BANGLADESH ARMY CHIEF GIVES STRONG MESSAGE AT JANMASHTAMI RALLY WARNED EXTREMISTS AGAINST SPREADING HATE



At a Janmashtami rally in Dhaka, General Waker Uz Zaman said the country belongs to all communities and warned about no place for hate



Point Nemo, located in the South Pacific Ocean, is the most isolated place on Earth. Officially known as the oceanic pole of inaccessibility, it lies roughly 2,687 kilometers from the nearest landmass, including the coasts of Antarctica, Easter Island, and the Pitcairn Islands. Discovered in 1992 using computer calculations, this remote point was named after Captain Nemo, the fictional submarine captain from Jules Verne's Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea.

What makes Point Nemo especially fascinating is just how completely cut off it is from human activity. At any given time, the closest humans are often astronauts aboard the International Space Station, orbiting about 417 kilometers above the Earth. This surreal reality underscores how vast and empty our oceans can be, with Point Nemo serving as a kind of "oceanic desert" far from civilization, shipping lanes, or air traffic.

Because of its remoteness, Point Nemo has been used as a spacecraft cemetery, where decommissioned satellites and space stations like Russia's Mir are directed to crash safely into the ocean. Its isolation makes it ideal for avoiding harm to populated areas, but also highlights how much of our planet remains untouched and mysterious. Point Nemo stands as a powerful symbol of both Earth's natural extremities and humankind's reach across sea and space.
