



Preserve Planet Earth

- Convention in Portland, Oregon, then President-elect Paulo Costa told the gathered Rotarians, "The hour has come for Rotary to raise its voice, to claim its leadership, and to rouse all Rotarians to an honorable crusade to protect our natural resources." He declared a Rotary initiative to "Preserve Planet Earth," asking Rotarians to make environmental issues part of their service agenda: to plant trees, to work to keep our air and water clean, and to protect the planet for future generations.
- President Costa asked that one tree be planted for each of the 1.1 million members that Rotary had at the time. We Rotarians, as is our wont, did better, planting nearly 35 million trees by the end of the Rotary year. Many of those trees are likely still flourishing today, absorbing carbon from the environment, releasing oxygen, cooling the air, improving soil quality, providing habitat and food for birds, animals, and insects, and yielding a host of other benefits. Unfortunately, while those trees have kept on doing good for the environment, Rotary as a whole has not carried its environmental commitment forward.
- Environmental issues are deeply entwined in every one of our areas of focus and cannot be dismissed as not Rotary's concern. Pollution is affecting health across the globe: More than 80 percent of people in urban areas breathe unsafe air, a number that rises to 98 percent in low- and middle-income countries. If current trends continue, by 2050 the oceans are expected to contain more plastics by weight than fish. And rising temperatures are welldocumented: Global annual average temperatures increased by about 2 degrees F (1.1 degrees C) from 1880 through 2015. That this change was caused by humans is not a subject of scientific debate, nor is the likelihood of vast economic and human disruption if the trend continues unchecked. The need for action is greater than ever – and so is our ability to have a real impact.
 - As past UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon put it, "There can be no Plan B, because there is no Planet B." Our planet belongs to all of us, and to our children, and to their children. It is for all of us to protect, and for all of us in Rotary to make a difference.



According to a recent study, human greed and irresponsible activities are causing an alarming decline in the variety of plant and animal life on Earth. Biodiversity, which is key to maintaining the earth's ecological balance is likely to steadily become a bigger threat by 2050 if nations and its citizens do not start acting responsibly NOW. While genome science may reconstruct lost species, will they care or consider and it's a long way away, anyway.

While known industrial hazards are destroying the world's species, did you ever realise that something as seemingly small as careless domestic litter, or indiscriminate disposal of waste in your own area, can have far reaching impacts like eroding the coral reef? Read on these alarming facts to which "we the people" are the major contributors:

Earth is undergoing a mass extinction event, the first since the dinosaurs disappeared some 65 million years ago, and only the sixth in the last half-a-billion years.	About 41 percent of amphibian species and more than a quarter of mammals are threatened with extinction.
About half of coral reefs have been lost in the last 30 years.	African elephant numbers dropped to 415,000 in 2016, down about 111,000 over 10 years
The global populations of 3,706 monitored vertebrate species fish, birds, mammals, amphibians, and reptiles declined by nearly 60 percent	Sudan, the world's last male northern white rhino died in March 2018. There may not be another one for hundred's of years

As the economy pushes for digital transactions, India's cyber security chief Gulshan Rai shares some valuable tips that he personally practices, for people doing regular online transactions.

While we cannot deny the convenience of on-line transactions, these simple steps will help protect against fraud threat and also help prevent exposure of your key accounts to risk.



Here are 5 key suggestions:

- 1. Install an official licensed version of Anti-virus
- 2. Maintain a separate bank account for online transactions
- 3. Keep small amounts of money in that account
- 4. Procure a Debit / Credit card for that account to use for online transactions.
- Transfer moneys from your main account to the online transactions account as and when needed
