







Rotary International recognizes Youth Service as one of its five Avenues of Service, highlighting the organization's commitment to empowering the next generation. Rotary and its members contribute significantly to youth development through various programs aimed at fostering leadership, community involvement, international understanding, and personal growth. Here are some key aspects of Rotary's youth services and contributions:

Core Youth Programs:

Interact: These are service clubs for young people aged 12-18, sponsored by local Rotary clubs. Interact clubs undertake community service projects and activities that promote leadership development and global understanding. They organize at least two projects annually, one benefiting their school or community and another fostering international understanding.





Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA): RYLA is a leadership development program for young people (ages can vary but often include those up to 30). These events, ranging from one-day seminars to week-long camps, focus on building communication and problem-solving skills, ethical leadership, and community/global citizenship. Rotary clubs and districts organize and facilitate these events.

RYPEN- Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment

Rypen is a weekend residential experience for youth aged 14-16 years designed

To develop skills that will assist them in the transition to adulthood. Participant are involved in a variety of workshops and activities which provide an opportunity for them to personally develop, gain self-confidence, communication skills, challenge themselves, build friendships& develop life skills. Rypen, titled Eklavya organized by Palghar club since 2019 for around 200 tribal students is one fine example.

MUNA- MODEL United Nations Assembly

Muna is a Rotary district project designed to create an awareness of the role of the United Nations in mediating international issue.

MIPS- Model Indian Parliament session Mips simulate the working of the Indian Parliament






Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE): This program provides students aged 15-19 with the opportunity to live and study in another country for a short term (weeks to three months) or a long term (full academic year). Participants experience a new culture, learn a new language, and develop into global citizens. Host families and Rotary clubs provide support during the exchange.

Rotaract: These are clubs for young adults aged 18-30, often university-based or community-based. Rotaract clubs focus on leadership development, professional networking, and service projects, working in partnership with their sponsoring Rotary clubs.





Mentorship and Role Modeling: Rotarians often serve as mentors and role models for young people involved in these programs, sharing their professional expertise and life experiences. The slogan "Every Rotarian an Example to Youth," adopted in 1949, underscores this commitment.

Community Service Involvement: Rotary encourages the involvement of youth and young adults in their various community and international service projects, fostering a sense of civic responsibility from a young age.

Financial Support: Rotary clubs and districts often provide financial support for youth programs, including scholarships, exchange program costs, and project funding. The Rotary Foundation also offers grants that can support youth-focused initiatives.

Promoting Peace and Understanding: Many Rotary youth programs, particularly Youth Exchange, are explicitly designed to foster international understanding and contribute to a more peaceful world by building bridges between cultures.

Developing Future Leaders: Rotary's youth programs are crucial in nurturing the leadership potential of young people, equipping them with the skills and values necessary to become future community and global leaders.

Creating a Safe Environment: Rotary emphasizes youth protection and implements guidelines and training to ensure a safe environment for all young participants in Rotary activities.

Collaboration and Networking: These programs provide opportunities for young people to connect with peers locally and internationally, building lasting friendships and networks.





In Mumbai, like in other parts of the world, local Rotary clubs actively engage in these youth service programs, adapting them to the specific needs and opportunities within their communities. They might sponsor Interact and Rotaract clubs in local schools and universities, organize RYLA events focused on regional challenges, and facilitate youth exchanges with other countries.

By investing in youth, the Rotary community aims to create a positive and lasting impact on individuals and society, embodying their motto of "Service Above Self" and fostering the next generation of engaged and ethical leaders.












SANSKRITI- Budh Purníma ín Pícs By Kamalíní Pathak










ROTARY FAMILY- Unleashing Hidden Talent - By Devank Garg


