On the evening of 30th August, South Bombay felt like it had paused to take a deep breath. Manoj Jarange Patil's morcha had brought parts of the city to a standstill. The streets weren't silent—some patches were heavily jammed, traffic crawling painfully slow under a heavy, rain-laden sky.

Yet, within the warm embrace of Wodehouse Gymkhana—a charming colonial club that has witnessed decades of Mumbai's history—a different kind of energy was building.
