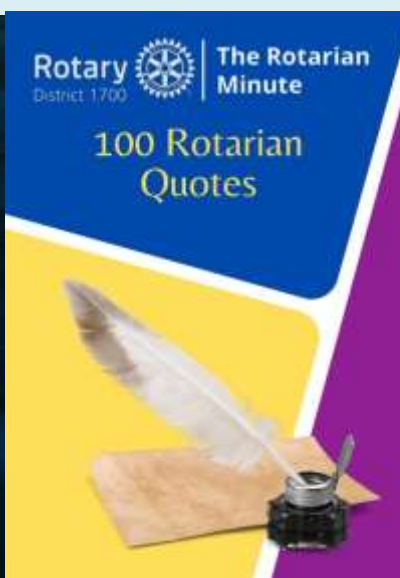
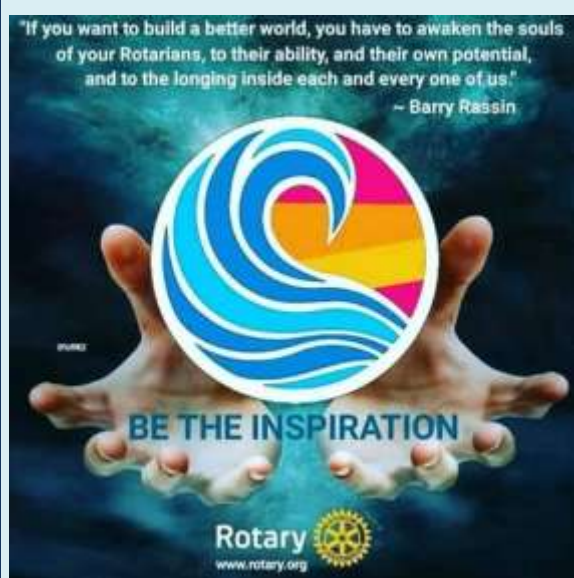

## GREENLAND SHARK



**Born in the 1600s and still alive this Greenland shark has seen four centuries of history from beneath the sea**

Somewhere in the icy waters of the North Atlantic swims a creature older than the United States, the French Revolution, and even the invention of the lightbulb. It's a Greenland shark likely born around 1620 and it's still alive today. At nearly 400 years old, this female shark holds the title of the longest-living known vertebrate on Earth, surpassing even the mighty bowhead whale, which can live up to 211 years.

**Greenland sharks grow painfully slow about 1 centimetre per year and don't reach sexual maturity until they're around 150 years old.** Scientists estimated this shark's age using a fascinating method: radiocarbon dating of the proteins in her eye lenses, which are formed at birth and never change. The results placed her birth between 1501 and 1744, with the most likely date around 1620 meaning she's lived through centuries of global transformation, all while gliding through deep, frigid waters in near silence.

But this epic lifespan comes with vulnerability. These sharks were once hunted heavily for their oil-rich livers, and because they mature so slowly, many of the individuals alive today are still biologically "teenagers." Their future recovery could take another century. **This story isn't just about longevity it's about resilience, fragility, and the urgent need to protect Earth's slowest, oldest wanderers from the faster-moving threats we've created**
