Meet our Inbound IYE Student
Ana Luiza Busanello Veiga, BRAZIL



Hello, I am Ana Luiza Busanello Veiga, I am 15 years old, and I live in Balneário Camboriú, Santa Catarina, Brazil.

In my free time, I like to paint and listen to music. During the week, I wake up at 6 a.m., get ready, have my breakfast, and my father drives me to school. I have 9 subjects throughout the school year: Portuguese, Mathematics, History, Geography, Arts, English, Religious Education, Science, and Physical Education. I have five classes every day, each lasting 45 minutes. The first class starts at 7:45 a.m. and ends at 11:45 a.m. At my school, I cannot choose my subjects, but the teachers have their own classroom, so students must move to another room when the bell rings. I have been a class representative twice, in 2022 and 2024, and I was also a monitor and teacher's assistant in the off-school hours during the 2022 school year.

In addition to school, I take dance classes every Monday from 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., then I have coffee with my parents, and at 8:00 p.m., we go to the Rotary meeting. On Tuesdays, at 6:30 p.m., I go to the Interact meeting.

At home, I've always shared a room with my older sister, and this only changed in 2023 when she moved out, so I have no problem sharing a room since I've always been used to it. My school is 5 km from my house, so my father drives me there.

My father is an institutional consultant and international crisis manager, and my mother is a financial analyst.

I live in a region with several interconnected cities. I live in the Camboriú community, study, and take courses in the city of Balneário Camboriú, both with an average population of 100,000 to 130,000 inhabitants. The economy of Camboriú is mainly based on industry, agriculture, granite and marble mining, and rural tourism, while Balneário Camboriú's main activity is tourism.

Since I was very young, I have always been passionate about the seven world arts: painting, music, dance, literature, theater, and cinema. My family values and invests in art. We go to painting and sculpture exhibitions, watch theatrical plays, appreciate and enjoy our national cinema, and I frequently attend various dance performances. When I was younger, I took two different types of dance classes for a year, I did a year of surfing lessons, and during these years, I always tried to improve my painting and drawing techniques. In 2023, I took a professional course to learn new oil painting techniques. In 2024, I returned to taking dance classes. At least three times a year, we make some cultural trips to visit exhibitions and museums.

In October 2023, I took my first trip abroad with my mother's uncles. I stayed 20 days in Portugal and 10 days in Italy, visited several cities, learned a lot of new things, and matured greatly during this short period of time, changing my perception of many things.

Regarding food, I have no restrictions, I like to try new cuisines and I'm very open to it. As for animals, I have no problem; I feel a strong connection with them, and I even have two cats. I don't like it when people act unjustly or yell at me; I find it unacceptable.

My most distinctive traits are creativity, communication, critical thinking, sense of justice, generosity, empathy, and kindness. Areas I am working on include being self-critical, improving focus, and overcoming procrastination.

As a project for my professional career, I want to establish a school where we can develop children in a different way than conventional schools. I had this idea from a young age due to my dissatisfaction with the study method I experienced. I want to learn and study new, more humane study methods, and I feel that by visiting other countries, I will be able to achieve this.

As an exchange student, I aim to expand my knowledge in various areas such as education, politics, cuisine, art, and culture, and as a foreigner, I plan to share my experiences, life stories, and culture, contributing knowledge and valuing the strengths of my country.
