



Dearest members,

When we speak about The Rotary Foundation (TRF), we are really speaking about trust, scale and impact. TRF allows even a club like ours to participate meaningfully in some of the world's most critical challenges, and to do so with transparency, accountability and global reach.

One of the strongest examples of this is Rotary's long-standing partnership with the Gates Foundation in the global fight against polio. What began as an ambitious goal has become one of the greatest public health efforts in history, and Rotary has remained steadfast throughout. Every contribution made through TRF strengthens this effort and keeps the finish line firmly in sight. Giving through Rotary continues to be a premier choice globally. TRF holds a four-star rating from Charity Navigator, a distinction that reflects governance, financial discipline and measurable impact. This assurance means our giving is not only generous but also responsible.

I am proud to share how strongly Rotary Club of Bombay Pier (RCBP) stands today. As per the Rotary Monthly Contribution Report for July to December 2025, our club has contributed a total of USD 882,481.32 to TRF. This includes USD 30,377.92 to the Annual Fund, USD 3,353.57 to PolioPlus, USD 823,749.83 under Other Funds and USD 25,000 towards the Endowment Fund. The Foundation Banner Recognition Status further reflects our collective commitment. We have 100 percent TRF giving participation, 100 percent EREY participation.

What makes this truly meaningful is how these numbers translate into real world change. Through TRF, our contributions support Rotary's areas of focus, peacebuilding, disease prevention and treatment, water sanitation and hygiene, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, community economic development and the environment. What we give locally travels globally, creating impact far beyond our immediate circles.

A special note of thanks to our members of the prestigious Paul Harris Society, whose lifetime commitment of USD 1,000 and above exemplifies leadership in giving. Your sustained support strengthens the Foundation year after year.

At this point in the Rotary year, it is also worth noting that RCBP is a leading contributor to TRF in RID 3141 so far. This is a moment to acknowledge every member who has contributed and to recognise the collective strength of our club.

As strong as our overall TRF giving has been, it is important to acknowledge where we need to sharpen our focus. When compared with other clubs, our contributions to the Annual Fund and the Endowment Fund are areas where we are currently lagging. This presents not a concern, but a clear opportunity, an opportunity to strengthen our position and move closer to becoming the leading club in District 3141.

We have several meaningful projects ahead where our time, treasure and talent will come together, most notably the Heart Hospital, a project that holds immense promise for health, healing and hope for the larger community. To access District Designated Fund support and structure Global Grants for such transformational initiatives, sustained contributions to the Annual Fund are essential.

At present, we have contributed USD 30,000 to the Annual Fund. To meet our target of USD 130,000, we require at least USD 70,000 more in contributions in the coming months. Strengthening the Annual Fund now will place us in a far better position to realise not only the Heart Hospital, but also future projects such as the Barsana Eye Hospital, which can become landmark initiatives for the district.

Rather than waiting until June and finding ourselves scrambling, this is the moment to begin the year with a clear and collective focus on the Annual Fund. We still have a few months left in the 2025-26 Rotary year, and with thoughtful planning and continued generosity, we can significantly elevate our impact through TRF giving.

I urge members to come forward with their Annual Fund contributions and to plan their giving in a way that aligns with their values and capacity. Together, we can turn ambition into action and help bring to life some of the most meaningful projects District 3141 has envisioned.

1 October

MMU1 MUMBAI - PROGRESS REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER

22 OPDs screened 797 patients; 2 special camps checked 74 patients. 22 health sessions reached 276 beneficiaries, with 372 one-on-one consultations. A Jogeshwari mega camp offered 42 skin consultations and 74 RBS tests.

At Pioneers High School, general check-ups and adolescent health sessions revealed many undernourished girls from slum and orphanage backgrounds.



1 October

MMU2 WADA - PROGRESS REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER

MMU WADA conducted 23 OPDs (960 patients), 1 special camp (222 students), 31 health sessions (621 beneficiaries), and 424 one-on-one consultations, totaling 1,803 beneficiaries. Camps were held at Z.P. School, PIK (75 students) and Govardhan Skill Centre, Galtare (222 students). Nutrition Day sessions in Agarwadi Village reached 30 women, covering healthy eating and child/adolescent nutrition.



1 October

NGO MELA BY IW CLUB OF BOMBAY PIER

The IW Club of Bombay Pier organized InPower – The NGO Mela at Nehru Centre, Worli, with Chief Guest District Chairman Lakshmi Singh and Guest of Honour Adv. Mangal Prabhat Lodha. 30 NGOs showcased products, raised funds, and promoted social causes. Among 600 visitors, President Rtn Noopur Desai purchased gifts supporting multiple NGOs.

The event was led by President Dr. Bhavna Trivedi, Convenor Sunishi Gabhawala, PP Yakta Rassai, and their team.



1 October

THIRD BREAST CANCER SCREENING CAMP

The Third Breast Cancer Screening Camp, organized by the Rotary Club of Bombay Pier in association with Sanatan Textiles, was held at Lower Parel. Inaugurated by Rtn Partner Beena Dattani, the camp provided free screenings for Lloyd's Group employees. YOGA SESSIONS AT ASHA KIRAN

The children participated enthusiastically, benefiting both physically and mentally from the structured wellness program.



6 October

Our Club co-hosted Artisan Sutra 2025 at NSCI, Worli. The luxury pre-Diwali exhibition showcased 70+ brands celebrating Indian craftsmanship. Rtn Partner Rimple Jhaveri participated with Amour Collections (Stall BC-10). The event reflected Indian artistry and the Rotary spirit.



10 October

BLOOD DONATION DRIVE

Our Club Co-hosted Blood Donation Drive at Nerul. 113 units of blood were collected and donated to Blood Bank of Sion Hospital.



12 October

POLIO NID

BMC had conducted Polio NID programme at 17 Centres at Parel. Bivalent (P1 & P3) drops were given to children 5 years and below. We arranged for food 40 food packets, water and conveyance for the BMC staff. Total 1709 children were administered polio drops. Many thanks to Rtn Munaf Bandukwala for attending and organizing this project year on year.



12 October

DIWALI PARTY FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

A Diwali celebration for the School for the Education of the Challenged (SEC) was hosted by Rtn. Manju Uttamchandani on 12th October at Woodhouse Gymkhana. Over 90 children and young adults with disabilities enjoyed games, musical housie, physiotherapy, food, and gifts. RC Bombay Pier sponsored backpacks, while Rtn. Shabbir Gabajiwala sponsored Brain Vita games.



24 October

INAUGURATION OF RAWA ACADEMY ADRUTA HOMES PROJECT IN ODISHA, BHUBANESHWAR

The donation supports Aadruta Children Home, a unit of RAWA Academy, Bhubaneswar, which cares for abandoned, parentless, and destitute children, with special focus on girls. Recognized under the Juvenile Justice Act, Government of Odisha, Aadruta runs multiple centers across the state to ensure access to quality education and healthcare from infancy through early adulthood.



31 October

ECD EDUCATIONAL CENTER CHIMBIPADA HIGHLIGHTS

High School Support (Std. 10): 7 sessions providing guidance in Math, Science, and English, focusing on exam preparation and confidence-building.

Digital Literacy: 12 sessions for Std. 6-7 on basic computer skills and MS Office, boosting digital confidence and interest in technology.

Community Connect: 11 home visits to engage parents and support children's overall educational progress.



Discussions were held on ongoing skill training programs and identifying interested participants. Village-level tailoring and vocational courses were planned to support youth and women. A cleanliness drive promoted hygiene, while study sessions strengthened students' education. Adolescent girls and women from Numberwadi attended sewing classes, practicing skills like making clothes and bags. The rice seed plot harvest has also begun successfully.

31 October

IRD PROJECT IN 3 VILLAGES

Three community meetings were held in Umerwadi, Numberwadi, and Cherfalwadi, with 77 villagers participating. Women were guided on forming self-help groups, and children's club meetings at three study centers planned Diwali activities and art competitions. Global Hand Washing Day was celebrated on 15 Oct, educating students on hygiene. A Diwali festival activity engaged 34 children, and village women grew vegetables in kitchen gardens for daily use.



31 October

MMU1 MUMBAI - PROGRESS REPORT FOR OCTOBER

MMU1 Mumbai conducted 17 OPD sessions, screening 663 patients, and organized a special skin camp at Limbooni Baug, Chembur, treating 72 patients. The team held 24 health education sessions on topics including anemia, family planning, menstrual health, nutrition, hygiene, and addiction.

31 October

MMU2 WADA - PROGRESS REPORT FOR OCTOBER

MMU Wada held 10 OPDs and 5 health sessions, reaching 336 beneficiaries on topics like anemia, PCOD, and nutrition. Activities continue with a temporary doctor, and camps are held in schools and community spaces while the medical van undergoes maintenance.



1 November

BASIC EDUCATION & CHILD LITERACY

The ZP Schools at Vadvali and Akhada in Wada serve tribal children from marginalized families (Std. 1-4). Through Deganta Swaraj Foundation, our Club sponsored repairs, new toilets, furniture, learning resources, and solar systems. Special thanks to donors Rtn Sunil Krishna and Rtn Saif Qureishi.



2 November

RSW - EYE HEALTH CAMP

An Eye Health Camp was held at True Vision Eye Hospital, Bhuleshwar, screening 113 patients for cataract, dry eye, and other issues, and providing free spectacles and blood sugar checks. Thanks to Rtn Dr. Jinish Upadhyay, the hospital team, and co-host Rotary Club of Bombay Hill South for their support, including Rotaractors Divyan and Priyansh who assisted with patient registration and logistics.

2 November

PREVENTIVE & CURATIVE HEALTH SERVICES -MMUI-OPEX

The project targets slum communities in Mumbai, providing preventive and curative healthcare through a well-equipped Mobile Medical Unit run by Niramaya Health Foundation. It aims to treat thousands of patients annually, significantly reducing healthcare expenses for slum residents. The Rotary Club of Mumbai Malabar Hill's CSR India Grant application for operating expenses was approved by the Rotary Foundation (India), covering the annual cost of running the MMU.



3 November

RSW - CYBERCRIME AWARENESS AT SIES COLLEGE

A Cyber Crime Awareness Session was at SIES College, Sion West, led by Rtn Ashok Nahar and his team along with Rtn Murtuza Sutarwalla. The session highlighted common cyber scams, safe digital practices, cyber safety for all age groups, and reporting incidents via cybercrime.gov.in or 1930.



3 November

RSW - CYBERCRIME AWARENESS AT BLOSSOMS SCHOOL

A Cyber Crime Awareness Session was held at Blossoms School, Churchgate, hosted by our Club. Rtn PP Rupen Doshi spoke on cyber safety in simple, easy-to-understand language for Std VII & VIII students and parents. The session was interactive, with questions well addressed by PP Rupen Doshi and Rtn Sunil Mehta.



4 November

RSW - BLOOD DONATION CAMP

A Blood Donation Drive was organized at APAR Industries, Rabale, during Rotary Service Week, co-hosted with RC of Mumbai Island City. DY Patil Medical College conducted blood collection and health check-ups, and the drive was smoothly managed with support from the APAR team.

5 November

RSW - BREAST & CERVICAL CANCER, WALKESHWAR

Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening was held at Sir Mangaldas Banganga Physiotherapy Centre, Walkeshwar, inaugurated by Mrs. Krupa Shah. Led by Rtn Dr Sangeeta Agrawal, the session used the iBreast tool for breast screening and Pap smear for cervical screening.



5 November

RSW - BREAST & CERVICAL CANCER, COLABA

Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening was held at Indu Clinic, Colaba, co-hosted by RCBP. Rtn Ajay Bhatnagar presented the DearYou App for women's breast health. Led by Rtn Dr Sangeeta Agrawal, 35 women were screened, attended by Rtn Methoo Surty, Rtn Mayuri Bhasin, Rtn Kaajal Thadani, and Rtn Aditi Jain.

5 November

RSW - BREAST & CERVICAL CANCER, WORLI

Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening was conducted at three locations, including People's Hospital (Ruparel Medical Centre), Worli. Breast screening was performed using the advanced iBreast tool, and cervical screening via Pap smear tests. The People's Mobile Hospital session was graced by DG Rtn Dr Manish Motwani.



5 November

BLOOD DONATION DRIVE

In remembrance of Shri Guru Nanak Dev Ji, the NSS Unit of G.N. Khalsa College, Matunga, organized a Mega Blood Donation Drive at CST Station in collaboration with LTMG Hospital and co-hosted by our Club. 140 units of blood were collected, potentially saving 420 lives. The camp was attended by Dr Mangal Chauhan, Rtn Kaajal Thadani, and Rtn Tushar Shah.

6 November

RSW - SECOND INNINGS DIGNITY- BYCULLA

Second Innings, in collaboration with Raell Padamsee's Create Foundation, celebrated Senior Citizens Day at Dignity Foundation, Byculla. Led by Rtn Suhit Jhaveri, 80 seniors enjoyed dance, art, and drama therapy, fun games like Dumb Charades, inspirational talks, and snack boxes. PREVENTIVE CURATIVE HEALTH SERVICES - MMU2 - OPEX

CSR India Grant CS2600737 supports Preventive & Curative Health Services (MMU2) in Wada, Palghar, funded by Crossseas Capital Markets Pvt. Ltd. A Mobile Medical Unit will serve 18 villages through 24 monthly health camps, covering about 800 patients per month. Special monthly camps (cancer, dental, eye, bone density) will be conducted as needed.



7 November

RSW - SPECIALLY ABLED

Specially Abled Event – “Smiles and Sunshine” was held at Nehru Science Centre, Worli. Children with diverse abilities from across the city showcased their talents through music, singing, and dance, radiating confidence and joy. Performances included: Kamla Mehta School for the Blind (singing), Society for the Education of the Challenged, SVRR, ADAPT, and Rotary Sanskardham School (group dances).



A special highlight was a live foot-painting demonstration by Mr. Bandenawaz, whose artworks were presented to the dignitaries. The event was graced by Rotary International President Francisco Arezzo & First Lady Anna Maria Arezzo-Criscione, Rtn John de Giorgio & Monique Chambers, and DG Rtn Dr Manish Motwani.

9 November

SPANDAN MULTISPECIALITY HOSP INAUGURATED

Rotary District 3141 inaugurated the Spandan & Heart Multispeciality Hospital to improve healthcare access in Deonar, Govandi, and Mankhurd. The hospital was inaugurated by RI President Francesco Arezzo and First Lady Anna Maria Criscione, with DG Dr. Manish Motwani and district leaders attending.



President Noopur Desai of RCBP reaffirmed the club's commitment to providing advanced cardiac and multispeciality healthcare and supporting the project through completion. DG Dr. Manish Motwani highlighted the urgent need for such a facility in the Deonar-Govandi-Mankhurd area to serve thousands, offer affordable cardiac care, create local jobs, and strengthen Rotary's health impact. The MoU will be finalized in December 2025, with refurbishment starting January 2026, converting the building into a 59-bed cardiac and multispeciality hospital.



9 November

RSW - HAPPY STREET

Happy Street at Thakur Complex, Kandivali was hosted by RC Bombay Kandivali with RC Bombay Pier as partner. 17 November

INTEGRATED WATER HARVESTING - FARM POND

CSR Grant CS2600744 supports farm ponds for tree-based farming in Jawahar, Mokhada, and Vikramgad, Palghar to address water scarcity. APAR Industries funds 15 ponds and provides HDPE lining for 50 ponds, TATA Motors supports plantation, and MGNREGA supplies labor. Participant selection is managed by local Agriculture Departments.



50 ponds excavated, storing 1.25 crore litres of water, providing protective irrigation for 50 acres. Monitoring: geotagging and beneficiary tracking with photos for all 50 ponds. MMU1 MUMBAI - PROGRESS REPORT FOR NOVEMBER

MMU1 Mumbai – November Progress: 894 patients served in 21 OPDs, with 19 referred. Services included general health check-ups, BP and hemoglobin tests, and health & nutrition awareness. 77 community members attended education sessions on anemia, family planning, menstrual health, nutrition, hygiene, and addiction, along with 342 one-on-one consultations.



30 November

MMU2 WADA - PROGRESS REPORT FOR NOVEMBER

MMU2 Wada – November Progress: 851 patients served in 10 OPDs, with 5 referred. Conducted a hemoglobin testing camp benefiting 38 adolescents. Special health sessions covered anemia, water-borne diseases, PCOD, osteoporosis, and nutrition. 58 one-on-one and 20 group sessions reached 681 community members.

30 November

ECD EDUCATIONAL CENTER CHIMBIPADA

In November 2025, the ECD Center, Chimbipada conducted 66 sessions for Standards 1–4, strengthening literacy, numeracy, and science through interactive, activity-based learning. 60 sessions for Standards 5–8 focused on conceptual understanding, analytical thinking, and application-based learning in core subjects.



High School Support (Std 10): 15 sessions focused on Math, Science, English, exam prep, concept clarity, and confidence-building.

Digital Literacy: 18 sessions for Stds 6–7 on basic computer skills and MS Word, boosting confidence and interest in technology.

Community Connect: 18 home visits engaged parents, strengthening school–community ties and encouraging active involvement.

IRD Project in 3 Villages

30 November



In Umberwadi, Numberwadi, and Cherfalwadi, three community meetings engaged 84 villagers. Parents helped clean the school and village areas, promoting a healthier environment. The School Management Committee discussed Children's Day, student health, education quality, and cleanliness. Children's Day was celebrated with colouring and craft activities. A women's meeting highlighted the importance of self-help groups.



Students were taught handwashing and personal hygiene through demonstrations. Postnatal care sessions guided mothers on childcare and vaccination. Two sessions for women and adolescent girls covered cleanliness, vermicompost, plastic reduction, and proper disposal. Adolescent girls also learned about sexual health, bodily changes, safe practices, STI prevention, and positive body image.

An eye check-up camp in Umbarwadi in collaboration with Lakshmi Charitable Organization served villagers, with cataract surgeries performed and spectacles provided as needed. Women received nutrition guidance, while regular study sessions support students' learning. Numberwadi School received a Smart TV for e-learning. Block Education Officer Mr. Bangre visited and appreciated the Reading Skill Improvement Program and Shashwat Gram Project.



Adolescent girls and women in Numberwadi are attending sewing classes, learning to make children's clothes, bags, and blouses. Mrs. Medha Kirit Somaiya visited, guided the women, and appreciated ongoing activities. On 15 November, 10 farmers attended agricultural training on government schemes and winter crop management, while 15 farmers received seeds and guidance to grow second-season vegetables for additional income.

1 December

TOUCHING LITTLE HEARTS

RC of Negombo, Sri Lanka (RID 3220), partnered in a paediatric heart surgery project at Kokilaben Dhirubhai Ambani Hospital with a total cost of ₹72,71,816 (USD 84,556), funded by a Directed Gift, DDF, club cash, and the World Fund. The project targets 40–70 surgeries, with 10 successfully completed as of 30 November 2025 for children with critical heart conditions.



2 December

EMPOWERMENT FOR WOMEN AT KSHAMATA CENTRE

Kshamata Centre works with women survivors of human trafficking and sex work in Thane through centres at Turbe and Bhiwandi. The project focuses on sanitary health, education, and essential supplies. The initiative provided sanitary pads for three months, facilitated career orientation and counselling, and distributed hygiene items, stationery, paper, and clothes to support dignity, learning, and daily wellbeing.

5 December


FIFTH BREAST CANCER SCREENING CAMP



The Big Dish works on a simple yet powerful principle. Its parabolic shape reflects sunlight from hundreds of mirrors onto a single focal point, much like a magnifying glass. At this point, a receiver (boiler) captures the concentrated energy, generating temperatures of around 1,070°C—equivalent to 2,000 suns, using only solar power.

Vocational Courses Govardhan Skill Centre

14 November



- Train 40 tribal youth in a 1-year residential technical program (DBRT) for multi-skill vocational and entrepreneurial capabilities (Rs 36 lakhs).
- Deploy 40 trained teachers to Anganwadis and Zilla Parishad schools, improving education for 2,000+ tribal children (Rs 40 lakhs).
- Promote digital literacy through computer skilling for 110 rural children, enhancing cognitive skills and digital readiness (Rs 12.7 lakhs).
- Train 50 tribal girls as professional beauticians with starter kits for home-based income generation (Rs 14.4 lakhs).



RCBP disbursed ₹98.72 lakhs for training in digital skills, beautician courses, rural technology, and ZP teachers' training. Led by Mr. Ajay Ranagire, courses run 3–12 months (30% theory, 70% practical), covering agriculture, engineering, childcare, and finance.

So far, 63 tribal students have completed training and become job-ready, with 177 still pending. The final report has been submitted to the Rotary Foundation for grant closure.
