Our African Adventure

Our African journey took us from the Masai Mara to the Serengeti, and honestly, it felt like stepping straight into a nature documentary!

At Mara Toto Tree Camp, perched above the forest, we woke up to hippos grunting below and set off each morning with our wonderful guide, Sammy. We watched lions & their cubs lounging in the grass, a leopard on the prowl, a cheetah tenderly caring for her cub — and another chasing impalas while hyenas hovered nearby. Herds of zebras, gazelles, and impalas completed the classic Mara scene.

A definite highlight was our sunrise hot air balloon ride over the Mara — floating silently above the plains with animals spread out below us. Absolutely breathtaking! And the number of hippos we spotted... unforgettable!

Then came the Serengeti, where a quick charter flight took us to Asilia Camp with our amazing guides, Baraka and Tate. We were beyond lucky to witness not one but two wildebeest and zebra crossings — a jaw-dropping display of courage and instinct. But in the end, one or two get sacrificed and eaten by crocodiies!! Elephants, giraffes, and endless birds (don't ask us their names) added to the magic.

As Taizoon wisely said, "Nature teaches us about survival, feeding, mating, and co-existing — lessons we humans live by too."

Before heading home to Mumbai, we spent a night in Nairobi. With half a day to spare, Adam suggested a quick trip to Nairobi National Park to try our luck with

rhinos — and what luck! We saw three rhinos, plus a family of jackals, ostriches, towering giraffes, and three lions lounging on a little hilltop.

### NEHRU PLANETARIUM

Since ancient days, human has never ceased to wonder at the splendour of the starry sky. His/her curiosity and quest of knowledge of the stars gave birth to the imaginary forms of the various constellation. Viewed in this context, it is not at all surprising that Astronomy has been one of the most ancient of sciences. Till the beginning of the 19th century, teaching of Astronomy has been confined to the classroom and for practical purpose to the actual starry heavens. Nearly century have passed by after the first Planetarium had been built and served as a visual aid in learning Astronomy. The purpose of the creation of Nehru Centre is to:

To inculcate and promote rational outlook of life To promote the cause of education and to undertake scientific research in sciences and technology, for the advancement and emancipation of our people. The Nehru Planetarium part of Nehru Centre was inaugurated on 3rd March 1977 by the then late Prime Minister Smt. Indira Gandhi. Over the years, this has grown into a Centre for astronomy and space science outreach. Nehru Planetarium has so far created thirty-five astronomical presentations; twenty-eight of them by using Carl Zeiss Mark IV Universal Projector. Over 14 million people have viewed and enjoyed these shows. Creating a Planetarium programme is more of an art than science. It involves the interaction of scientists, artists, communicators, musicians, technicians like sound recordists, photographers and a host of others. First the theme is chosen, and then a team of researchers collect basic information.





It is checked and re-checked and a preliminary script is written. This is then tested in the planetarium dome for its feasibility and operational convenience. After several trials, a script is drafted and this is then sent to various scientists and communicators for their expert comments. The script is finalised after rounds of discussions over number of days and nights taking into consideration the comments received from a wide variety of people from different fields.

Taking their inputs, changes are then incorporated. After which the script is discussed along with the music. The script is also translated in Hindi and Marathi. After the interaction with music directors, narrators and other artists, the commentary in three languages is recorded. Casting music for planetarium programmes is an pleasurable experience itself. For each programme the music is specially cast and blended with commentary and visuals to make the sky show more exciting. Since the shows are visited by children as well as others the programme is made as simple as possible, at the same time interesting for adult audience. So far, the Nehru Planetarium, Mumbai has produced thirty major planetarium programmes on various topics:?1) Tryst with Destiny 2) Galileo to Galileo 3) Cosmic Life 4) This Violent Universe 5) 4000 B.C. to 2000 A.D. - Evolution of Astronomy 6) Universe in Seven Steps 7) Comets to Stars 8) Secret Life Of Stars 9) Stars In the Lime Light 10) Hide and Seek in the Sky 11) Fireworks in Space and so on. In order to make the programme more admired, theatrical effects like Galileo watching the night sky in the year 1610 (in the programme 'Galileo to Galileo'), landing of extra-terrestrial beings on earth (in the programme 'Cosmic Life') are introduced. These live appearances have a thrilling impact on the audience and contribute immensely to success of the programme. In the meantime, the technology has marched ahead. To keep abreast with the new technology, Nehru Centre installed Digistar-3 Planetarium Projector in 2003. This new equipment is a bank of eight computers that have the latest data of the sky loaded onto them. All the advantages of digital imagery are thus brought to the fingertips of the operator. The computers send the information to six high-resolution video projectors that cover the entire dome. MINI PROGRAMMES: In addition to the major programme, short or mini programmes were also produced. 'Man in Space', 'Man on Moon', 'Discovery of Planet Uranus', 'Total Solar Eclipse in India', 'Sun', 'Moon', 'Conjunction of Planets in the year 1982 are some of these. Planetarium out-reach activities Prof. M K Vainu Bappu Prof Penrose, Dr Jayant Narlikar, Prof Anthony Hewish, Prof. Srinivas Kulkarni. The Planetarium arranges popular lectures by well-known scientists from the country and abroad. Courses on astronomy are conducted for students and general public. The Planetarium also shows films on various scientific topics. To create interest in astronomy and general science the planetarium arranges various contests like guiz contest, essay contest, astro-painting and astro-poetry contest. It also arranges special exhibitions. Mini Planetarium (Out-reach activities) Among the outreach activities of Nehru Planetarium is the dissemination of information in astronomy through the concept of the "Mini Planetarium". This planetarium on wheels consists of a projector capable of projecting 960 stars in a collapsible dome. Being portable and compact it can readily be set up in any classroom of area 150 square feet and

can accommodate a class of 30-40 students. The Mobile exhibitions on Astronomy together with a portable Mini-Planetarium are sent out to village and district towns to reach and serve a wider cross section of the people. Telescopes are kept outside the planetarium for sky watching of the night sky. These telescopes are also being taken to various places particularly to villages. Schools are encouraged to send their student groups and avail of concessional fee facility. The groups from Mumbai Municipal Corporation schools, children from economically weaker sections and physically challenged see our shows for free, of course with prior arrangement and merit. One can teach, apart from astronomy and other sciences, Geography, History and even Poetry. The planetarium had arranged poems under the sky in which some of the great poems of great poets were read out under the background of the starry sky. There were also programmes entitled 'Music under the Stars' in which well-known musicians performed under the artificial night sky. In fact, all museums should have planetaria as one of their major activities. The presence of Planetarium in any places will attract a large number of audiences. One can teach everything under the sky be it science or arts under this umbrella of Planetarium dome. In fact one can make planetarium programme to suit any subject which the museum is supposed to popularize. Whereas many of these activities are quantifiable by statistical figures, what is not quantifiable is the fact that a whole generation of students have grown up with the Planetarium and the impact the Planetarium has created on their thoughts and action. Over the past twenty eight years thousands of children have become regular visitors to the planetarium and many hundreds have been deeply involved in its activities. The knowledge that one gains in the virtual atmosphere of the planetarium show would attempt anyone to watch the real night sky for years to come! Indeed Planetarium compels the soul to look upwards and teaches the philosophy: "A man's reach should exceed his grasp, or what is heaven for?"? In a very subtle manner, science and art do complement each other. And the planetarium does play a major role in emphasizing this relation.



# ROTARY SERVICE WEEK 8th NOVEMBER - DISABILITY CAMP



# Breath of Life – Healing or Longevity? Speaker session by Bijal Joshi

At a recent wellness session, Bijal Joshi captivated the audience with her talk, "Breath of Life - Healing or Longevity?" She highlighted how the simplest act we perform—breathing—holds immense power to transform our physical and emotional well-being.

Bijal explained that while breathing happens automatically, conscious breathwork can shift the body from stress to calm in moments. She demonstrated easy techniques like diaphragmatic and rhythmic breathing, helping participants experience immediate relaxation and clarity. Even brief practice, she noted, can reduce anxiety, support emotional balance, and restore inner stability.

She also explored the connection between breath and longevity, emphasizing that slower, mindful breathing supports healthier stress responses and long-term vitality. Cultures known for longevity often incorporate such practices into daily routines.

Bijal concluded with a gentle reminder: healing and longevity begin with awareness. Every mindful breath is a step toward a healthier, more vibrant life.


