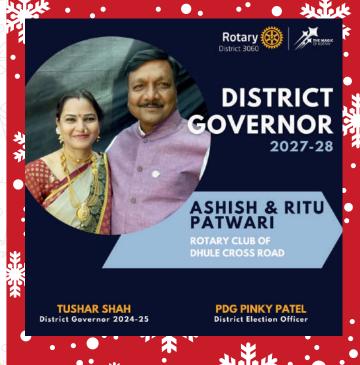

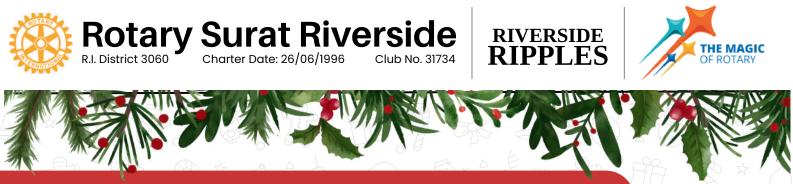
Later in the evening, Indian Idol contestant Shanmukh Priya gave a power packed performance which left the crowd tapping their feet. All in all, it was a super eventful day.
