidence, dignity, and hope.

Among all these initiatives, the Manav Foundation program remains especially close to my heart. The wide publicity ensured that the message reached beyond the venue, while the presence of an excellent panel of experts elevated the quality of discussion and understanding. My sincere gratitude to Suresh Gandhi for sponsoring this initiative and for supporting Operation Restore—projects that truly reflect Rotary's ability to transform lives through committed service.

Our engagement extended well beyond club-level activities. Members actively participated in RODEL, the UN Assembly, quiz contests, and the Rotary Walkathon. Such participation strengthens our exposure, reinforces Rotary values, and reminds us that we are part of a much larger movement working toward shared global goals.

Vocational service emerged as one of the most emotionally rewarding areas of service this year. The felicitation of teachers from ten Adivasi schools was a sincere expression of respect toward educators who quietly shape the future. In addition, the felicitation of a poet and an education officer acknowledged the role of creativity, thought leadership, and administration in building a strong educational ecosystem.

Sports and fellowship added a vibrant dimension to our activities. Competitions organized for our members strengthened bonding and healthy competition, while the sports event conducted for tribal students at the Igatpuri Sports Complex offered exposure, confidence, and inclusion. For many students, it was not merely a competition, but an opportunity to discover their own potential

Our commitment to sustainability was reflected in steady progress on water and energy-related initiatives. More than 2,000 solar lamps have already been distributed, bringing light and extended productivity to households where darkness once limited opportunity. I thank Gautam Gandhi for his generous support. I also appreciate PP Nafisa Khorakiwala's focused efforts toward implementing a water project for an entire village—an initiative that promises long-term impact and sustainability.

One of the quiet strengths of our club this year has been the planning and execution of speaker meetings. Scheduled well in advance—often three months ahead—these meetings covered a wide range of subjects catering to the diverse interests of our members. The smooth conduct of these sessions reflects teamwork and discipline.


ATTENDANCE IS A SHARED RESPONSIBILITY

Its a fantastic journey.


15. What is your advice to the in- coming secretary?



Having celebrated our Silver Jubilee, the foremost thought that came to my mind was "Roots".

Friends, all the years that led to Bombay North's Silver Jubilee, during my Presidency 35 years ago, were years dedicated to consolidate the depths of the roots of our Club which has ensured the good fruits we all enjoy today !

Let me tell you, the 1st of the 3 major aspects that contributed in strengthening Bombay North's roots over its first 25 years was its Human Resources its Members, the 2nd the people the Club associated with and 3rd. the choice, the scale and reach of our Projects, in all avenues of service.

We associated ourselves with as Chief Guests, Invites, Speakers Benefactors or Beneficiaries - were the likes off ; The President of India Dr. Radhakrishnan ; Indias first and longest serving

Our association with these and many more such renowned personalities deepened the roots of the stature of our young Club.

The 2nd aspect that consolidated the depths of our roots was our choice of projects their scale, and their their outreach ; I mention just a few of the many many such projects we implemented during the first 25 years of our Club. : a project that immunised over 300,000 children ; a project that render unique vocational help & support to more than 100,000 challenged persons ; we sent 100 plus Children of Rotarians for the 1 year International Youth Exchange Program and enjoyed a warm relationship with our sister Club in Kobe Japan. Finally the Club introduced and launched a high powered and robust communication and fellowship strategy.

Our choice of projects Friends, established the deep roots of equal and large scale Club Activities in every avenue of service ; many of them, for example Fellowship even resonates today.

The 3rd and the most important aspect that consolidated the deep roots of our Club was the priceless asset of Human Resources the real deep roots that pastured Bombay North to its present Glory - Our Members :

We remember stalwarts like Ashok Piramal ; Dr. K.K. Datte, Hakubhai Kapadia, Dr. Purandare, Hussinebhai

Khorakiwalla, Ram Batra, S.P. Mandalia and the likes of many more. We fondly recall 4 of our member going on

to become District Governors ; our Founder President Soli Pavri ; M.P. Apte ; Surubhai Shah & Badar Maskati and to crown it all Soli Pavri becoming the First ever and only Rotary International Director from Bombay North all this achieved within our first 25 years. Strangely today we have 25 Members who were there then and who are with us now ; Some of the exceptional contributors still with us are our Charter Members, Sultan Fazalbhoy and Babulal Todi ; Members of The Silver Jubilee Board of Directors Habil Khorakiwalla, Baldev Arora, Vijay Jalan, Quresh Maskati and yours truly.

But Rotarians sans their spouses is like music played without sound. Our spouses, most, if not all, were enthusiastic active Members of a vibrant Inner Wheel Club and in the earlier year Mumtaz Kachwalla and in the following year my beloved wife Shirley were Presidents and in that year Nafisa Khorakiwalla was

President Elect of our Inner Wheel Club and who today is the President Elect of our Rotary Club.

Friends, it was, for me, a pleasure and a privilege of being the President in the Silver Jubilee year and it has been our Projects, our association with the right people and our Members and our Spouses, who consolidated deep, yes very deep the roots of our Club; its stature, its influence; its relevance and it is these roots that have stood us in good stead.



Remembering the Golden Jubilee Year (2011–12)

I had the privilege of leading the Rotary Club of Bombay North during its Golden Jubilee year, 2011–12—a responsibility I initially hesitated to accept. It was the faith and gentle insistence of senior predecessors, particularly District Governor Vijay Jalan and our Silver Jubilee President Vijay Lazarus, that finally persuaded me. Their confidence proved well placed, for what followed became one of the most defining chapters in the Club’s history.

The year was marked by an extraordinary and rare confluence of milestones.

Rotary International President Kalyan Banerjee—our very own Indian RI President—was at the helm of Rotary globally. District Governor Vijay Jalan, RCBN’s fifth PDG following the late PDGs Soli Pavri, Surubhai Mehta, Badar Maskati, and M. P. Apte, was leading District 3140. And most significantly, the Club was celebrating 50 glorious years of service. With the wholehearted support of our members, these forces came together to deliver a year worthy of RCBN’s proud legacy.



One of the most unanimous and landmark decisions taken during the year was to shift our weekly meetings from South Mumbai to the more centrally located Wellingdon Club. The move brought greater accessibility, serenity, and prestige, along with the introduction of a relaxed Saturday breakfast meeting format that members and spouses warmly embraced.

To commemorate this new phase, a refreshed Club logo incorporating the Worli Sea Link was unveiled—an identity that continues to represent RCBN to this day.

What followed was a complete rejuvenation of the Club. There was renewed pride in belonging, a marked increase in spouse participation, and an elevation in the quality of every engagement. Champagne breakfasts, meetings at five-star venues, formal invitations, curated music, and consistently high attendance became the norm. RCBN set new benchmarks in fellowship and presentation. All major events during the year were graced by RI President Kalyan Banerjee, DG Vijay Jalan, and representatives from clubs across District 3140, reinforcing RCBN’s standing within the Rotary fraternity.

The undisputed highlight of the Golden Jubilee year was DISCON 2011–12, ably chaired by PP Vijay Lazarus and driven by a dynamic and committed committee. Widely acknowledged as one of the finest District Conferences ever held, DISCON blended substantive Rotary content with eminent speakers and an unforgettable two-night, three-day entertainment extravaganza. Innovative initiatives such as the Tanishq jewellery exhibition added sparkle, while robust fundraising ensured a surplus contribution to the District Trust corpus. Carefully curated fellowship programmes and themed events further strengthened bonds among Rotarians and celebrated legacy venues.

A particularly significant achievement of the year was the receipt of FCNR approval from the Ministry of Home Affairs—after nearly 50 years of sustained effort. This milestone enabled the Club to receive foreign currency donations and collaborate more meaningfully with international Rotary partners. It strengthened ongoing projects and paved the way for enduring initiatives such as Teach India for adult English education, a Computer Academy in partnership with Bhartiya Vidya Mandir, Helping Mumbai See Better for taxi drivers with WIAA and Titan EyePlus, and the groundwork for an ambitious vision correction programme aimed at reaching 60,000 underprivileged children.

As I reflect, I realize that just as I inherited a progressive and vibrant Club built by decades of visionary leadership, the Golden Jubilee year infused fresh energy that continues to inspire RCBN even today. This collective success was made possible by the unwavering commitment of every member—ably supported by Hon. Secretary Asim Nagree; DISCON and Fellowship Chair Vijay Lazarus with Nitika; senior pillars Ashok Ajmera and Quresh M.; and above all, the steadfast guidance of PDG Vijay Jalan.

The year also marked an extraordinary achievement in Rotary philanthropy. RCBN raised USD 679,855 for The Rotary Foundation, ranking No. 1 in India and second globally. District 3140 raised an unprecedented USD 3.47 million—the highest in the world—earning international recognition at the RI Convention in Bangkok, 2012. Together, during that Golden Jubilee year, we walked a path of excellence—one that honoured our past, celebrated our present, and continues to define the spirit and stature of the Rotary Club of Bombay North.



A Moment etched in Rotary Memory

The Rotary year 1978–79, when District 314 still carried a three-digit identity, was a very different era. The district was vast—embracing all of Maharashtra and parts of Gujarat and Madhya Pradesh—yet it comprised barely 75 clubs. Distances were long, communication slower, but the spirit of fellowship was immense.

For a prestigious district like 314 in those days, the RI President's Representative was almost invariably a senior American Past District Governor, and our District Conference was no exception. Rotary International President that year was Clem Renouf of Queensland, Australia, whose inspiring RI theme was “Reach Out.” In perfect alignment with this global call, District Governor Badar Maskati gave the district its own resonant theme—“Each One Reach One,” reinforcing the belief that individual commitment could create collective impact.

The District Conference was held at Shanmukhananda Auditorium at Sion, then the largest and most prestigious venue in the city. The Conference Secretary was PP Raman Patel, whose meticulous planning ensured an event that would be remembered for decades.

The star attraction was none other than Mother Teresa. Persuading her to attend was no small feat. She had a crucial engagement in Surat the very same evening, and District Governor Badar Maskati had to make extraordinary arrangements to ensure her presence. A private charter was organized to fly her from Juhu airport immediately after her address—generously facilitated by a leading industrialist who stepped in at the eleventh hour.

Mother Teresa's speech left the packed auditorium in tears. With quiet authority and deep compassion, she urged Rotarians who had travelled hundreds of kilometres to be there:

“Give till it hurts.”

And she added gently, “If you cannot give money, give your time. Wipe a tear. Spread a smile.”

It was a moment etched forever in Rotary memory—a powerful affirmation that true service is not measured by scale alone, but by sincerity of heart and willingness to reach out.

I'm a member for 10 years only. It's difficult to evaluate changes In the last 62 years. In each year, President does the best and reaches the new heights of achievement.




TRANSFORMING PEDIATRIC CARDIAC CARE AT SRCC CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

Every year in India, more than 2.5 lakh children are born with congenital heart disease (CHD)—a diagnosis that arrives quietly but carries overwhelming consequences for families already struggling with limited resources. For nearly one-fifth of these children, the defect is critical and life-threatening, demanding urgent intervention within the first year of life. Without timely treatment, many of these little hearts simply give up.

Despite medical advancements, only a fraction of children with CHD in India receive timely and appropriate care. Specialized pediatric cardiac centers are few, largely private, and concentrated in metropolitan cities. For families in rural, tribal, or economically vulnerable regions, the journey to treatment is often as daunting as the disease itself—filled with fear, financial uncertainty, lost livelihoods, and impossible choices.



It is within this challenging landscape that Rotary Club of Bombay North (RCBN) has chosen to step in—not merely as a donor, but as a compassionate partner in saving young lives.

The Reality on the Ground: Challenges Beyond Medicine

The burden of pediatric heart disease in India is not limited to medical complexity alone.

Delayed diagnosis remains common due to lack of awareness and limited screening, especially in rural and semi-urban areas.

Geographical inequity forces families to travel hundreds of kilometers, often leaving behind jobs, homes, and other children.

Financial hardship is the single greatest barrier. Medical insurance for congenital defects is rare, and even government schemes cover only a limited range of surgeries.

Social challenges—including discouragement from elders, gender bias, and fear of surgery—often prevent families from seeking timely care.

SRCC Children's Hospital: Where Hope Meets Expertise

At SRCC Children's Hospital, under the leadership of experienced pediatric cardiologists like Dr. Supratim Sen, and pediatric cardiac surgeons like Dr Pradeep Kaushik, children receive world-class, fully pediatric cardiac care—often when all other doors have closed.

Many children deteriorate while waiting. Some become inoperable. Some are lost forever.

SRCC performs 80 pediatric heart surgeries and 50 cardiac interventions per month, including highly complex and high-risk cases.

The hospital accepts referrals from other major centers and often takes on patients who have developed complications after surgery elsewhere.

With less than 3% mortality, even among critically ill newborns weighing under 2 kg, SRCC stands among the finest pediatric cardiac centers in the country.

The average cost to save a child is approximately ₹75,000, with the remaining burden shared by government schemes, hospital concessions, and charitable support.

A dedicated patient dormitory houses up to 200 families, ensuring that no parent is left without shelter during their child's treatment.

Yet even with excellence in care, the ability to treat these children depends heavily on timely financial support.

RCBN's Impact: Turning Compassion into Lives Saved

Between January 2024 and December 2025, the Rotary Club of Bombay North enabled the treatment of 215 children with complex congenital heart defects at SRCC.

₹1.60 crore contributed by Rotary

₹1.75 crore supported through government funding

₹1.30 crore in hospital concessions provided by SRCC

Average Rotary support per child: ₹75,404

These numbers reflect not just financial assistance—but 215 second chances at life.

Because of Rotary's support, SRCC has been able to accept critically ill children who were otherwise turned away due to lack of funding or complexity beyond standard government coverage. These are children who could not afford to wait.

Beyond Surgery: The True Impact on Lives

For a child struggling with CHD, life before surgery is often filled with breathlessness, repeated hospitalizations, poor growth, and delayed development. For parents, it is a period marked by helplessness, fear, and endless waiting.

But timely cardiac intervention changes everything.

Within days, oxygen levels normalize. Within months, the child begins to grow, play, learn, and thrive like any other child. Developmental milestones are regained. Parents return to work. Families heal.

And when these children walk back into the hospital for follow-up visits—healthy, playful, smiling—the relief and gratitude on their parents' faces tell a story no statistic ever can.

Need of Funds Support for Paediatric Heart and Oncology Surgeries, and Bone Marrow Transplant



According to the World Health Organization (WHO) Global Health Expenditure database of 2010 to 2015, in India, 85.5 % to 89.0 % of expenditure on health care is self-paying. High medical bills and the lack of access to affordable healthcare push nearly 3.9 out of every 100 people into poverty. Around 200,000 children are born with CHD every year and in 40 to 50,000 cancer cases are detected every year in children below 18 years. Many lives are lost each year due to the inability to pay for life-saving surgeries and procedures.

Hence there is a felt need to provide quality and affordable health care to this poor population at primary, secondary and tertiary levels, especially for expensive treatments for non-communicable diseases including surgeries and related diagnosis in India.

Narayana Health SRCC Children's Hospital (SRCC) Managed by Narayana Health strives to live up to the tenet of not turning back any disadvantaged patient for lack of funds. It is one of the very few standalone children's hospitals. Through the Initiatives & Multispecialty Paediatric Hospital, Narayana Health is committed towards provision of healthcare to patients from the lower socio-economic strata of society. The poor patient support program was conceptualized to enable corporates, philanthropic institutions and individuals to join Narayana Health in its journey towards providing monetary support such patients facing catastrophic medical expenses. Catastrophic expenses are especially pervasive in cardiac treatment. The financial burden induced by such procedures often ends up pulling families way below the poverty line towards destitution.

Objective of Fund Support Program

So far SRCC have done more than (1) 5000 + Paediatric Heart Surgeries; (2) 200 Oncology Surgeries and (3) 200 Bone Marrow Transplants. Over 100 new paediatric cancer cases are treated every year in the hospital.

Primary Objective of SRCC: "To Support families who would like to take treatment and expertise of doctors & facilities but fail in doing so as they are financially challenged & to Screen & identify all new-borns with cardiac diseases in order to provide timely identification, diagnosis and treatment from Maharashtra & all parts of country coming to treatment at Mumbai ,SRCC Children's Hospital.

Paediatric Oncology and Bone Marrow Transplant

SRCC are a tertiary super specialty care hospital where children from across the country and even busy centers like Tata Memorial Hospital are referred for Bone marrow Transplant and intensive care support. High quality cancer care based on robust scientific evidence is delivered to these children by a large specialized multidisciplinary team.

SRCC has started its bone marrow transplant program in 2018 and has done 200 + transplants till date. Most of these cases have been uncommon conditions like osteopetrosis or Krabbe's disease or have been the clinically challenging transplant like haploidentical transplants. SRCC team holds expertise in haploidentical transplants which are considered to be the most challenging of all transplants.

SRCC have a good success rate which is comparable with other centres across India and internationally. For thalassemia, SRCC have done 4 TCR alpha beta depleted haploidentical transplants and have a success rate of 100%.

Our Relationship with SRCC

Our (Rotary Club of Bombay North (RCBN)) association with SRCC started in 2019-2020 by supporting Paediatric Heart Surgeries under the Global Grants. Prior to this, we were supporting heart surgeries at other hospital but around 1 to 5 surgeries per year. We also support Paediatric Oncology Surgeries and Bone Marrow Transplant at SRCC under the Global Grants.

Overview of SRCC Trust

In 1947, a group of dedicated volunteers began a small clinic in a doctor's waiting room, focusing on the treatment of children affected by poliomyelitis. The tireless efforts of these individuals led to the formation of the Society for Rehabilitation of Crippled Children (SRCC). Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru became a patron and played a key role in granting land to the society at Haji Ali. Since its inception, the society has served children from all sectors of Society. SRCC aims to organize hospitals and clinics for the diagnosis, care, and treatment of children, especially those in need of additional support. All services are designed to be child-friendly, promoting Health, Hope, and Happiness

Background of Narayana Health:

Narayana Health is headquartered in Bangalore and operates a national network of hospitals in India with a strong presence in the southern state of Karnataka and eastern India, as well as an emerging presence in western and central India. The first facility was established in Bengaluru with approximately 225 operational beds and the group has since grown to 27 facilities with 5442 operational beds as of January 2016 through a combination of greenfield projects and acquisitions.

The dream came to fruition 9 years back as the hospital became operational with the support of a lot of SRCC Trustee and partners who were organizations and Individuals aligned to this cause of furthering high-quality paediatric care under 1 roof in India.

SRCC Hospital was established in 2017 when SRCC Trustee and NH decided to open a dedicated children's hospital in Mumbai new set up work started in 2014, and finally the Services stared in 2017 onwards with a intention to cater all segments of patients with special focus on Underprivileged kids.

The Hospital is managed by Narayana Health whereas the land and building belong to SRCC Trust. SRCC Trust and Kind Trustees of the said trust, are always supportive to the Hospital and this Hospital would have not been possible if Trust support was not there.

Our contribution to Child Welfare

Our Rotary District 3141 were emphasising on supporting Paediatric Heart Surgeries and based on that in 2019-20 PDG Vijay Jalan decided to become prime mover for global grant to support more than 100 Paediatric Heart Surgeries. After several internal meetings etc., we decided to go ahead with SRCC to implement our global grant. In our second global grant also PDG Vijay Jalan decided to become prime mover.

Based on our interaction with officials of SRCC, we realised that apart from Paediatric Heart Surgeries there is a need for supporting Paediatric Oncology surgeries and Bon Marrow Transplant, as at that time and perhaps now also, very few rotary clubs were ready to support such surgeries/ transplant. This may be because these surgeries and transplant are very expensive and therefore number of patients we can support will be much less compared to heart surgeries.

Luckily, we managed to get non-member Executors Nimesh Kenia & Roshni Daruwalla to the estate of late Freny Kaikhushru Parakh and in case of second grant Dr. Sonal and Late Dr. Rajendra Agarwal to become prime mover. Below is the details of four grants we are implementing at SRCC Children's Hospital.
