Rotary clubs worldwide contribute to many projects which help in building peace and preventing conflicts. The importance of this avenue is discussed and brought out to students through Interact and Rotaract's making them aware at an early age. Through RCCs, Rotary reaches out to various villages and is able to make them self-reliant in peace & harmony. Rotary clubs also through various community services & engagement ensures that peace & harmony prevails in communities.

The Theme of Sanskriti this month is Mahakumbh. This one historic event has been an unforgettable experience for crores who visited Prayagraj and were able to take a dip in the holy Ganga. People flocked from all parts of India and the world to physically experience this once in a lifetime event. The Seva Bhav was very evident in all the places and one could relate this mammoth task of managing the pilgrims to that of Rotary wheel with the motto of "Service Above Self."



In January-25, we completed 34 projects, 1 Fundraiser event, 1 Speaker Dinner Meeting and 3 meetings. We completed our 8 monthly Annapurna service with an additional one + 10 medical camps in January taking the total count to 85 and we've touched the lives of 11,683 beneficiaries. We thank L&T Realty and Larsen & Toubro Public Charitable Trust for providing CSR support for 100 medical camps in the Vibrant year.

We completed our PF 25 - Kavi Kala (Online Poetry Competition), No Cook Challenge and Taare Zameen Par in a grand manner. Our external speaker in Jan, Mr. Rishi Nanda's talk was very mesmerizing and everyone present enjoyed listening to him. We topped the District ROTAL with participation of 32 members and all coming back home winning awards galore. RCBP was also represented in District Magical Miles - Car Rally for Organ Donation Awareness. We completed 9 Annapurna services in Jan-25. We have provided a total of 40 wheel chairs to various old age homes, disability centres and a hospital, we distributed 8000 mogra sapplings to 12 farmers with the help of CSR support of Bahar Infocom, collaborated for a Leagues Championship Match and many more.

We have successfully completed many projects, programs and events with the enthusiastic support of our members and spouses in Jan-25 and we've together kept our RCBP flag flying high. My gratitude to all our member families.



Some good projects have been planned in the month of February-25... Our own Mr. Rajnish Vohra ji is a speaker in our club meeting at Forest club meeting room on the topic "Union Budget 2025" We will be completing inaugurations of both our vocational centres at Bhandup and Sangharsh Nagar. We have joined with RC of Addiction Prevention as a Co-Host for their VIMUKTI Yatra, a month long car journey, a 10,000 km journey coursing through various states, for addiction prevention and mental health. We have committed USD 5,000/- and joined the Global Grant project of RC Deonar for Project Little Hearts - {paediatric heart surgeries} and we will be completing the 100 medical camps of the Vibrant year in this month.

I look forward to your involvement, contributions & motivation as always.



Project National Integration (PNI) – A Vision for Peace and Development

As you may be aware, the Kashmir Valley for a long time was infested with insurgency. Thanks to the untiring efforts of our Indian Army, who have defeated the insurgents and brought peace to the valley, we are now able to see our borders safe and witness unstinted growth in the economy. The Kashmir valley, known for its breathtaking beauty, is also one of the most challenging and economically underdeveloped regions in India. With its harsh terrain and extreme weather conditions, the region remains isolated for nearly 7-8 months each year due to heavy snowfall. To bridge this gap and integrate the local population into the national mainstream, the Indian Army has undertaken several nation-building efforts. These efforts focus on promoting peace, goodwill, and economic development, providing educational and medical support, creating job opportunities, and improving sports infrastructure for young adults.

Recognizing the need for long-term development in the region, the Indian Army invited Rotary District 3141 to join hands in this noble initiative. Thus, Project National Integration (PNI) was launched to foster peace through economic development. The Rotary Club of Bombay Powai was privileged to be the first club to support this initiative and lay the foundation for a larger movement.

The First Step: Mobile Ambulances (2022)

During my tenure as President of the Rotary Club of Bombay Powai in 2022, we kickstarted the District PNI initiative by donating mobile ambulances for the villages along the Line of Control (LOC). While the Indian Army had established a hospital for local villagers, the lack of transportation facilities made it nearly impossible for the sick and injured to reach medical aid, especially during the winter months when the roads remain blocked by snow.









The donation of these ambulances was a game-changer. It provided a lifeline to the villagers, ensuring that medical assistance was within reach despite the challenging terrain. The ambulances, placed under the supervision of the Village Sarpanch, continue to serve hundreds of residents, saving lives and reinforcing trust between the locals and national forces. Our initiative gave momentum to Project National Integration, encouraging more clubs from Rotary District 3141 to join and contribute to this transformational mission

Expanding Our Efforts: Education for Underprivileged Students (2024) Education is the foundation for change, and as Malala Yousafzai once said, "With guns, you can kill terrorists, but with education, you can kill terrorism." Recognizing the importance of quality education in building a progressive society, our club took a significant step in 2024 by sponsoring the school fees for 50 students for a period of three years.

"This concept is a unique one and has been introduced for the first time in Kashmir valley," he added.

Sarpanch Machil Habibullah told Greater Kashmir that two locals have also been recruited by army to drive these ambulances. "They will be getting a salary of Rs 18000 per month," he added.

Locals of the area have highly hailed the efforts of Army and Rotary District 3141 Mumbai for this humanly gesture.

Pertininently army had also donated a four wheeler ambulance worth lacs few years ago to the people of Machil









The Indian Army has established 27 Army Goodwill Schools and several government schools along the LOC to provide quality education to local children. While these schools operate at a highly subsidized fee of just Rs. 500 per month, many families are still unable to afford even this minimal amount. As a result, children from economically weaker sections are forced to study in alternate religious schools, keeping them away from mainstream education.

By sponsoring these students, our club is actively supporting the Army's vision of ensuring that these children receive proper schooling, preparing them for a brighter future and a more integrated society. Additionally, this initiative has led to an increase in enrollment in these schools and has successfully brought many students from alternate religious institutions into mainstream education, fostering national unity and broader career opportunities for the youth.











Empowering Women: Midwifery Training for Kashmiri Girls (2024)

One of the most pressing healthcare challenges in Kashmir is the lack of trained medical professionals, especially for maternal healthcare. Due to severe winter conditions and the absence of proper medical facilities, many pregnant women must be airlifted to Srinagar or other regional hospitals for childbirth. Unfortunately, this is not always possible, leading to 100-150 pregnancy-related deaths annually. To address this crisis, Rotary District 3141 initiated a midwifery training program in 2024, and our club took the lead by sponsoring the training of 25 young women from Kashmir in Mumbai. These women were enrolled in a three-month residential course on Obstetric and Social Health Nursing and General Anatomy at Sai Dhanwantari Nursing Institute and Astha Hospital, Manor, affiliated with the Maharashtra Self Employment Training Board. The training included a minimum of 25 live deliveries per student, ensuring hands-on experience.

The training program covered course fees, travel, lodging, boarding, and necessary medical tools. The students have returned to Kashmir and some of them are serving in different regions, ensuring continuous maternal care within their communities and significantly reducing pregnancy-related fatalities.



Empowering Kashmiri Women: A Beacon of Hope and Unity



Pathaks (IPP Dr Kamalini, Atul & Ishu), alongwith our friends Shyamala Praveen, Sudhir & Geeta Rao were privileged and lucky to do a whirlwind pilgrimage tour of the three Holy places in, believe-it-or-not, just 2-1/2 days!! Departing on Day-0 by an evening flight, we reached the Holy city of Kashi, or Benaras or Varanasi, as it is called. We reached our hotel by 9pm, dumped our luggage, and immediately left for the KASHI-VISHWANATH temple, as advised by our local guide. Leaving our vehicle at some point, we walked for a km on foot, through a short-cut of narrow cobbled-path lanes, coming out on main road. The rush at 10pm was like it was probably 6pm. Fortunately, we got an excellent Divine Darshan of Lord Vishwanath in less than an hour, at ~11pm. They normally close darshan by evening, but because of the MahaKumbh rush, they extended the time upto 1am. Har Har Mahadev!

Next morning, after breakfast we proceeded to Sarnath, a place of great historical significance. We visited the monastery where Gautam Buddha gave his first discourse on Buddhism, after he attained enlightenment. This place also has the historical Ashoka Chakra and the four lions on a pillar. In the evening, we had the divine pleasure of witnessing Gangaaarti at Dashashwamedh ghat. Thanks to our guide, the ladies reached the ghat well before time (after their shopping) and got choice seat, closest to the Deity. We reached bit late, and because of the over-whelming crowd, we could not reach them, though we were just ~10m away... you had to see the rush to believe what I say. Kamalini lit the aarti-ki-baati and performed puja at the main Deity. The aarti was performed by 7 priests in unison - the entire atmosphere was pure bliss. Har Har Gange!

We were to leave next morning at 4am, but our car got delayed; we could leave at 5am. We entered Prayagraj ~7ish. Our driver said the jam is so huge that we will not be able to reach the Triveni sangam even by night. He told us we should take a different route, through the Sadhus' Akhadas - we agreed. But whichever road he took (he was knowledgeable), there were police barricades, and it was purely your luck to negotiate them. We finally reached some point beyond which it was not possible to go - the Administration had smartly dug trenches all over the place where they wanted to stop vehicle movement. T

he hundreds of cars parked there were proof enough that we need to desert our car. We got down, took bare essentials in handbag, crossed the trench, walked for a km or so and got an auto after a long wait. The entire eco-system is awesome.. public toilets within walking distance, autorickshaws and bikes constantly plying, dusty and muddy roads entirely covered by steel sheets to permit easy vehicle movements of all kinds, police personnel everywhere guiding people.. full support in spic proportion. Everywhere, there were multitude of people of all ages and demography, including many foreigners; some pulling their stroll bags on dusty roads (looked funny). It was mind-boggling to see that the mela still working like a well-oiled machine.

After a 20min ride, he dropped us near Sangam. We walked towards the ghats, for 1-2 kms. Our attempts to cross the pontoon bridge was unsuccessful.. the crowd on the other side was so huge, they had stopped people from going; they were only allowing people to come back, because the other side was over-full.

We managed to find one ghat closeby, where we took our Holy Dip. The experience was divine.. chants of 'Har Har Gange' everywhere. Then we retraced our steps back, managed to find an auto and returned to our parked car, past noon. Reaching the Sangam, taking dip and returning, all within 5-6 hours, was truly a miracle.



The foods you carry on a journey should be lightweight, travel-friendly, have a long shelf life and provide the right mix of energy and nutrition. Many Gujarati snacks are dry, making them perfect for long journeys like pilgrimages.

Thepla — A spiced flatbread made with fenugreek leaves and wheat flour, stays fresh for days and is the most popular travel food.

Sharing below Gujarati Thepla recipe:

Ingredients:

2 cups whole wheat flour ¹/₂ cup finely chopped methi or dried kasuri methi ¹/₂ tsp turmeric powder ¹/₂ tsp red chili powder ¹/₂ tsp cumin powder ¹/₂ tsp coriander powder



1 tbsp sesame seeds ¹/₂ tsp ajwain seeds 1tbsp oil for the dough Salt to taste Water as needed Oil (for cooking)

Instructions: Prepare Dough:

In a mixing bowl, combine wheat flour, methi leaves, and all the spices.

Add 1 tbsp oil, then mix well.

Gradually add water and knead into a soft, smooth dough. Cover and let it rest for 15-20 minutes.

Rolling Thepla:

Divide the dough into small balls. Roll each ball into a thin, round flatbread (like a roti)

Cooking Thepla:

Heat a tawa or pan over medium flame.

Place the rolled thepla on the hot tawa and cook for 30-40 seconds.

Flip again and cook until golden brown.

Spots appear on both sides.

Serve:

Enjoy with pickle, curd, or chundo (sweet mango pickle) **Storage Tip:**

Thepla stays fresh for 2-3 days at room temperature, making it a great travel food. For longer shelf life, store in an airtight container or vacuum pack.



Another favourite is the energy rich food- Sukhdi (Gor Papdi)

Here's a traditional Gujarati **Sukhdi recipe**, a delicious and healthy sweet made from wheat flour, jaggery, and ghee.

Ingredients 1 cup wheat flour ¹/₂ cup ghee ¹/₂ cup jaggery (grated or chopped) 1 teaspoon cardamom powder (optional) 2 tablespoons chopped almonds

Instructions:

Heat Ghee: In a heavy-bottomed pan, heat the ghee on low flame. Roast Wheat Flour: Add the wheat flour and roast it on low heat, stirring continuously, until it turns golden brown and releases a nutty aroma. This takes about 8-10 minutes.

Add Jaggery: Turn off the flame and add grated jaggery. Mix well until it melts completely with the heat of the flour.

Flavoring: Add cardamom powder and mix well. You can also add chopped almonds for extra crunch.

Set and Cut: Transfer the mixture to a greased plate or tray. Flatten it with a Spatula and let it cool slightly.

Cut into Pieces: While still warm, cut into diamond or square shapes. Let it cool completely before serving.


ROTARY IN ACTION - Magical Miles (Car Rally for Organ Donation Awareness) - 13th Jan, 2025
