



Why the Rotary year begins 1 July

In August 1910, the Board of Directors ordered an audit of the International Association of Rotary Clubs' finances. The auditors recommended that the organization end its fiscal year on 30 June to give the secretary and treasurer time to prepare a financial statement for the convention and board, and to determine the proper number of club delegates to the convention.

The executive committee agreed and, in April 1913, designated 30 June as the end of the fiscal year. This also allowed for changes to the schedule for reporting club membership and payments.

The term "Rotary year" has been used to signify Rotary's annual administrative period since at least 1913. An article in The Rotarian that July noted, "The Rotary year that is rapidly drawing to a close has been signalized by several highly successful joint meetings of Clubs that are so situated as to assemble together easily and conveniently."

Since the executive committee's decision in 1913, the end of the Rotary year has remained 30 June.


In February 1905, a Chicago lawyer named Paul Harris resolved to fill a hole in his life. He had arrived in the city a few years earlier, and though he'd built a successful law practice, something was missing. The young man was lonely. The sense of camaraderie and community he had known growing up in a small Vermont town was glaringly absent in the hustle and bustle of urban life. "Everywhere there were people but nowhere a familiar face," he lamented.

To overcome his feeling of alienation, Harris asked three acquaintances if they wanted to meet regularly to share friendship. Their first meeting took place that February in downtown Chicago. There, they decided to form a club, where people could come together—not just to do business, but to form lasting, genuine connections. Because they would rotate their meetings at each other's offices, they chose "Rotary" as a fitting name for the group.

That one club soon became dozens and then hundreds, until finally there were thousands of clubs in small towns and big cities across America and the world. They meet for fellowship, networking and community services.

Nor was Rotary alone: In 1917, Melvin Jones, another Chicagoan, founded the Association of Lions Clubs, and it too grew over time. Thus, Chicago has become the birthplace of two of the world's oldest and largest community organizations.

THE BALLAD OF BLIND TOM



In 1849, on a plantation in Georgia, a boy named Thomas Wiggins was born, a child who seemed destined to be forgotten by history. Later known as Blind Tom, his birth occurred in an era when being blind meant being deemed useless in the harsh, enslaved South.

His early life was filled with rejection as he could not work in the fields, and his owner even considered disposing of him. However, fate had other plans for Tom, who was destined to defy all expectations.

From a young age, Tom developed an obsessive fascination with sound. While other children played or worked, he would spend hours listening to the wind in the trees, the drip of rain, or the creaking of the house's wooden beams. One day, at the age of four,

Tom discovered a piano in his owner's home, and to everyone's surprise, he sat down and began to play. Though he had never received a single lesson, he imitated the melodies he heard with an accuracy that amazed those around him. His owner, recognizing Tom's extraordinary gift, trained him with music teachers and began showcasing him as a natural prodigy.

Blind Tom soon became a sensation, performing across the United States and Europe. His ability to replicate complex pieces of music after hearing them just once, including works by Beethoven and Chopin, was unmatched. He could also mimic any sound he heard, from birdsong to the rumble of a storm.

Despite his fame, Tom's life was never truly his own. His earnings were controlled by his owner, and Tom, with a childlike mind possibly due to what would now be recognized as autism, never fully understood the exploitation he faced. Blind

Tom's legacy endures today, inspiring artists like Elton John, who wrote "The Ballad of Blind Tom" in his honor. Though his name may not be as famous as other musical geniuses, his story remains a testament to the power of art and the resilience of the human spirit.
